The city council meeting in regular session Monday night voted to allow water service to those residents of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. residing outside the city limts of Goldthwaite.

Some residents of the water district, but outside the city limits, had requested water. Others are expected to do so since the city expects to have ample water supply from now

The city will not extend water mains outside the city limits.

Under the plan approved by the council the customer will install line to the nearest city water line at the city limits. The line will remain the property of the customer.

Customer will pay the regular meter installation and service connection charge that is paid by all water users in the city limits. Also customer will pay the regular monthly water rate ine local interest in the prothat is paid by water customers within the city limits. The district asks cooperation



J. W. Hill of South Bennett was here this week and stated Mr. Vic Koleber he had sold all of the seed Goldthwaite Eagle wheat advertised in the Eagle Goldthwaite, Texas last week and announced he would give a trio of his moneymaking goats to the farmer showing the largest yield from this seed. He also stated he would give a premium for the best bushel of wheat exhibited at the fair next fall. Mr. Hill is one of Mills County's prosperous farmers who believes in buy-a-bale movement and has bought ten bales of cotton under the plan.

A number of Mills County people remember kindly Mr. J. K. Street, who was the publisher of a newspaper in Goldthwaite some years ago. His death occurred in Waco a few days ago.

The receipt of cotton at this place up to the present time is somewhat in excess of the amount received on the same date last year, but the extremely low price makes the crop net growers a much smaller amount. Up to yesterday 2,815 bales of cotton had been received at the

"Fabric Weights Make Pounds A Poor Guide to Washer Capacity." Pounds are often meaning_ less as a gauge to washer capacity

Fabrics come in so many different weights - ranging from delicate lace items to heavy denims-making pounds a poor gauge to washer capacity. Regardless of the weight of the load, the volume should be such that all items circulate freely in the washbasket during agita-

Laundry baskets of the same volume can hold 16 pounds of overalls, but only three pounds of dacron curtains.

If the washer is overloaded. the flexing action of the water and detergent through the fabric are retarded, resulting in uneven cleaning.

An overloaded machine also may cause some articles to be rubbed by the washing machine agitator and subjected to abrasion. Too large a load does not allow the clothes to move freely in the tub-and this may mean lint on the finished product.
