Mr. Poe received his BA degree from North Texas University in 1960. He taught school in

Star from 1960 to 1963. In 1963 he returned to North Texas University, Denton, to continue his education and he will receive his Master of Education degree there Thursday, (today).

Mrs. Poe has also been attending school at North Texas the past year and will receive her BS degree from that school today also. She majored in secondary education in the teaching field of drama and history.

## County Voting Boxes Are Reduced From 18 To 13 By Commissioners

Five Mills county voting boxes were annexed with other voting boxes in action taken by the Commissioners' Court meeting in regular session last Monday.

It was announced by County Judge Cecil Egger.

The proposed move to eliminate some of the smaller voting boxes in the county had been talked many times in years past and under study for the past several months.

Under the newly adopted arrangement the county will have 13 regular voting boxes and the absentees, where formerly there were 18 regular boxes and the absentees.

Eliminating the five boxes will result in considerable saving to the taxpayers of the county in general election expenses and also will be a saving to candidates in the primary elections.

The Eagles lost most of their string in the 1964 season. This year they hope to win in speed, weight and in experience.

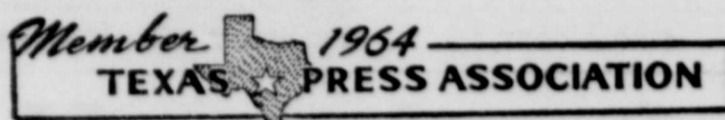

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands herebefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The first bale of 1914 cotton brought to this market was grown by J. O. Taylor of Rock Springs community. It was brought in Tuesday afternoon and ginned at the Greathouse gin that evening. When placed on the market Wednesday, McKinley-Corigan Co. bought it at 10 1/2 cents per pound. The bale weighed 404 pounds and was of good class. A premium of \$29.25 was secured for Mr. Taylor.

The first bale last year was brought in August 14, which was four days earlier than the bale this year, by T. J. Laughlin of Antelope Gap. It was ginned by J. E. Greathouse, weighed 610 pounds, was sold to L. O. Hicks & Son for \$11.59 per 100 and a premium of \$29.75 was raised for Mr. Laughlin.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

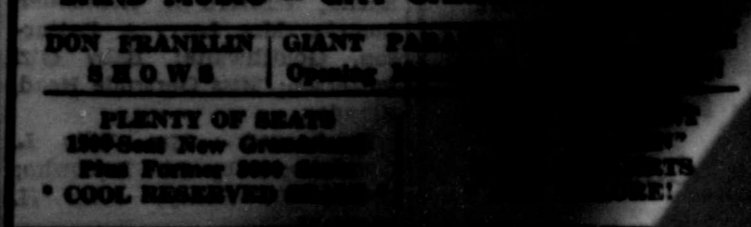

#### Redistricting "Worst Yet"

Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe believes redrawing of state congressional districts is the hardest job ever to face the Texas Legislature. Moffett is chairman of a special committee studying the problem.

Moffett, who holds the all-time record of continuous service in the Legislature (34 years), spoke out on the eve of his committee's fourth hearing in San Antonio.

Committee waded through five new redistricting plans at the Bexar County hearing. Fifth hearing will be held in Lubbock on August 20.

Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba meanwhile announced he has called on Texas congressmen to support federal legislation authorizing states to retain full authority over both congressional and legislative apportionment.

#### Burial Association Rates To Rise

State Board of Insurance has issued a notice to statewide and local aid associations and burial associations that they must adopt, by November 1, rates which will produce enough income to build their mortuary funds to the point where they can back up all benefits promised policy holders.

This action followed a hearing by the State Burial Association Rate Board at which State Insurance Department actuaries expressed alarm that many small local mutual and burial associations were not collecting large enough premiums to pay all potential claims.

Many associations already have voted to increase rates and two have obtained board approval.

Under the order, each of the 528 associations must appear before the Insurance Board between now and July 1, 1965, and prove they have rates in effect which will bring mortuary funds up to the reserves required by law.

#### Legislative Interns

Seven State government trainees who will participate in the 1964-65 program to interest qualified persons in government careers have been appointed by Speaker of the House Byron Tunnell.

Program is co-sponsored by the State of Texas and the Ford Foundation.

