Committee Needs Financial Help For 4-H & FFA Stock Show Prizes

The finance committee for Mills County Stock Show issued an appeal this week for contributions to provide prizes for the annual show scheduled here January 8 and 9.

Col. V. Z. Cornelius, finance chairman, told the Eagle Tuesday that approximately 500 letters were mailed out over the weekend to interested farmers, ranchers and business firms asking for their annual contribution.

General Election Will Be Held Tuesday November 3

The General Election will be held in Mills County next Tuesday, November 3.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m.

Mills County voters will cast their ballots in all of the 18 boxes as they have been doing for many years. The five small voting boxes that have been annexed with other voting precincts will be open as usual through this general election, or any other special election that should be called until next February 1, when the change in voting boxes becomes effective.

While there is little special interest here in state, district or local offices in the campaign, a record number of voters are

expected to turn out for the presidential election.

Political activity with respect to the offices of president and vice-president is picking up steam. Also there is considerable interest in the U. S. Senator's race.

Campaign workers for both Democratic and Republican presidential tickets are actively working in the county and are expected to continue until election day.

The ballot for Mills County this year contains five columns in the following order. Democratic Party, Republican Party, Constitution Party, Independent and Write-In.

In addition to the five col-

umns for political parties, independent and write-ins, the ballot also contains three proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on.

The Democratic Party has a full list of candidates for all offices to be filled from President down to the precinct level.

Republican Party column has candidates for the offices of president and vice-president, U. S. Senator, Congressman-at-large, U. S. Representative, governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, commissioner of agriculture, commissioner of general land office, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, railroad commissioner, unexpired term and associate justice, supreme court, place 1.

The Constitution Party has candidates for the office of president and vice-president, U. S. Senator, congressman-at-large, governor, lieutenant governor, commissioner of agriculture, comptroller of public accounts, and state treasurer.

There are no candidates listed in the Independent column.

AMENDMENTS

Voters will decide on three changes in the state Constitution.

On the ballot, as "for" or "against" propositions, are what could be the 156th, 157th, and 158th amendments, to the 1876 Constitution.

None has stirred up much debate.

PROPOSALS

In their order, the amendments would:

1. Remove the legislature's authority to transfer up to 1 per cent of the permanent school fund annually to the available school fund.

2. Require notice to the public and to the Texas Water Commission of intent to introduce legislation creating or substantially altering a conservation and reclamation district.

3. Authorize the legislature to enact a program, under the federal Kerr-Mills Act, of financial help for Texans 65 or older who are not on the old age assistance rolls but who can't pay for medical services.

Since 1891 the legislature has had power to shift not more than 1 per cent a year of the permanent school fund into the available school fund for current state school aid expenses. It has used this authority 12 times.

The Goldthwaite Eagle B team came up with an outstanding 34-12 victory over the Marble Falls Mustangs here Thursday night.

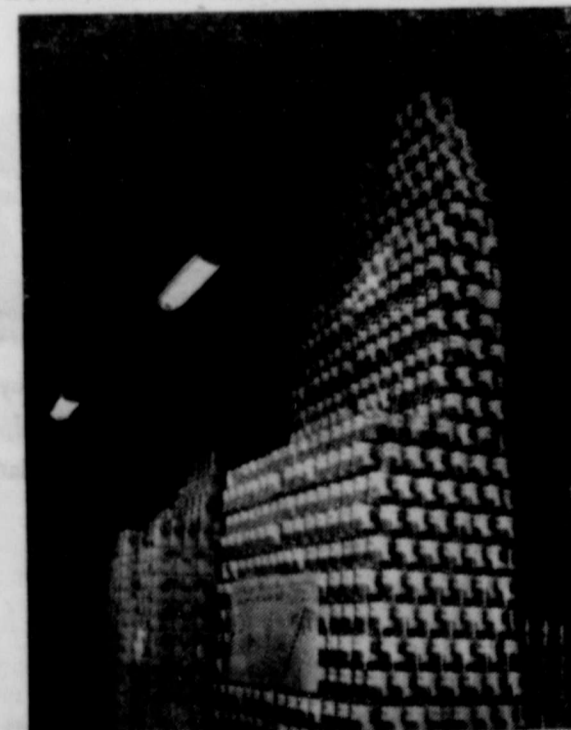

PITTSBURGH PAINTS keep that look longer

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Austin, Texas—A top finance authority on state government is hopeful that the tax bill written by the 1965 Legislature will be smaller than many advance predictions have indicated.

