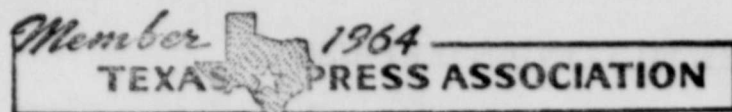

Recreation-- A Rich Crop

Frost on the fence post and a blast of cold air in the fall brings a stirring to the trigger finger and a burning desire to go hunting to nearly every man and boy, and to a large number of women.

Deer are one class of wildlife from which many get fun and enjoyment of hunting. Some others in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are turkey, quail, dove, and waterfowl.

The sportsman and the "Sunday Hunter" concentrate on hunting during the open season of the game to be hunted. There is someone else that must consider wildlife the year around. He may be called the wildlife manager, although he is generally thought of as the farmer, rancher, or landowner. The wildlife is not his personal property. According to law, it belongs to the state. But unless the landowner maintains a suitable habitat for it, the "state property" will starve or move to a new area.

Considering the special job a landowner must do to encourage and sustain wildlife, often at a reduction in domestic livestock income, he should receive some return for his job of "keeper of the wildlife."

It costs money to belong to a club, to go to a football game or to play golf. Americans are willing to pay for something that brings them pleasure. Not only hunting, but picnicing, hiking, swimming, and camping are high on the list of ways they spend their leisure time.

If some are willing to add comforts to these pastimes and make the available to the public, herein lies an opportunity to supplement their farm and ranch income. This is being done today in the soil conservation district. Your place may be suited for a recreation enterprise. Not only is your soil conservation district willing to assist but the educational and agricultural agencies assisting the district will provide assistance in planning a recreation enterprise.

Recreation is a salable farm

and ranch product. The landowner has the advantage of land and facilities; and these are powerful weapons in today's patterns of crowded cities and jammed highways. For the man who can meet the challenge, recreation could be the richest crop in history.

A-G Opinions

Attorney General Waggoner Carr has ruled that Rep. H. G. Wells of Tulla, who represents Briscoe, Hale, Swisher and Floyd Counties, should get legislative pay through this term even though he now is attorney for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1. Wells is not running for reelection.

Carr also held that professional roller derby contests are not taxable under the Admissions Tax Law of Texas; and that "concrete containers" to be used as burial vaults, in garden-type cemeteries to keep graves from settling, are funeral merchandise under state law and are not exempt as crypts or mausoleums.

Appointments

Gov. John Connally has appointed George Dowlen of Canyon as Criminal District Attorney of Randall County. He succeeds the late Truett G. Hull Jr. Connally also picked Paul N. Howell of San Antonio to succeed E. E. Voight on the San Antonio River Authority Board. Howell, an oilman, also is director of the San Antonio HemisFair.

Palmetto Dam Project

Edna and Ganado area people packed a Water Commission hearing room when Bureau of Reclamation representatives and the Jackson County Flood Control District took up consideration of the proposed Palmetto Bend Dam Project.

Most of those attending the hearing favored construction of the 15-mile dam which would cost \$48,150,000 to build. However, Commission Chairman Joe Carter said no written requests had been received.

Harry Burleigh, area planning engineer of the Bureau of Reclamation, outlined the two-part project. It will begin with construction of a dam across Navidad River to form a reservoir with a capacity of 192,000 acre feet and a conservation level of 44 feet.


Part two of the plan would extend the dam across nearby Post Oak Branch and Lavaca River.

Burleigh said the first phase, if authorized by the Commission, plus the Federal House

and Senate and the people of Jackson County, would satisfy Jackson County's water needs for about 19 years.

Approval of both phases at one time would result in savings, Burleigh stated. But Commissioner Otho Dent was reluctant to consider part two immediately.

Commission, which will write the state's comments on the project, took the matter under advisement after six hours of discussion.

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Annual Navy ROTC Examinations Will Be Given On December 12th

Admiral B. J. Semmes, Jr., Chief of Naval Personnel, announced today that December 12th has been designated as the date for the 19th annual national competitive NROTC examination. Parents and high school officials should remind eligible young high school seniors and graduates to submit

their applications before November 20, 1964.

The Regular NROTC Program, which is designed to supplement the career officer output of the U. S. Naval Academy, offers a wonderful opportunity for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at one of the 52 NROTC colleges and universities which he has chosen. The Navy furnishes tuition, fees and books, plus a retainer of \$50 per month to the NROTC midshipmen. Each summer NROTC midshipmen go on interesting and rewarding training cruises to different parts of the world. After completing his four years college course and all requirements, an NROTC midshipman is commissioned a regular officer in the U. S. Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the operating forces.

The program is open to male high school seniors and graduates who will have reached their 17th but not their 21st birthday on 30 June 1965. Those who make a qualifying score will be interviewed and given thorough medical examinations early in 1965. Approximately 2,000 young men from those remaining in competition will thus be selected to attend college next September to prepare for their Naval careers.