First-year "Interns" are Charles William Hohne, Schulerburg; William G. Reid, San Marcos; Jo Ann Pankratz Stiles, Comfert; Hubbard Scott Caven and Mrs. Clarice J. Davis, both of Austin; Johathon S. Day, Houston; and Edward Lamar Farley, Delhi, Louisiana.

#### Alamo Highway

State Highway Commission heard requests from a group of Texans representing cities from Texarkana to Round Rock. They asked that a route through their area be called "the Alamo Highway" and sought recommendations on ways to bring it to top condition by 1968.

Alamo Highway Association is made up of prominent boosters from cities and villages along

took a recess last week after handing down a heavy volume of new rulings including one which in effect upheld the 1959 open beaches law.

High court declined to hear arguments attacking the law guaranteeing free access to the beaches and oceans. It left standing a Houston Court of Civil Appeals decision stating the public is entitled to use Gulf Coast beaches from the water to the vegetation line.

In other cases, the court:

Permitted Texas Liquor Control Board to continue regulation of liquor exporters along the Mexican border during court attack on a law authorizing such control;

Set down arguments by State Board of Optometry Examiners to force Judge Dallas Blankenship of Dallas to rule on Dr. Ellis Carp's suit challenging its ethical practices order of 1959;

Overturned a contempt judgment against the city manager and Mayor of Hurst, Tarrant County, in connection with a condemnation case involving land for drainage easements;

Agreed to review an Austin district court decision denying a state savings and loan charter to Metropolitan Savings Association of Houston;

Refused review of a \$1,000,000 lawsuit in Hutchinson County brought by union members who claimed they were fired for following orders of their officials in a 1958 strike at Phillips Petroleum Company plants in the Texas Panhandle;

Refused a state AFL-CIO request to enjoin alleged "pro-employer lobbying" by Texas Employment Commission, leaving in effect lower court opinions.

Third Court of Civil Appeals overturned a district court ruling blocking Upshur Rural Electric Co-Op from building a \$9,-000,000 power plant near Ore City. However, it held the co-op cannot sell power to non-members.

#### Appointments Announced

Gov. John Connally appointed James S. Naismith of Corpus Christi and Donald C. Klein of Odessa to the State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers. Col. Thomas C. Green of Austin was reappointed executive secretary.

Connally also reappointed Edwin Bucek, Edmund Hajovsky and Alfred Neumeier Jr. of Hallettsville to the Board of Directors of Lavaca County Flood Control District No. 3. He selected James Bozka, Hallettsville banker, to fill the unexpired term of Robert Gindler, resigned.

#### School Transfer Upheld

Hockley County school board's approval of the transfer of 25 students from Witharral Independent School District to schools in Levelland, Littlefield and Anton was upheld by Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar.

Witharral authorities asked the commission to prohibit the transfer which had been requested by parents of the children.

U. S. 59 from Texarkana to Marshall; S. H. 43 from Marshall to Henderson; U. S. 79 from Henderson to Round Rock, and I. H. 35 from Round Rock to San Antonio.

F. B. Elliott of Jacksonville, president of the association, said "1968 will be a banner year in which to attract people from all over the east and the north to follow the Alamo route to the HemisFair in San Antonio and to the Olympics in Mexico City."

Highway Commission did not grant the request immediately. But its members, Herb Petry of Carrizo Springs, Hal Woodward of Coleman and Jack Kuitgen of Waco, expressed interest in the tourist attraction idea.

#### Water Aid

Texas Water Commission has been busy trying to help communities suffering from the extreme drought.

In little more than a week's time, the Commission sent one of its members, H. A. Beckwith, to Brackettville to help that city drill a water well when Las Moras Spring went dry; granted Thorndale a permit to pump 20 acre feet of water from the San Gabriel as an emergency measure; and secured a Kerr County court order restraining irrigators in the county from using water from the Guadalupe River and its tributaries for anything except domestic, municipal and livestock purposes.

#### New Animal Health Director Named

Texas Animal Health Commission has picked Dr. S. B. Walker to replace Dr. R. G. Garrett as Executive Director of the commission when the later retires to his Taylor farm in October.

Dr. Walker now is a supervising veterinarian for the Animal Health Commission. He received a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M in 1955, and his doctor of veterinary medicine degree in 1959. He's a native of Hillsboro.

#### Condemnation Case Clinic Set

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's department will sponsor a three-day seminar on the trial

of condemnation cases November 5-7. Carr is extending invitations to district, county and city attorneys, district and county judges and all attorneys who represent condemning authorities.

