Spradley Has Furniture Sale And Open House

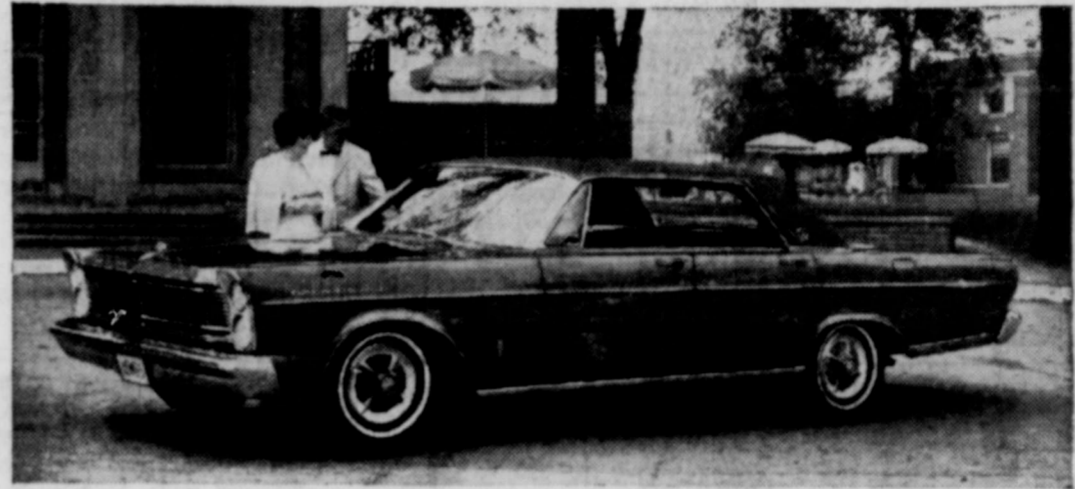
After remodeling furniture sale and open house will get underway today at Spradley's Furniture and Upholstery on Fisher Street in Goldthwaite.

Rains Up To Nine Inches Cover Mills County Area

Rains ranging from three to more than nine inches covered the Mills County area during the past week, starting last Wednesday.

Goldthwaite received an official 4.96 inches according to report kept by weatherman Harry Allen. This was recorded, .73 inch last week Wednesday, 4.16 Saturday night and .07 inch on Sunday night.

Darrell Head, weatherman at Center City, reported an official 2.93 inches while the Duren community and parts of the Star area had reports of 9.50 and 8.60 inches respectively.

W. P. Duren, reported pouring nine and one-half inches out of the rain gauge at his ranch in the Duren community since last Wednesday.

Roy L. Hill reported 8.60 in-

ches southwest of Star.

Mullin reported around eight inches.

At Regency the reported rainfall was 5.90 inches.

Moline reported 5.80 inches for Sunday and 1.70 inches for Monday for a total of 7:50 inches.

At Priddy they measured 3.60 inches Saturday night and 2.40 inches last Wednesday for a total of 6 inches.

Chappell Hill received four inches.

Arthur Wilcox, West of Goldthwaite, reported that this was the first time in four years for one of his large tanks to catch any run-off water.

Many farmers and ranchers reported tanks full and running around the first time in several years.

GHS Eagles Post 28-8 Win Over Johnson City Eagles

Johnson City's Shockley Field was the background for the first political victory of the season for the Goldthwaite Eagles. The GHS Eagles were too strong for the Eagles of Johnson City Friday night and came up with most of the votes for a 28-8 football victory over the President's alma mater.

Left half Charles Blackburn broke the game wide open with a 32 yard touchdown in the first few minutes of the game. A pass to Jimmy Ball was good for two extra points giving Goldthwaite an early 8-0 lead.

In the first period Johnson City came up with its only touchdown when halfback Freddie Lindeman plunged over from the 1 yard line after re-

covering a Goldthwaite fumble on the 15 yard line. Johnson City's Felps ran for two more points to tie the game 8-8.

