Sifting of the Billies and Does was done here last Tuesday by Arthur Davis, nationally known goat judge from Uvalde.

Col. V. Z. Cornelius, president of the association, announced this week that the sale this year will offer the finest selection of Bucks and Does to be found anywhere.

A number of observers present for the sifting declared that this would represent the best consignment of Angora Goats to be found at any sale, private or otherwise.

The Central Texas association is made up of members from a seven county area. The consignments to the sale will represent all counties, which were well represented by members at the sifting last Tuesday.

Counties represented with members in the association include: Mills, San Saba, Lampasas, Coryell, Hamilton, Comanche, and Brown.

Malcolm Jernigan Is Wagon Boss For Boys' Ranch Roundup Time

That popular old song, "When It's Roundup Time In Texas," has become the theme song of a group of stockmen already in the saddle in preparation for the annual West Texas Boys Ranch Roundup.

These men, called "Wagon Bosses," represent all sections of the 60-county area served by the Ranch. They assist in collection and assembly of live-stock donations from ranchers who want to help in the Ranch's biggest fund drive of the year.

Malcolm Jernigan is serving as Wagon Boss for this area. He's gearing his activities toward the week of August 24-29, at which time the maximum effort will be made to obtain gifts of sheep, cattle, goats, horses and swine. The livestock will be sold at auctions which levy no charges for handling or selling the animals — all proceeds of all sales go directly to the Ranch. Contribution of handling expenses is simply another way West Texans have of helping the Ranch.

This annual Roundup was begun five years ago and has become a main source of income for the Ranch. John Cargile of San Antonio is general chairman of the drive this year.

"The Ranch needs help to provide for some 80 boys the year around," Cargile says. "I realize if this year's Roundup is to be a real western type success I will need a lot of help. I would like to ask you to pitch in and help by making a donation of livestock, farm products, or cash."

Cargile pointed out that the gift of a single cow can outfit two boys in school clothes. Ten sheep can furnish one of the smaller boys with school material for a year, and as many goats can provide work allowances for 14 boys for a month. Three pigs will furnish funds for 134 quarts of milk.

Naturally, the Ranch appreciates and needs donations any time of the year. But this annual Roundup, with its concentrated effort to obtain donations, comes at a time when a great many ranchers are working stock and can conveniently sort out animals they feel able to contribute to a cause whose worthiness nobody doubts.

Ranchmen of this county or area are invited to contact Malcolm Jernigan for information and assistance in making their contributions.

And of course any donor can find abundant reward in knowing he has helped some boy, or perhaps several boys, who are growing into healthy, responsible citizens only because a strong man took notice of his need and gave him a boost at the right time.

West Texas Boys Ranch is financed entirely through free-will contributions. Morris Craig, executive director, says most boys at the Ranch are from broken homes or non-existent homes. At the Ranch, they get the necessities of a wholesome, self-reliant personality — from personal affection and religious training to the schooling which enable them to make a good mark in the world.

