## Bids To Be Opened Here October 1 For 10 Bed Addition To Hospital

Bids for construction of the new 10 bed addition to Childress and Cruzcosa Clinic and Hospital here will be opened at the hospital office on Thursday, October 1, at 4 p. m.

Construction bids have been advertised for and will be received until that date, it was announced this week by Dr. M.

A. Childress and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa.

Plans and specifications for construction of the new wing to the hospital were completed the past week and any contractor who would like to place a bid on the job may secure a set of plans and specs from either of the doctors at the hospital or from Wiedemann and Salmund, Architects and Engineers, Waco, Texas.

The new wing which is to be constructed at the south of present hospital will be 73 feet by 66 feet in size and will provide 10 additional beds.

Present capacity of the hospital is 22 patients, with 25 or 26 in emergencies. With the addition the capacity will be 32 patients, and 35 or 36 in case of emergency.

The new wing, or addition, will consist of 6 private rooms and two double rooms. All new rooms will have private baths. One of the double rooms will be equipped with two doors and a special scrub sink so that it can be used for isolation patient.

In addition to the eight rooms there will be a new surgery room. The new surgery room will be larger than the present one and will be equipped with new lights. The present surgery will be used for a hospital records room. It will also have a new obsterical room since the present one will be made into a new dining room for the staff.

There will also be a basement which will provide an area for heating and cooling units and allow extra space for storage.

### CHOICE OF ROOMS

During the past year the hospital has been crowded most of the time, according to Drs. Childress and Cruzcosa.

This situation prevented some patients from having private room when it was needed or desired.

The new wing with additional rooms is expected to solve the problem and give patients a better choice of rooms.

## Eagles Upset By Bearcats 26-6; Play Johnson City There Friday

De Leon's Bearcats used the expert passing of quarterback Gary Burleson and the running of Bill Lamb and Johnny Terrill to win over the Goldthwaite Eagles 26-6 here Friday night.

During the first half the Eagles were held out of the picture with the Bearcats showing most of the action. However, it looked like the Eagles would keep De

Leon from scoring when they held them for four downs on the Eagle five yard line. After losing the ball the Bearcats gained control again when the Eagles lost on a fumble. This time Tucker carried the ball to the one yard line and with 5:51 remaining in the first quarter Burleson plowed into the Eagle end zone. The play for the extra points failed.

Then with 10:55 left in the second quarter the Bearcats struck again. This time Terrill plunged through for the second tally of the game. An extra two pointer by Burleson brought the score to 14-0 in favor of the Bearcats.

Only a few minutes later with the clock showing 6:47, Bill Lamb carried the ball 13 yards to add another six points to the Bearcats' score.

Goldthwaite came out strong in the second half, and with 6:35 left in the third period, quarterback Johnny Hammond plunged over from the one yard line for the Eagles' first and only score. The play for the extra points failed.

De Leon added another six pointer as the clock showed 1:52

in the third quarter. This time Burleson passed to end Bo Shifflett for 10 yards and another score.

The Eagles threatened twice more, once after blocking a De Leon kick. This drive died near the goal line when the Black and Gold lost the ball on another fumble.

The second drive played out as the clock did, leaving the score at 26-6 in favor of the Bearcats.

Terrill led the rushers for the night with 101 yards, compared with Lamb for 100. Hammond led Goldthwaite efforts with 52 yards and Jim Childress added 38.

## Contract Let For Construction Of Dr. T. C. Graves Dental Building

Contract was let last Wednesday for construction of the new dental building for Dr. T. C. Graves, Goldthwaite Dentist.

Leon Burk Construction Company, general contractor, San Angelo, Texas, was the low bidder for the job. Low bid was \$33,760.00 for the building. This does not cover the air conditioning which will be done by James Skiles of Goldthwaite at an approximate cost of \$4,500.00, according to announcement by Dr. Graves.

Construction bids were submitted by six contractors. Two from San Angelo, two from Goldthwaite, one from Brownwood and one from Abilene.

The contract was awarded to Burk Construction with a five day starting time and 90 days for completing the job. Work got underway on location Friday.

The new building will be located on the corner of Eagle

and First streets, on the lot where the late J. H. Dolph home was located.