1965 NROTC Bulletins of Information and application forms are available at local high schools and Navy Recruiting Stations or from Chief of Naval Personnel, Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C.

Hunting Season And Bag Limits Set For Migratory Waterfowl

J. Weldon Watson, executive director, announced the 1964-1965 Texas hunting seasons and bag limits on migratory waterfowl as authorized by the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

For duck hunting, under federal regulations, the Commission had a choice of authorizing a 40 consecutive day season with a daily bag of four (4) or a 36 day split season—bag limit four (4); or a 50 day consecutive day season or a 45 day split season each with a reduced daily bag limit of three (3).

The selected regulations represent an increase of five days over last year's duck season. In addition, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's holidays as well as a maximum number of weekends, are included in the open season provided for ducks and coots.

The seasons and limits are as follows:
DUCKS and COOT — Open season, November 25 through January 3.

GEESE and BRANT — Open season, October 31 through January 13.

SANDHILL (Little Brown) CRANES — Open season, October 31 through November 29, in the area west of U. S. Highway 277 from its southern terminus in Del Rio, northward to its junction with U. S. Highway 87 in San Angelo; thence northwesterly along said Highway 87 to the junction with Highway 287 at Dumas; thence northwesterly, following Highway 287 to the point of intersection with Texas-Oklahoma line in Dallam County. Season closed in the remainder of the State.

Bag and possession limits are as listed:

DUCKS — Daily bag limit four (4); possession limit eight (8). The daily bag limit may include not more than two (2) wood ducks, two (2) mallards, two (2) canvasbacks or (a) two (2) redhead ducks or (b) one (1) redhead and one (1) canvasback. The possession limit may include not more than (a) two (2) wood ducks, (b) four (4) mallards, or (c) two (2) canvas-

backs or two (2) redheads.

On American, redbreasted or hooded mergansers, there shall be a daily bag limit of five (5) in the aggregate, including not more than one (1) hooded merganser. The possession limit shall be ten (10) in the aggregate including not more than two (2) hooded mergansers.

COOTS — Daily bag limit ten (10); possession limit twenty (20).

GEESE — Daily bag limit five (5); possession limit five (5). Provided that the limit shall include not more than (a) one (1) Ross' Goose; (b) in alternative, two (2) Canada goose or subspecies; one (1) Canada goose or subspecies and one (1) white-fronted goose, or one (1) white-fronted goose.

SANDHILL (Little Brown) CRANES — Daily bag limit two (2); possession limit two (2).

SHOOTING HOURS on the birds listed will be from sunrise to sunset on all open season days.

Migratory game birds may be taken during their respective open season with bow and arrow, shotgun not larger than ten gauge fired from the shoulder, or by means of falconry.

Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three-shell or less capacity including both magazine and chamber.

The 75-day goose season is the maximum period under federal regulations.

Hunters are reminded that one fully feathered wing must be retained on all harvested migratory game birds in the field or while in transit to the

abode of the hunter or to a place of public storage.

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
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

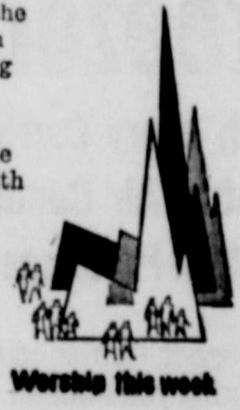


King of the Mountain

Area Men Called For Pre-Induction Physical Exam

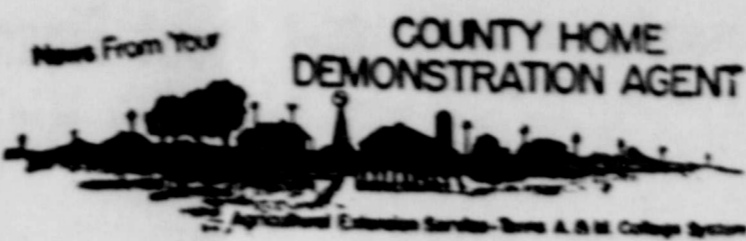

HOME ECONOMIC NEWS
Homemakers can save valuable kitchen minutes during the holiday season by thawing the holiday turkey in the refrigerator. It takes about two days for a large turkey and at least overnight for smaller ones to thaw. Turkey time is anytime, and the birds are low in price, too. This is because a larger-than-usual crop of turkeys was produced last year.

Whether it's served hot or cold, turkey is cool meat—because it is low in calories and especially low in high carbohydrates. Turkey meat is highest of any meat or poultry in body-building proteins—another good reason to serve it often. It's equally tasty served cold, sliced for sandwiches or in salads.

After cooking, the tender light and dark meat can be stripped from the bones to serve in many ways. It can add zest and flavor to early fall menus.