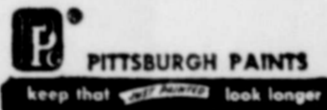

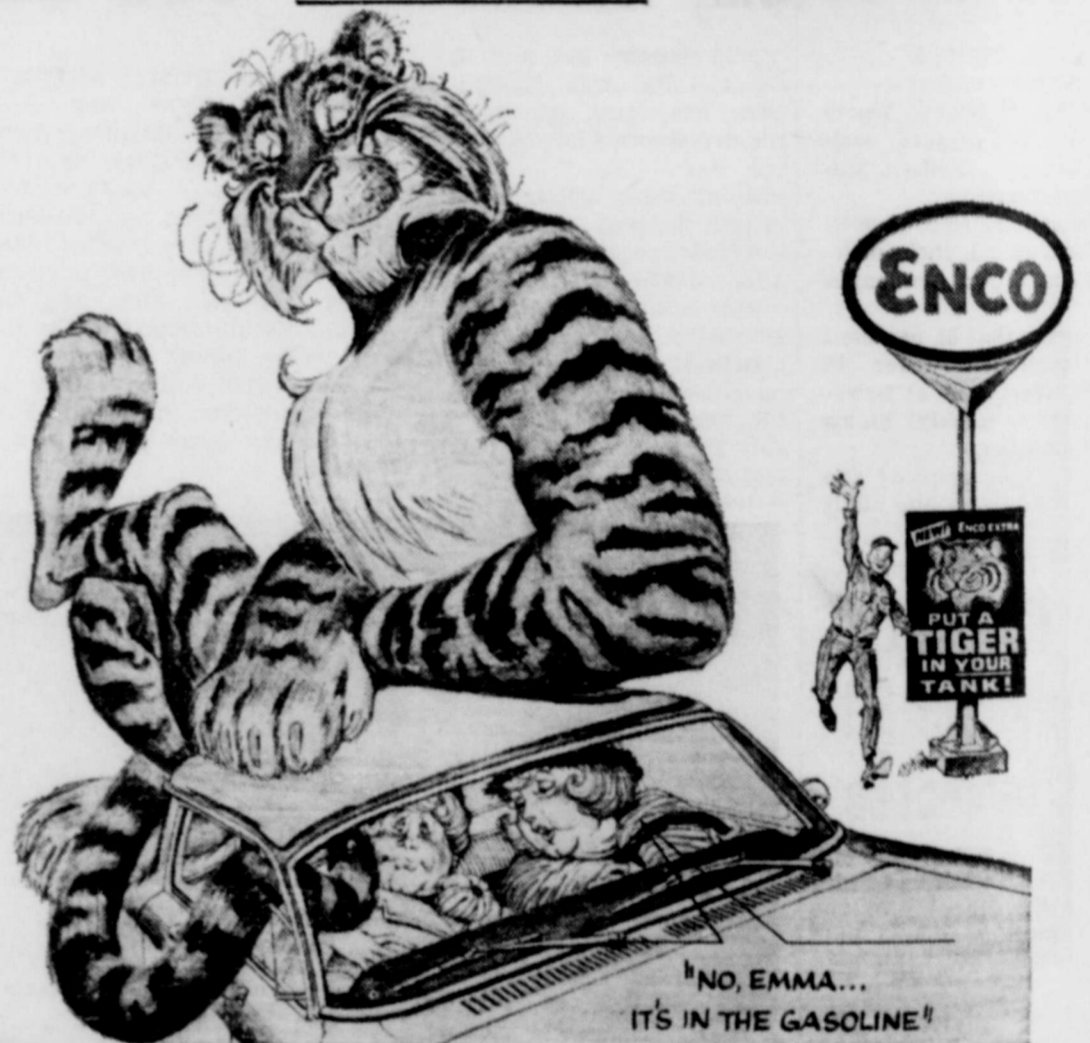

Statewide Panel Is Planning For Mental Health Services

With mental illness ranked as the nation's No. 1 health problem today, Texans are trying to do something about it.

A statewide effort to improve and modernize present methods of patient care and facilities, and State law on mental care, is nearing completion, according to County Judge G. L. Abernethy of Hale County, chairman of the general planning committee.

The new state plan for mental health services is being written by a 112-member planning committee made up of citizens throughout the State.

Judge Abernethy and others involved in the planning feel that Texas needs a new community-centered treatment plan to fit the varying needs of mentally ill citizens—from the first symptoms of disorder through the wide range of more serious illness.

"The new idea of treating mental illness in local communities is replacing the old concepts of sending people far from home and isolating them from society," Judge Abernethy says. "We should focus on the community itself, because that is where we can get the most effective results."

An estimated 77,000 Texans get psychiatric aid each year, but statistics indicate that Texas ranks last among the 50 states in per capita spending for maintenance of public mental hospitals and 43rd in the care and treatment of public mental patients.

The Texas effort to develop new ways and laws to cope with mental illness was inspired by former President Eisenhower and pushed forward by legislation during the Kennedy administration.

The actual planning work has been done by the statewide committee in four work sessions in Austin, with the fifth and final session coming up August 7-8. The committee is divided into 3 task forces on such matters as legislation, prevention of mental illness, diagnosis and treatment.

Serving with Judge Abernethy on the executive committee are Dr. James E. Peavy, state commissioner of health, chairman; Dr. Cyril J. Rullman, director of mental health and hospitals for the Board of Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools, co-chairman; and Dr. Robert L. Sutherland, director of the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health at the University of Texas. Dr. Sutherland is vice-chairman of the general planning committee.

A steering committee of 17 educators and medical men are assisting the executive committee. Administrative arm of the planning effort is the Office of Mental Health Planning in Austin, headed by Dr. Moody C. Bettis, psychiatrist-coordinator.

Dr. Bettis is on leave from the Houston State Psychiatric Institute and Baylor Medical School, Houston, to direct the administrative work.