Construction will be of concrete and glass with year around conditioning.

The building will face street. It will be 28 feet wide and 90 feet in depth. It will contain large reception room, business office, three denture room, laboratory, lounge, dark room, X-ray office, storage room, rest room and wide hall.

There will be customer parking on the north side of the building on First Street.

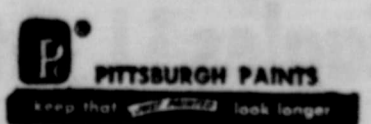

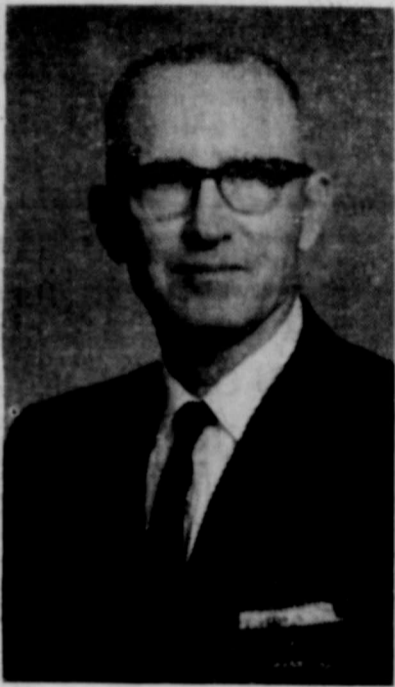

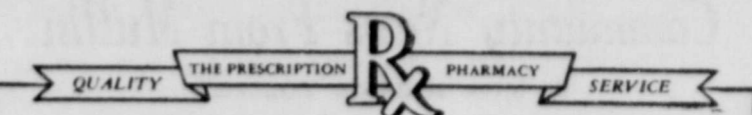

AUSTIN, Texas—All available money and manpower of the Texas Water Commission is being dedicated to a long-range water master plan.

Gov. John Connally authorized the agency to transfer money already appropriated by the Legislature for other purposes. Existing state plans, in Connally's opinion, "fall short of satisfying the water needs of all of Texas."

In 1961, the Commission proposed a plan for meeting Texas water needs to the year 1980. Both the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, are coming up with their own long-range plans covering parts of Texas. They propose diversion of water from surplus areas like the Sabine to water-shy areas like the Neuces.

Connally said the federal government is considering a water pollution control bill which would supplant state authority in the field.

He urged the Commission to explore "all reasonable alternatives" including those contained in preliminary reports of U. S. agencies.

The Governor indicated he will authorize other state agencies to cooperate in the crash program. He also pledged his help in any way possible and to recommend to the Legislature necessary funds to fulfill this important responsibility."

## Many Part Time Farmers Are Using FHA Operating Loans

Many part-time farmers in Brown and Mills Counties are using operating loan credit from the Farmers Home Administration to supplement the agricultural part of their earnings, according to Don Montgomery, county supervisor of the agency.

About 70 per cent of the operating loans in the Brown-Mills Area during 1964 went to part-time farmers, according to Montgomery.

Improvements in Farmers Home Administration loan program now permit the farm credit agency to advance financial assistance to families on small farms. This includes farms operated on a part-time basis.

Operating loans from FHA can be used by part-time farmers to buy feed, seed and fertilizer, machinery and equipment as well as livestock.

Many farmers who operate small farms, Montgomery said, but obtain most of their income through another job may be overlooking an opportunity to increase their farm income.

Small amounts of credit from a conventional lender, Montgomery continued, often can help the farmers replace old and inefficient machinery or purchase new equipment more suitable for his part-time farmer.

"But when a conventional lender is unable to extend credit, in many cases FHA may be able to provide the financing for eligible part-time farmers."

Interest rate on operating loans is 5 per cent, with a repayment period of from 1 to 7 years.

Farmers Home Administration also makes loans to purchase and develop farms, to develop community water systems, soil and water conservation loans to individuals, to build housing for senior citizens, loans for essential buildings on farms and dwellings on non-farm tracts in rural areas. The agency also makes loans to meet emergency credit needs of

farmers suffering from a natural disaster, such as hail, flood or drought.

