

"The objective of the drive is twofold," explained Dr. Daniel Bergsma, director of the medical department of The National "More than 250,000 seriously defective children are born each year in this country—one every other minute. Given the facts, the American public will recognize the problem of birth defects for what it is—a national emergency that requires immediate action. We invite the public to help us meet this emergency.

"The second goal is money. With public contributions to the January March of Dimes, we expect to establish the addi-tional March of Dimes-sup-ported birth defects centers desperately needed for the faster diagnosis, evaluation and improved treatment of these defects which cripple or disfigure a child before it's born. Funds are also needed to enable scientists to continue their search for the causes and possible ways to prevent birth de-