Judge Abernethy emphasizes that the statewide planning group is seeking public opinion on which to base its recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district of such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

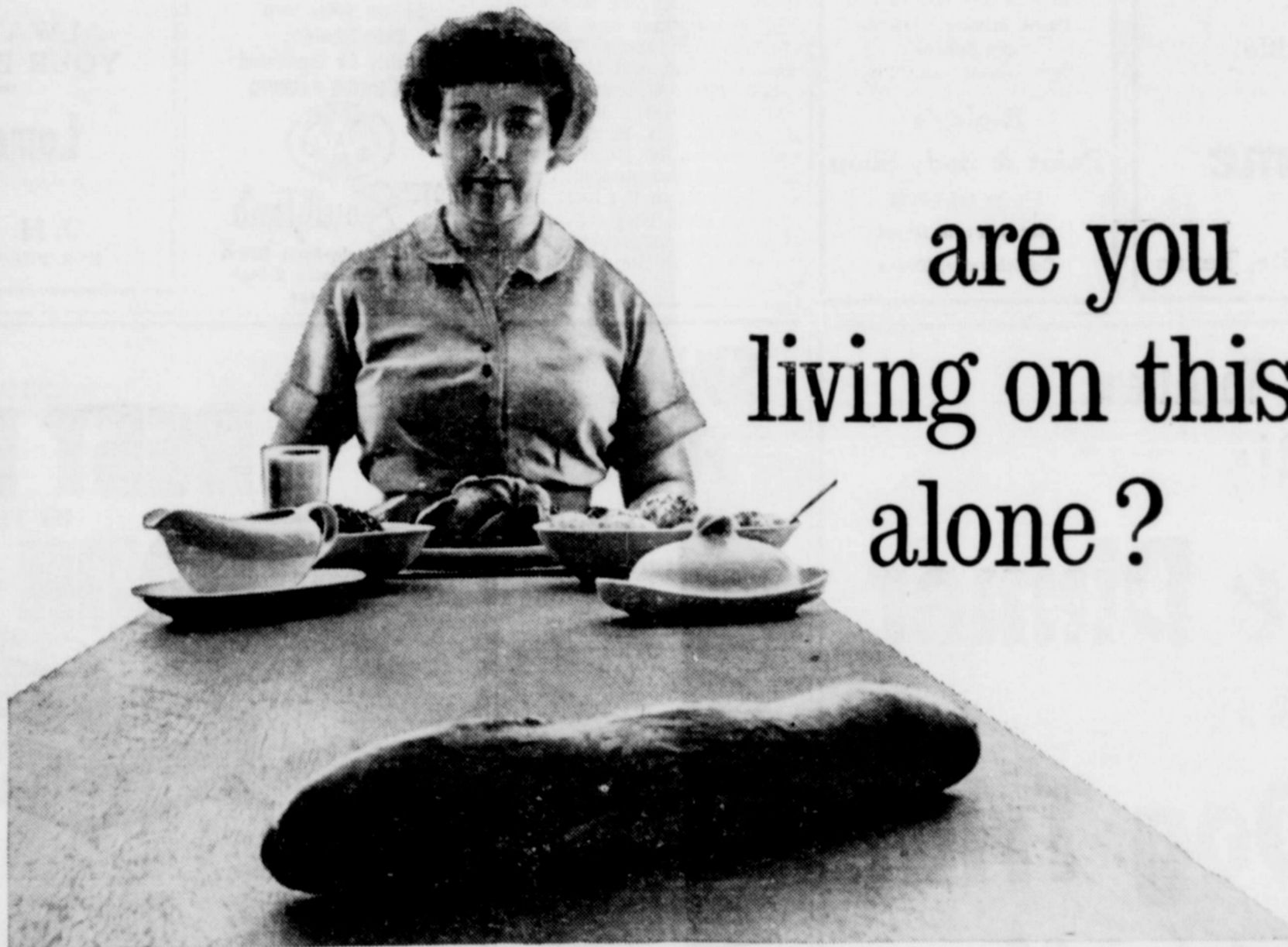

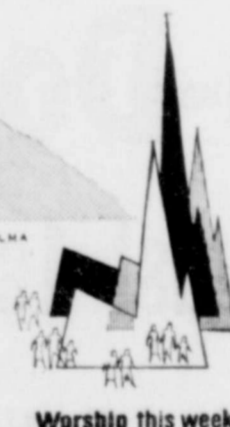

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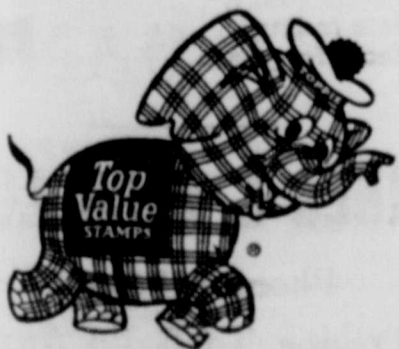