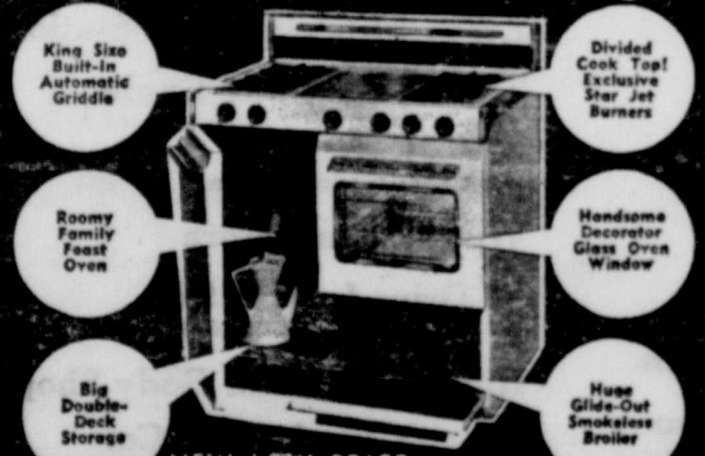

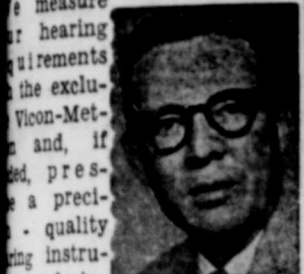

### HOME ECONOMICS NEWS

There are many types of velvet, but all are described as "pile construction."

Some imported types are described as having raised and flat figured sections produced by weaving on a Jacquard loom. The background fabric may be satin, twill or plain weave.

Velvets also may be classed as to type of pile—the V-type and the W-type. The V-type piles goes under only one warp yarn; while in the latter type, the pile goes under and over two warp yarns and is more firmly locked into place.

Terms used to describe various types of velvet may be of interest to you:

Silk Velvet—silk background weave, silk pile.

Cotton-backed Velvet—cotton background weave, silk or synthetic fibers in the pile.

Chiffon Velvet — a light-weight soft velvet with a short, thick pile. When held to the light, it's transparent. Hence, the name chiffon.

Brocade Velvet — sometimes called faconne velvet, it is a fabric woven like others from velvets, then chemicals are applied in the desired pattern to the back of the fabric.

Crushed Velvet — fabric is placed between rollers and heat, and moisture and pressure are applied. The pile is not pressed in one direction, and there is a variation of reflection of the pile, creating a mixed effect.

Embossed Velvet—also known as sculptured velvet. In making this fabric, areas of the pattern that are to stand higher are first laid flat, then the fabric is sheared to a lower height. The fabric is then steamed to raise

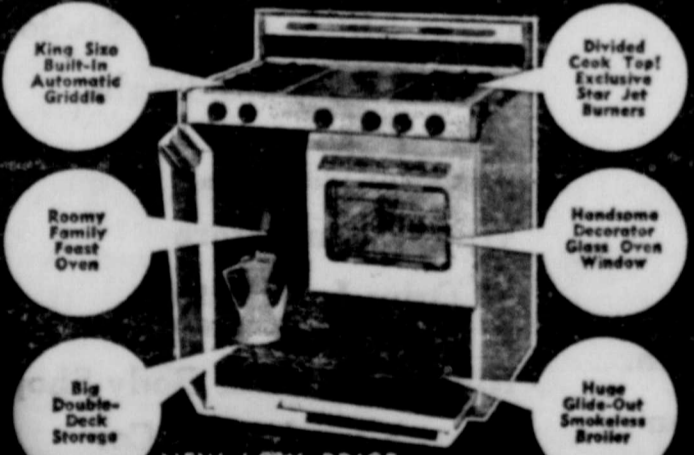

### Hints For The Week

A clothes dryer save the average homemaker 20 eight-hour work days and 40 miles of walking in a year. To keep a clean range follow this suggestion: Avoid high

temperatures which cause boil-overs and spatters. Clean-as-you-go, using a sudsy cloth or sponge, followed by rinsing; and give the range a thorough cleaning at least once a week.

