Contract Awarded Waco Firm For New Addition To Hospital

Construction contract for the new addition to Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital was awarded to a Waco firm when bids were opened here last Thursday at the hospital office.

Malone Construction Company received the contract with a low bid of \$89,700.00. This does not include architect's fees, or furnishings and equipment.

J. C. Malone, owner of the construction firm, told the Eagle Monday that work will get underway this week with excavation and the fill for the job. He also announced that F. E. Brown of Waco, will be superintendent for the job.

The contractor plans to have as much work done as possible by local labor and to work with local dealers in materials and supplies in so far as it is practical.

Construction contract calls for 190 calendar days to complete the job.

The new wing which is to be constructed at the south of present hospital will be 73 feet by 66 feet in size and will provide 10 additional beds.

Present capacity of the hospital is 22 patients, with 25 or 26 in emergencies. With the addition the capacity will be 32 patients, and 35 or 36 in case of emergency.

There will also be a basement which will provide an area for heating and cooling units and allow extra space for storage.

Dr. M. A. Childress and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa stated that architect's fees, furnishings and equipment will amount to approximately \$25,000.00. This will bring the total cost of the entire project to approximately \$115,000.

Garden Club To Build Flagstone Walk At Mills County Park

The Goldthwaite Garden Club Park Committee met at the Mills County Park last Wednesday afternoon to plan the year's work for the club's project, "Beautification of Mills County Park."

Mrs. W. P. Duren, chairman, presided at the meeting. Plans were discussed and the decision was made to complete the flagstone walk. Flat rocks are needed to complete the job. The ladies asked that anyone interested in the work to donate flat rocks.

The club employed a landscape architect to design an overall plan for the park. They then planted a large Iris bed and Daffodils near the American Legion Hall and set out a Ligustrum hedge to screen the swimming pool machinery. Later they planted Honeysuckle in a long planter at the pool and constructed a concrete bed and planted roses in the bed.

A number of Pecan and shade trees and several Redbud trees were planted.

The Garden Club also paid for the construction of several picnic tables of brick and concrete, two brick and redwood entrance markers and a concrete footbridge across a drainage channel.

The present need of the club is flat stones to complete the walk, after which an extensive planting of shrubs and flowers will be undertaken.

Eagles Upset By Comanche 20-14; Will Play Llano There Friday Night

The Comanche Indians came from behind with three touchdowns in the final two periods to win over the Goldthwaite Eagles, 20-14, there Friday night.

The Eagles started the scoring in the opening seconds of the game when halfback Charles Blackburn took a handoff from halfback Jimmy Ball on a reverse and returned the kick-off 80 yards for a touchdown with only 17 seconds gone in the first quarter. Ball carried for two extra points giving the Eagles a good 8-0 lead.

In the second period, the Indians penetrated to the Goldthwaite 17-yard line on two occasions but were unable to score as a tough Eagle trench, led by Johnny Hammond and Owen Yarborough, held them off.

After the half time intermission the Indians showed new life but were still unable to score until the final 1:45 of the third quarter.

Forcing the Eagles to punt, the Indians took over the football on the 50 yard line. The outstanding play in the drive to

the goal was a 36 yard pass combination from Jolink to Bill Gossett that set up the Indians on the Eagle 12 yard line.

From there the Indians moved in for the touchdown in three plays after Jolink gave them a first down on the Goldthwaite two yard line. McKenzie carried the final yardage and Jolink added the points to knot the score at 8-8.

Due to the passing of Jolink and the running of McKenzie, the Indians were able to cover the distance again to the Eagle goal line in eight plays. Jolink's last completion in the drive was to end Bill Williams for 15 yards and Comanche's second six-pointer, PAT kick was blocked, giving the Indians a 14-8 lead.

Denny Scott, 140 pound junior, was the big factor in the Indians' third tally. He intercepted a stray Goldthwaite pass midway in the final period to give the Indians excellent field position at the Eagle 40. A few minutes later Jolink threw his second touchdown pass for the night to Gossett, a play good for 26 yards. After the PAT kick was blocked the Indians finished their scoring 20-8 with only 5:46 left in the contest.

The Eagles tried to get back into the game by cutting the Indians' lead to 20-14 when they came up with their second touchdown with only 2:58 remaining on the clock.

Quarterback Hammond kept the Eagle drive alive with two key pass completions. The first was a 20-yard toss to halfback Bobby Rountree giving the Eagles a first down on the Comanche 31. The second was to halfback Jim Childress for 30 yards and a touchdown. The try for extra points failed leaving the Eagles behind, 20-14.

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



Forty-three books have been purchased and 4,928 books have been circulated since the first of June.



Governor Connally hailed the opening of a sugar beet refining industry at Hereford as an example of the "unlimited opportunity" for processing plants utilizing Texas raw materials.

Connally said, "No other state produces more of the basic chemical feed-stock that goes into making synthetic fibers. Yet not one inch of these fibers is made in Texas. Our greatest challenge is economic development and our brightest opportunity is the attraction of end-product manufacturing to use our raw materials and provide skilled jobs for our growing labor force."

Connally appointed Edward H. Harte, publisher of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times, to succeed Vann Kennedy, Corpus Christi radio executive, who resigned from the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Connally applauded Report The Warren Commission's report on the assassination of President Kennedy has received Governor Connally's approval.

Connally, who was seriously wounded by the assassin, stated

that reading the report brought back memories he had tried to put aside.

FHA Loans To Twelve Families In Mills And Brown Counties