Jim McGrew, research director for Texas Research League, said \$35,000,000 a year in new revenue ought to cover the bulk of Gov. John Connally's higher education program, teacher pay raises and about 40 per cent of the budget increases sought by state agencies.

McGrew, who addressed Austin's chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, made these "guesstimates":

—About \$625,000,000 will be available for general revenue spending next biennium, including an \$83,000,000 surplus at the end of the present fiscal period. That's \$153,000,000 above the present level.

—With no new taxes at all, the Legislature could provide up to \$120,000,000 in additional general revenue spending for higher education and maybe \$45,000,000 more for state departments and agencies.

—An added \$60,000,000 plus in revenue (per biennium) would finance the state's \$74,000,000 share of a \$45-a-month pay raise for public school teachers as well.

Texas Commissioner on Higher Education recommended \$89,000,000 more for higher education from general revenue. Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School recommended an increase of \$165,000,000. But it suggested doubling tuitions which would reduce the general revenue hike to \$120,000,000. State Hospitals and Special Schools, the judiciary and other state agencies have put in for \$112,000,000 more than the current budget.

Asked where additional money likely would come from, both McGrew and his boss, League Director Alvin A. Burger, noted that restoration of the \$2.75 corporation franchise tax rate, removal of exemptions in the present sales tax or raising of the rate would be big revenue producers. They made no recommendation.

A-G Opinions

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr clarified an earlier opinion and held that a county can spend money on transportation surveys for development of county road systems.

In a torrent of other opinions released recently, Carr held that:

County judges are required to call elections for creating mosquito control districts on petition of 200 voters.

A veteran discharged at his own request before termination of his enlistment is not eligible for benefits under the Hazelwood (aid to college students) act.

Guadalupe County can accept roads and public ways of the Treasure Island subdivision without further dedication.

Property optioned for purchase after January 1 should be listed for taxation in optioner's name.

State Veterans Land Board may adopt a rule or regulation authorizing veterans' loans to be prepaid at any time, with interest charged only to date of final payment.

Galveston County can pay for gasoline in private boats used by the sheriff for official duties.

Salary must be paid to persons serving out the unexpired term of a county school superintendent even though the post has been abolished by vote.

Property tax funds can be used for purchase of right-of-way for federal, state and county highways and lateral roads.

A sheriff has authority to award commutation of time for good conduct to a county jail prisoner.

A corporation is entitled to a license from the Texas Liquor Control Board if 51 per cent of its issued stock is owned by persons who have been U. S. citizens and Texas residents for three years and possess other qualifications.

Mosquito control tax levies must be part of the 80-cent

constitutional limit.

Employment Still On Rise

Non-farm employment in July rose to 3,316,300, compared to 3,314,200 in June and 3,255,500 in July, 1963, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

Percentage of job-seekers in the period dropped from 4.4 per cent of the state's potential working force to 4.2 per cent—a healthy change from the 4.8 per cent of jobless in July a year ago.

Estes Probe

A State Department of Public Safety investigation of Billie Sol Estes will continue "until all ramifications" are cleared, Connally told a press conference.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough has challenged authority of the DPS to look into allegations that he received \$50,000 from Estes, who now faces prison sentences for swindling.

Connally said of the DPS: "It has a clear duty and responsibility with respect to law enforcement. It is not a political organization. It has not been used as such, and will not be used as such if I have anything to do with it."

