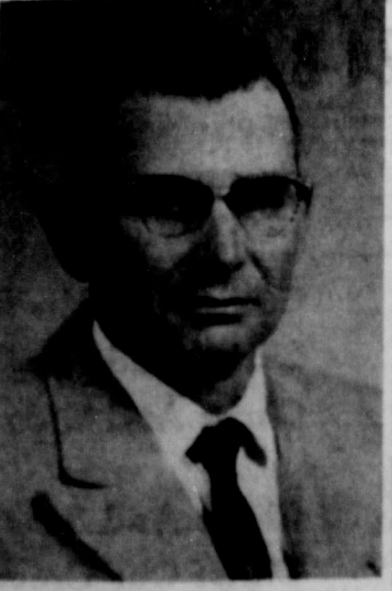


**SCHUSTER HAS CHAMPION GOAT**—Ronald Schuster, 16

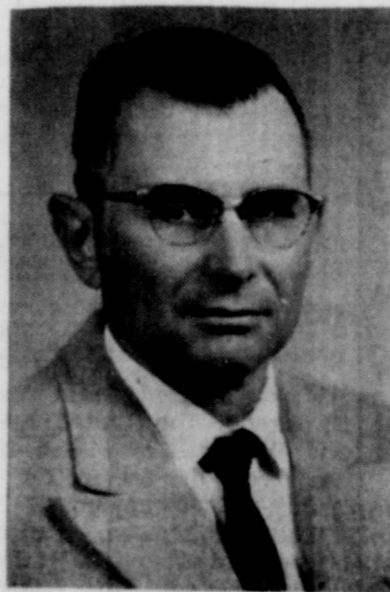

**Home Economics News**

The term "delayed cure" may sound like a health fad, but it actually refers to a new textile process which represents happy news for the family wardrobe.

Wash-Wears finished by this technique have an exceptional ability to retain their shape during and after laundering.

Durable creases and pleats can be set in to last the life of the garment, even after repeated washing.

Slacks, trousers and work pants were the first cotton garments to be made by this new process. Sport shirts, blouses, and dresses are expected on the market this spring, and all-cotton suits are now being developed for men. At present, most of the fabrics used are a blend of cotton with either nylon or polyester fiber.

The finish requires two steps. First, the fabric is treated with thermosetting resin and goes to

the manufacturer to be made into garments—including sharp creases or pleats, if desired.

Then the finished garments are placed in a high-temperature oven to "Cure" the finish by heat. This permanently "Sets" the shape of the entire garment. It also reduces the problem of subsequent seam pucker and eliminates the need for touch-up ironing.

Certain wools are also being treated by a chemical process with a delayed setting similar to that used for cottons and cotton blends. Creases or pleats are made in finished woolen garments, and the setting takes place in a subsequent step—again assuring the durable sharpness so important to a pleated fashion.

House of Representatives overwhelmingly approved the bill to name an 18-member commission to decide which colleges and universities shall teach what, to assign fields of teaching, and to take over state supervision of academic work in the 32 junior colleges.

There were many amendments to the bill by Reps. Dick Cory of Victoria and Charles Wilson of Lufkin. But none diverted the bill from its original purpose as laid out by the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School.

Shoals lie ahead, because some strong senators are against such a delegation of powers, or oppose some phases of the bill as passed by the House. Sen. W. T. Moore of Bryan will handle the measure in the Senate. It is expected to move on it within the next week or so.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman is opposed to some of Connally's programs. This has led to talk of pressure tactics. Forces of Speaker Ben Barnes, who support Connally, may hold up action on Hardeman's bill to transfer San Angelo College to state-supported status on September 1.

Hardeman, long a power in the Senate, heads the Senate Finance Committee which will make the fiscal decisions on many programs. This key position makes it vital to Connally that he have acquiescence, if not support, from Hardeman.

The San Angelo senator, who represents a West Texas region as big as some states, demonstrated his power twice recently. He blocked, at least temporarily, a rule change designed to delay or defeat the \$45 a month teacher pay raise proposed by the Texas State Teachers Association. He also amended the "equal rights for women" bill to make the measure inapplicable to present statutes. A-mended bill passed with Lieut. Gov. Preston Smith breaking 15-15 tie. Sponsor Senator Moore said this amendment ruined the legislation.

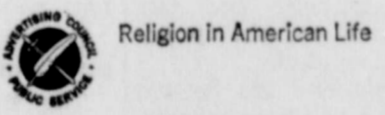