Early in the second quarter Goldthwaite came back on a 22-yard run by Blackburn to go into the lead, from which they were never tumbled.

Just before the half, Blackburn barreled through the line for 17 yards and a third six-pointer. The point-after try failed again giving the GHS a 20-8 lead at the half.

After a scoreless third period Blackburn again scored on an eight-yard run in the fourth period with Jimmy Ball running the extra points to end the game's scoring.

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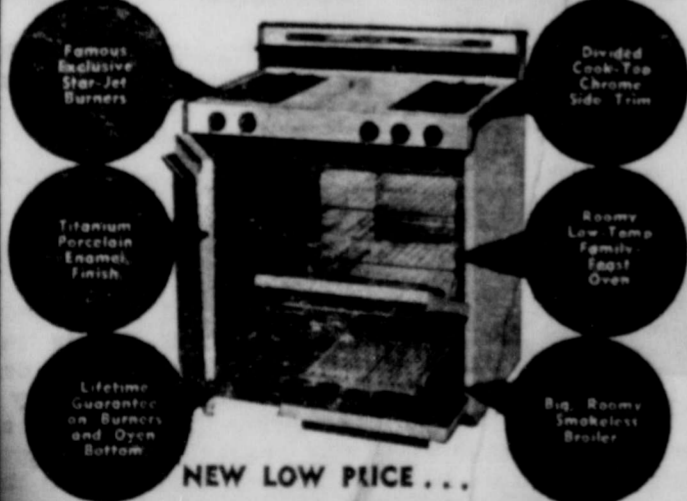

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

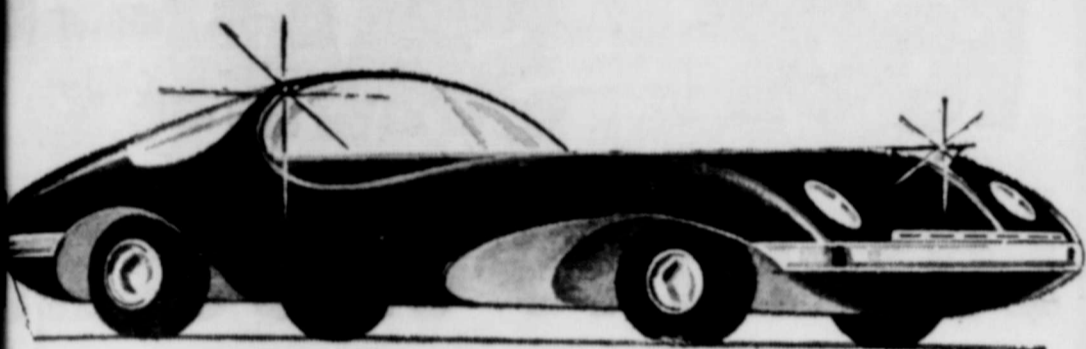

Longer post office window hours, expanded delivery services and large-scale extension of the zip-coded parcel post speedup are planned for Christmas. Postmaster General John A. Gronouski has advised the local Postmaster, Lucile Fairman.

Mr. Gronouski outlined to the Goldthwaite postal head, three major new steps he has taken "for the best Christmas mail service the Postal Service has ever had."

In Phase I and II, approximately 75 offices with receipts of \$5 million annually and above activated faster Zip Code sorting and dispatch by Sept. 1. The 130 in Phase III includes offices with receipts of \$1 and \$5 million.

In addition, many other sectional center offices with smaller receipts will have the pro-

gram in operation by early cember, in time to help delivery of Christmas gifts. The wood post office is the Section Center for this area.

Postmaster General Gronouski told Mrs. Fairman the Christmas plans are a part of a nationwide program to bring master into more responsible positions in postal management as "real partners in providing better mail service at all levels."

Sign-Up Details Modified 1965 Winter Wheat Program

Winter wheat growers who sign up this fall to participate in the 1965 winter wheat program will be able to change their diversions of overplanting intentions before the close of the grain and wheat program next spring, Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (County) office said today.