### HOME ECONOMICS NEWS

There are many types of velvet, but all are described as "pile construction."

Some imported types are described as having raised and flat figured sections produced by weaving on a Jacquard loom. The background fabric may be satin, twill or plain weave.

Velvets also may be classed as to type of pile—the V-type and the W-type. The V-type piles goes under only one warp yarn; while in the latter type, the pile goes under and over two warp yarns and is more firmly locked into place.

Terms used to describe various types of velvet may be of interest to you:

Silk Velvet—silk background weave, silk pile.

Cotton-backed Velvet—cotton background weave, silk or synthetic fibers in the pile.

Chiffon Velvet — a lightweight soft velvet with a short, thick pile. When held to the light, it's transparent. Hence, the name chiffon.

Brocade Velvet — sometimes called faconne velvet, it is a fabric woven like others from velvets, then chemicals are applied in the desired pattern to the back of the fabric.

Crushed Velvet — fabric is placed between rollers and heat, and moisture and pressure are applied. The pile is not pressed in one direction, and there is a variation of reflection of the pile, creating a mixed effect.

Embossed Velvet—also known as sculptured velvet. In making this fabric, areas of the pattern that are to stand higher are first laid flat, then the fabric is sheared to a lower height. The fabric is then steamed to raise

## 1965 Wheat Program's Oats-Rye Option Explained To Growers

Growers who are interested in the new wheat program provision for substituting wheat for oats or rye in addition to the other feed grains should discuss this option when they file applications to participate in the 1965 voluntary wheat program, Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager, Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, said recently.

Mr. Tabor stressed the importance of signing up as a first step to taking part in the program. The program sign-up now is under way in winter-wheat areas at the ASCS Office and will extend through October 2.

The substitution provision is one of the new features offered by the 1965 wheat program, according to the Chairman, and it will be available to growers who sign up to take part in both the wheat and the feed grain programs. Payments for diversion plan will be based on the actual crop, or crops, diverted from production.

Mr. Tabor explained that the purpose of establishing an oats-rye base is to extend substitution benefits to producers who mainly grow wheat, oats, and rye. Therefore, when this oats-rye option is used, corn, grain sorghum, or barley may not be grown on the oats-rye base or on the wheat allotment acreage. Oats or rye, however, may be substituted for wheat or the

other feed grains.

If the producer wishes to use the oats-rye option, he requests—at the time of the sign-up—that a separate oats-rye base acreage be established for his farm. If he requests but does not use the oats-rye substitute option, eligibility for program benefits will be determined as if the oats-rye option had not been requested.

Planting wheat on oats-rye or other feed grain acreage will not reduce or increase the wheat certificates issued for a farm. Likewise, substituting feed grains for wheat will not change the amount of feed grain program price-support payments available on a farm. Both the certificates and the price-support payments are based on the normal production of the allotment or base acres.

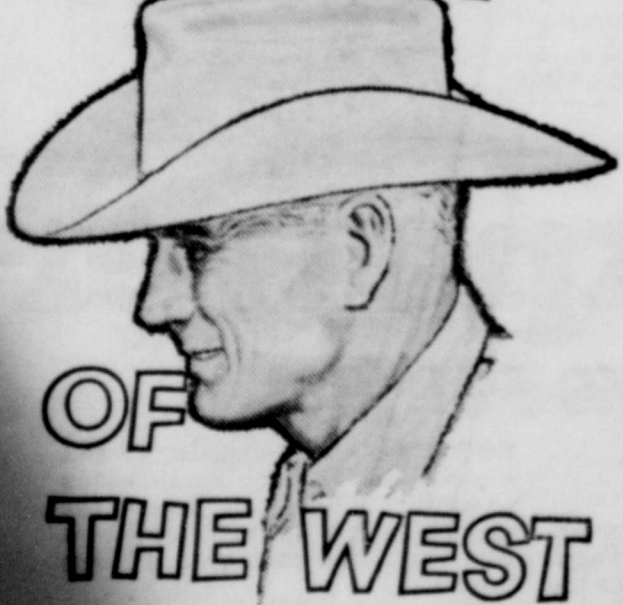
