Time for the Eagles' first scrimmage is 7:30 p. m., as announced by Coach Jackie Williams.

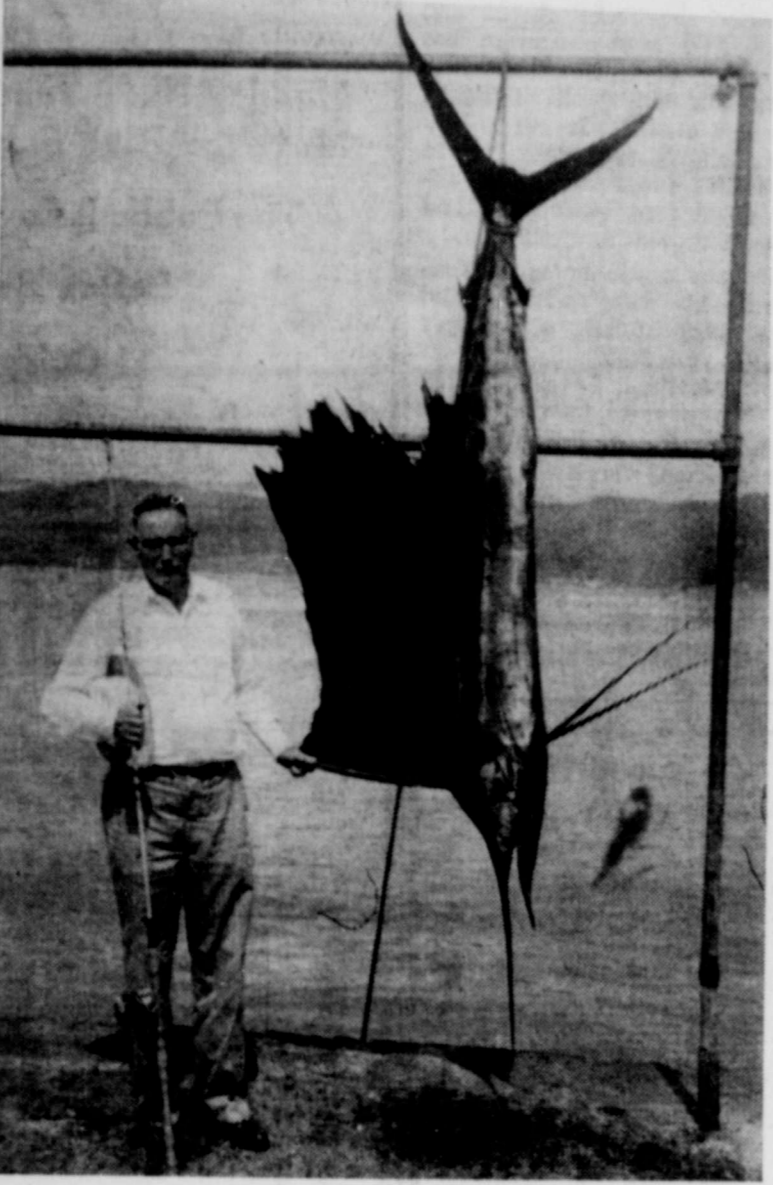
The Eagles are in line to win the title in District 9A football for the second season.

New Dove Maps Are Now Ready

Hunters readying for the north zone mourning dove season opener September 1 were invited by J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department, to observe the new official dove maps available at license distributors such as sporting goods stores and at regional and district departmental offices in their area.

"These maps spell out the hunting situation and provide a simplified approach to all phases of the upcoming harvest," said Phillips. "They are free. Important items to remember are that the daily legal shooting period is from 12 noon until sunset and that the daily limit is 12 and possession limit 24 mourning doves."

He also said the "Hunting in Texas 1964-1965," a guide to fall harvest regulations, is now being distributed through field offices and licensed deputies.