It is being done so that wheat growers will have the same opportunity as spring wheat growers in a program based on feed program and other information available at sign-up time.

The Chairman pointed out that the major purpose of prompt sign-up is to qualify a product for the wheat program's price-support loans and for diversion and certificate payments—the sign-up is the first step for participating in the 1965 wheat program.

Growers of winter wheat who wish to take part in the 1965 wheat program need to file program applications by the October 2 sign-up deadline. However, Mr. Tabor urges growers in winter-wheat areas who seed spring wheat only to sign up now, since the programs modification makes it possible for

them to change their cropping intentions later if they so desire.

For 1965, the diversion programs offer participating growers the privilege of substituting wheat for feed grains or feed grains for wheat while still qualifying for certain benefits of the two programs. In addition, farmers who elect in advance of their first sign-up to overplant their wheat allotment by as much as 50 per cent and store the excess wheat under bond and meet certain minimum conservation provisions will still be able to qualify for wheat price support loans and marketing certificates.

In 1964, participants lost all diversion payments if they did not divert as agreed at sign-up time. This also will be true for 1965 after the sign-up deadline next spring.

Prior Approval Needed For Haying And Grazing Some 'Retried' Acres

Farmers in Mills County are reminded that acreages shifted from crop production to conserving uses under Department of Agriculture diversion programs now may be used for haying and grazing provided prior approval is obtained from the ASC County Committee. The emergency privileges are offered to provide additional forage for livestock because drought in the area has severely restricted livestock feed supplies.

E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and

Conservation County Committee, also said that, beginning November 1, farmers will be able to graze the acreage they diverted under the 1964 feed grain and voluntary wheat programs without special approval.

However, prior approval still will be necessary in order to harvest hay from such acreage or in order to graze or harvest acreage diverted under the Conservation Reserve program.

After committee approval is obtained, he explained, farmers may use the forage on the diverted acreage through the termination date, thus affording an immediate additional source of rough feed supplies. While the retired or diverted acreages are also affected by the drought, the grazing or hay they can supply now will help feed livestock in the present critical situation.

This emergency program provision affects a total of 185 farms in the county which are participating in one or more of the three "diverted acreage" programs. Downward adjustments will be made in the program payments to farmers where diverted lands are grazed or harvested for hay under the "prior approval" emergency provision.

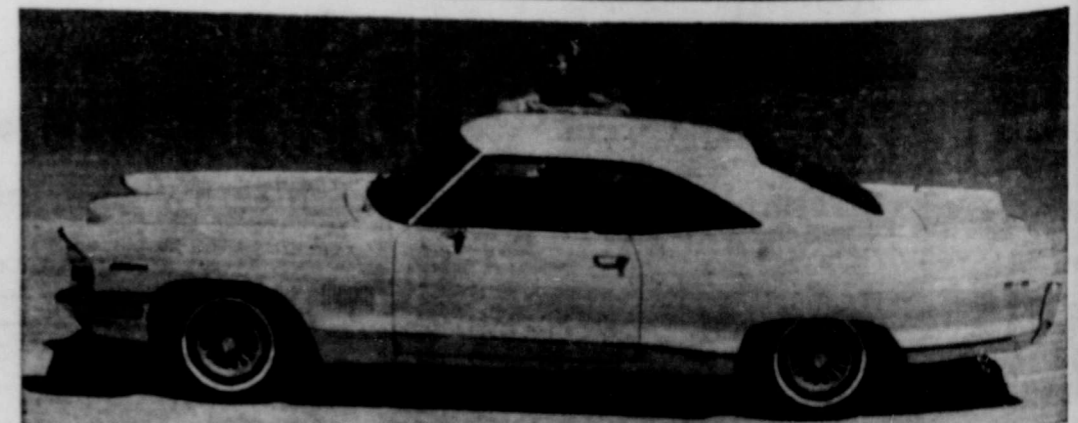