Among the speakers will be State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer, former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, Supreme Court Justice James R. Norvell, George Thompson of Sweetwater and Carr.

#### Extradition Hearing Held

Secretary of State Crawford Martin will recommend to Gov. Connally whether the governor should grant extradition of Melvin Lane Powers to Florida to face murder charges.

Martin conducted an extensive hearing on the request of Florida Gov. Farris Bryant to

extradite Powers, 27, who charged with the slaying of his wealthy uncle-by-marriage Jacques Moasler, 69. Defense Counsel Percy Foreman took the request.

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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas — Texas' progress in the field of race relations was commended by visiting federal officials here to discuss aspects of the new Civil Rights Law.

Gov. John Connally met briefly with Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges; former Florida Gov. LeRoy Collins, director of the new Community Relations Service; and former Gov. Buford Ellington of Tennessee.

Session was one of a series to be conducted with governors in all states at the request of President Johnson to discuss the Community Relations Service operation. Agency will provide conciliation service at the state and local level to resolve discrimination disputes.

Governor Connally predicted Texas will continue to move forward without outside help.

Meanwhile, Texas School Boards Association warned that action on the part of segregated schools between now and Labor Day may determine their continued eligibility for federal funds.

According to Department of Health, Education and Welfare officials on the Civil Rights Law, all the answers won't be known until new regulations are drawn late this month.

But the law has been interpreted as banning federal aid to segregated facilities.

Texas schools now get about \$30,000,000 a year in federal money for such programs as the national defense education act, vocational education, school lunch and milk program and aid to districts where federal installations bring in a large number of pupils.

HEW personnel indicate "tentative procedures for enforcement of Title VI (of the Civil Rights Law) will require assurance from local school boards of compliance or intention to comply before federal funds will be awarded."

Dr. J. A. Barrington of Wichita Falls and Dr. Claude Willey of El Paso were named to six-year terms on the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners. They succeed Dr. John McCoy of Paris and Dr. Edward Dwellle of Alice.

Kirby Hillin of Dallas and Virgil A. Walston of Houston succeed W. J. Burkhart of Dallas and Kenneth Nelson of Dillboil to six-year terms on the State Board of Registration for Public Surveyors.

Allen Searight, community coordinator for Texas Industrial Commission, has accepted a job as executive director of Texas Historical Foundation. Larry Milner, San Angelo, will take over Searight's duties with the Industrial Commission on August 15.

### Lobbyists

Texas legislative leaders, who have been the target of many lobbyists, have turned lobbyists themselves.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Speaker Byron Tunnell and Sen. George Moffett, chairman of the Legislative Council's redistricting committee, have been lobbying in Washington for passage of federal laws to clarify the congressional and legislative redistricting situation.

Moffett wants Congress to say that a state may have as much as 15 per cent variation from the average population in its Congressional districts. He and Smith also spoke in favor of the proposed amendment to the U. S. Constitution which would allow the states to set up one house of their Legislatures on a basis other than opinion.

### Attorney General Opinions

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled that:

A county commissioners court may decide whether or not it shall appoint county hospital managers with overlapping terms;

A county attorney has the duty of filing suits for foreclosure of the State's lien for delinquent inheritance taxes;

District courts in that county

have jurisdiction of these suits even in those instances in which property formerly belonging to a decedent is not within the county, so long as it is within the jurisdiction of this state.

### Panhandle Salt Water Hearing Continued

Oil industry representatives urged the Texas Water Pollution Control Board not to outlaw the use of open, unlined earthen pits for the disposal of oil field salt water in Dallam, Lipscomb, Hemphill, Potter and Oldham counties.

Board held the third in a series of hearings to explore the problem in a 48-county area which overlies the Ogallala water formation.

Oil engineers testified disposal of oil field brine into unlined pits in the five Panhandle counties named is "very minor." By January 1, testified one, 87 per cent of the salts will be injected underground, with only 257 barrels a day going into unlined surface pits.

### Short Snorts

Texas Highway Commission authorized urban transportation studies to determine future highway needs of Abilene, Midland, Odessa and Texarkana.

Cigarette taxes continue to

increase—to \$8,400,000 in June, a jump of \$317,942 over the previous month — according to State Comptroller's office.