CO-DIRECTORS OF LVN SCHOOL

Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa and Mrs. Mary Ann Eklund will serve as co-directors of the newly organized LVN school of nursing to be conducted at Childress and Cruzcosa Clinic and Hospital in Goldthwaite.

The Hospital was recently approved for the LVN School and the first class will open on September 1. Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa, who founded the school, will be the staff medical advisor and chairman of the screening board for applicants.

Eight students will be the limit of the class to provide an adequate nurse-patient ratio to insure good training, officials announced.

Most of the school's first graduates will automatically be incorporated in the nursing staff of the hospital. Most of the first group of students come from the hospital's present nurses' aides.

The course will be 12 months with the first 16 weeks being spent on didactic training. Capping ceremonies will take place at the end of the 16 week didactic period.

December 31, is the deadline set for entries in the county show. All entry fees will remain the same as last year.

The annual 4-H Girls and Future Homemakers' Show and Exhibits will be held in connection with the stock show.

Friday and Saturday of this week will be two big days for goat and mohair producers of Central Texas.

Members of Central Texas Registered Angora Breeders' Association will have their Eighth annual show and sale at the Show barns in Goldthwaite. Goats will be in their pens by 9 a. m., Friday and will be judged starting at 9:30 by Stanley Lackey of Junction, Texas, for the champion buck and doe of the show. Mr. Lackey will place the top 20 bucks and the top 10 does starting at 1:00 p. m. Friday.

The sale will begin promptly at 1:00 p. m. Saturday. There will be a barbecue dinner served on the ground. The sale will offer 125 bucks and 35 does which were selected by Arthur Davis of Uvalde. The 125 bucks were selected out of 295 and the 35 does were picked from 85.

The goats offered for sale have been consigned by 22 Angora breeders. The association has about 65 members in Mills, Comanche, Hamilton, Coryell, Brown, Lampasas and San Saba counties.

The Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association was organized for the purpose of improving the Commercial and Registered Angora flocks in this area and for the convenience of those in need of better stud and range bucks and top quality does, according to Col. V. Z. Cornelius, president of the association.

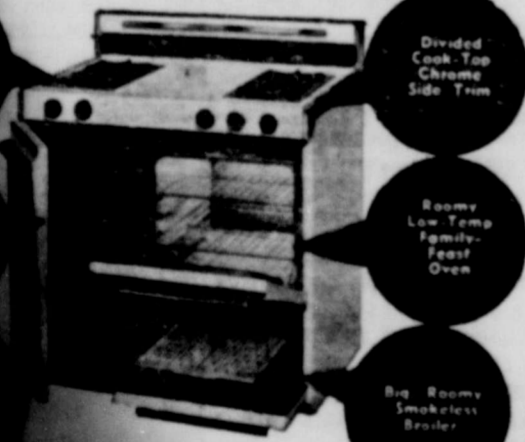

Central Texas Telephone Co-operative has put two exchanges into operation during the past two weeks and will place into operation three more exchanges by September 1st, it was announced by Claude Sanders, manager.

Members of the board of education of Goldthwaite Independent School District meeting in special session Monday night approved the budget for the district for the 1954-55 school year in the amount of \$158,903.75. Of this total amount \$14,363.75 is for bond sinking and interest fund and the balance of \$144,539.00 is for current operation.

Total assessed valuation of the district has been announced at \$3,756,508.00 for tax purposes. The tax rate for this year is \$1.40.

Austin, Texas—Texas Democrats and Republicans are gearing up for their big clash in the November general election.

Democratic leaders are in Atlantic City, N. J., at their party's national convention.

Gov. John Connally indicated both national and state campaign organizations will be put together in Texas soon after the convention.

Meanwhile, Republicans report they already have built an organization far stronger than any they have fielded to date. They plan to do vigorous battle in local races, as well as national and state campaigns.

GOP assembled its candidates and campaign leaders here last weekend for a special training school in practical political organization, vote-getting tactics and fund-raising activities.

