



Although the ringtail ranges over much of the dry Western half of the United States, the biggest population is found right here in Texas.

Despite the fact that thousands of ringtails are killed each year, it is remarkable how little is known about this animal.

"There just isn't enough available information on the ringtail," says Al Springs, coordinator for wildlife restoration with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. "We've ran a study on its food habits, but other than that I can't tell too much about it. Frankly, I doubt whether a majority of Texans even know it exists.'

A dietary analysis made of more than 100 ringtails revealed that about one-fourth of its total intake is composed of tiny mammals like mice and rats, including carrion.

Otherwise, it feeds upon fruits of native plants, birds, snakes, lizards and various insects like spiders, scorpions and ily. It's a carnivore closely kin centipedes. Believe it or not, one of its favorite foods is the common mistletoe which grows inches long, including tail and in mesquite trees.

It isn't unusual to have a ringtail answer a predator call. But considering this diet composition, it sort of makes a person wonder what motivation could possibly prompt the animal to be attracted by the dying-rabbit cries. Perhaps it is curosity more than anything

Mr. Cappleman gave details on a loan being made to a family who operates a small farm near Long Branch, Panola County, which Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman today announced as one of eleven such loans being made throughout the country.

The loan was made to a 57 year old farmer and his wife, parents of 8 children, living near Long Branch, Panola County, Texas: \$2,500 for 15 years to refinance a mortgage which is overdue against his small 25-acre farm, purchase a milk cow and a mule, carry out some land development work and pay operating expenses on his 1965 truck crop which will consist of 21/2 acres of tomatoes and cucumbers. The family of ten also will raise a large garden and some pigs to meet their family food needs. Improvements made with the loan will enable this family to make a 50 per cent increase in their gross income which last year totaled \$1.540. Cappleman said approxi-



Many people in this area are entitled to some social security retirement payments but are not getting them, Jack Calvert, social security district manager in Temple, advised today.

"It isn't necessary to stop working completely in order to get social security retirement benefits," Calvert said, "In fact, you can earn a good deal more than \$1200 and still get some checks."

Giving an example, he said that if a man and his wife are eligible for \$150 a month in social security benefits, he can earn \$2200 annually and still receive \$1050 a year in social security checks.