A Yarborough campaign aide, Fagan Dickson of Austin, issued

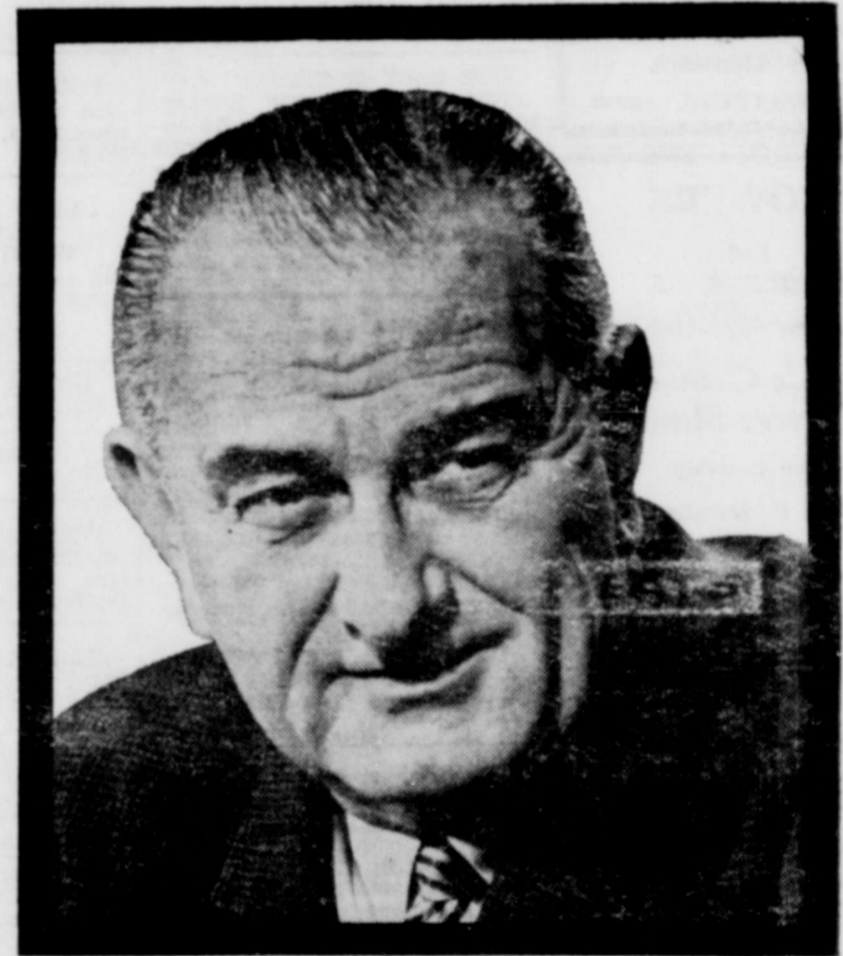

Lampasas Man Named Crew Leader For 1964 Census Of Agriculture

Roger H. Davis of Lampasas, Texas has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. Percy R. Millard, director of the regional office of the U. S. Bureau of the Census at Dallas, announced today. The new crew leader is one of about 1,825 persons throughout the U. S. to receive this appointment.

The new crew leader will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms and ranches in Mills County to collect official census questionnaires from farm operators. Enumeration of all farms in the county will take place in November and early December.

The census will be taken in the following way: Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, will mail census questionnaires to all rural boxholders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold the questionnaires until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At

that time, the enumerator will help answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The crew leader is a key person in conducting a Census of Agriculture. He recruits and trains the enumerators, schedules their work, reviews the accuracy of completed forms, and conducts difficult interviews.

Census of Agriculture is taken every five years ending in "4"

and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventories, and information on farm equipment and improvements and income and some

production expenditures. The information will be published starting in 1965 for states, counties, and the nation.

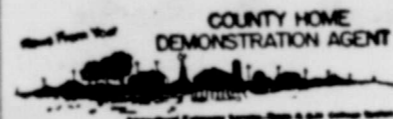