Oil Rise

Texas Railroad Commission ordered a substantial increase in oil production for September.

Wells which are under production will be allowed to produce 28 per cent of their capacity during September, compared with 26.5 per cent this month.

New production quota amounts to 2,831,583 barrels daily, compared to 2,794,312 for August.

Commission also took under advisement conflicting testimony on effect of its proposed \$5,000 bond requirement for drilling or reworking wells in the interest of pollution control. Fifteen days were allowed interested parties for filing for additional briefs.

Stiff Gun Law Urged

Pressure from prosecuting attorneys is beginning to sift through to legislative candidates who are being urged to pass a gun registration law during the 1965 session in an attempt to reduce the crime rate and help police solve crimes.

Latest of the recommendations along this line comes from Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade. Gun registration is on the list of the most-controversial issues a legislature can tackle and proposals on the subject frequently are skirted.

Textbook Protests Pile Up

About 500 individual letters and 39 petitions bearing some 3,398 signatures concerning three high school biology books have been received by Governor Connally, Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar, and the State Board of Education.

And more are arriving every day.

More protestors claim three of the eight biology books being considered for public school adoption by the State Textbooks Committee have "an excessive amount of evolution in them."

All letters and petitions are being filed for the State Textbooks Committee to review, since Connally, Edgar and the State Board have no say on textbooks selection.

The 15-member committee has the task of picking five books each in 18 subjects from the 226 books under consideration. Public then will have an opportunity to make formal complaints about the biology texts, as well as any others which are considered "objectionable," before the committee's selection list is submitted to individual school districts.

Richard L. Ashford Crewmember Of USS Constellation

USS CONSTELLATION (FH-TNC) — Richard L. Ashford, machinist's mate second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Ashford of Mullin, Texas, is a crewmember of the attack carrier USS Constellation operating off the coast of Southeastern Asia.

The Constellation, one of the Navy's mobile floating airbases, provides fuel, maintenance and supplies for more than 80 airplanes of assorted types and sizes.

Aircraft include the propeller-driven "Skyraider" which is used for close ground support of infantry troops. This plane is capable of carrying enough bombs and rockets equal to its own weight. Along with this old workhorse are the "Phantom," "Skyhawk" and "Crusader," sleek, modern jets. The Phantom and Crusader are fighter-interceptor planes capable of reaching speeds twice as fast as sound. The Skyhawk, sometimes referred to as the bantam bomber, is the smallest carrier-operated plane capable of carrying nuclear weapons. It is equipped with four 20mm cannons plus the deadly heat-seeking air-to-air missile, Sidewinder.

The Constellation is operated by more than 4,000 men. She can operate continuously for months at a time, covering more than 600 miles a day with speeds up to 40 miles an hour. Four propellers, each equal in size to a two-story house, give her this speed.

Her flight deck is longer than three football fields laid end to end. The widest point of the deck is approximately 252 feet, large enough to hold the luxury liners Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary, side by side.

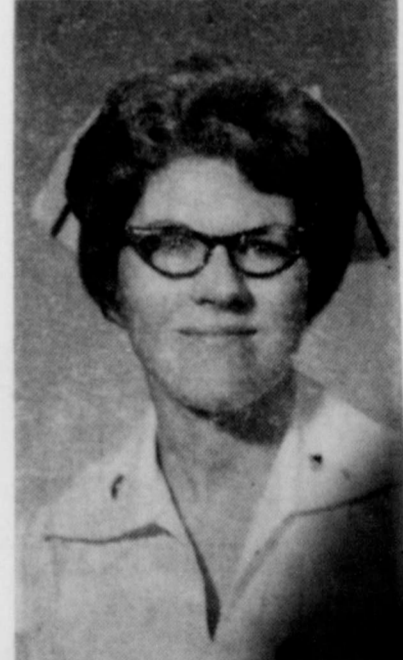