Thirteen citizens' task forces met here to work on various aspects of a Texas plan for community mental health programs.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler refused to consider the

sale of 10 tracts of school land in Bandera County, explaining that he thought his own staff had set values too low.

Texas Education Agency has formally requested of federal authorities the establishment of a multi-million-dollar residential vocational education school at old Gary Army Airfield, San Marcos.

## Early Soil Testing Is Advised, According To County Agent Reese

Soil testing should now be underway in preparation for fall planting, reports George Reese, County Agricultural Agent.

Early soil sampling is encouraged to avoid the fall rush that crowds the state's three testing laboratories. A total of 19,047 samples were received at the laboratories from January 1 through June 30 this year. The soil testing laboratory at Texas A&M University received 9,349 of these samples compared with 7,248 last year.

As expected, a significant increase in tons of fertilizer applied has accompanied this increase in the number of samples tested.

An increasing number of acres are being seeded to winter legumes and since fertility of these crops vary, soil samples should be taken.

A soil test is the best way to determine the ratio and amount of fertilizer needed for satisfactory production of crops.

The Mills County ASCS office is also commending that farmers of Mills County have their soil tested. The payments from this office is \$3.00 per acre, for winter legumes when fertilizer is used according to a soil test and \$2.00 per acre without a soil test.

The soil test mailing cartons and complete soil testing information may be obtained from the County Agricultural Agent's office or the Mills County ASCS office.

The 1965 voluntary wheat program in general will operate about the same as the 1964-crop program, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, Mills County Committee, has announced.

While some program provisions have been modified for 1965, he said, participating farmers can get about the same returns, as from the 1964 program.

Some farmers may get more by using new options that will enable many producers to adapt the program more closely to their farming operations.

The principal changes, compared with 1964-program provisions, are:

A—Domestic certificates will be worth 75 cents per bushel (were 70 cents), and export certificates will be worth 30 cents per bushel (were 25 cents).

B—Price support national average loan rate will be \$1.25 per bushel (was \$1.30).

C—Program participants can qualify for domestic certificates on as much as 45 per cent and export certificates on as much as 35 per cent of the normal production from their allotment (were 45 per cent each).

D—Wheat and feed grain—including oats and rye—acreage substitution will be possible. (There was no provision for substitution in the 1964 program).

E—If the grower underplants his 1965 wheat allotment by at least 10 per cent and devotes those acres to an approved conserving use—in addition to the 11.11 per cent minimum diversion—payment on such additional diversion will be made at 50 per cent of the county loan rate on the farm's normal production of such additional acres diverted to conserving use.

Maximum diversion for payment can be 20 per cent of the allotment or enough additional acreage within the allotment to make a total of 15 acres. No payment will be made for diverting to an approved conserving use the minimum diverted acreage, equal to 11.11 per cent of the 1965 allotment. (Payment in 1964 was at 20 per cent for all acres diverted to conserving use).

F—A producer can qualify for loans and certificates even though he exceeds his acreage allotment by not more than 50 per cent on any farm in which he has an interest if he stores the wheat from the excess acreage under bond and carries out conserving-use requirements of the program. (This provision was not included in the 1964 program).

The Chairman pointed out that the signup for the 1965 wheat program for Mills County will be held in Mills ASCS county office from August 24 through October 2.

The annual Mills County Farm Bureau Queen's contest will be held Thursday, August 20, (tonight) at 8 p. m. at the Methodist Church in Goldthwaite, with 10 contestants entered.

Candidates will be judged on appearance, poise, personality, and all the other qualities that go to make up winsome Texas future homemakers.

The girl chosen as Mills County Farm Bureau Queen will go to the District Queen contest to be held in Brownwood on August 27.

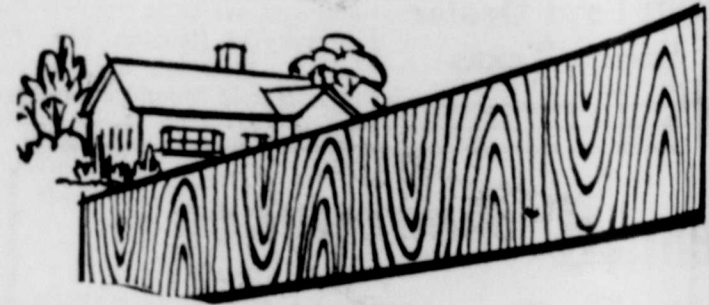
