MULLIN METHODIST REVIVAL HAS NICE CROWD

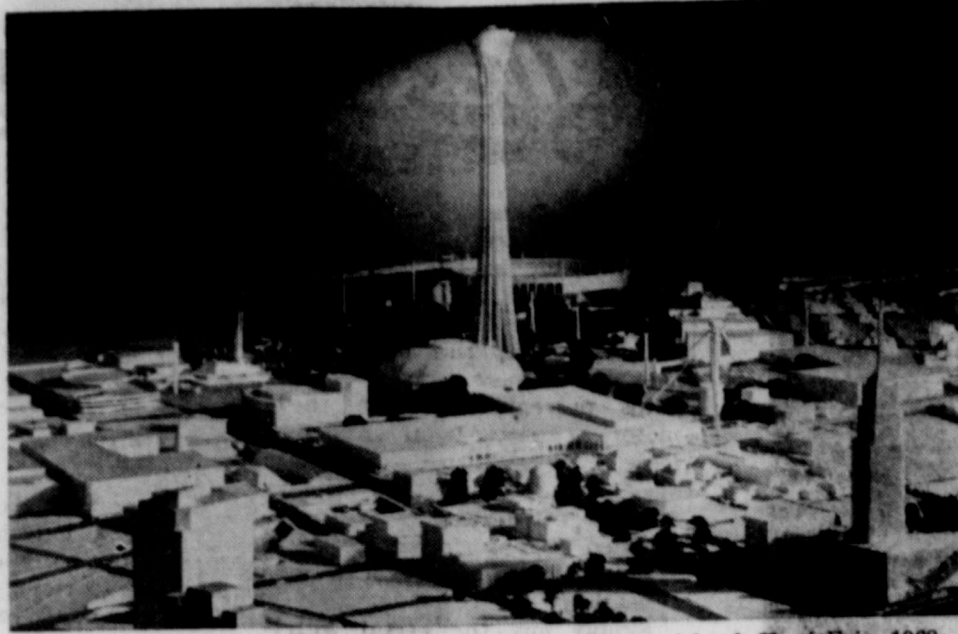

Funeral services for Barney Pyburn, 75, of Cleveland were held in Wilkins Funeral Chapel

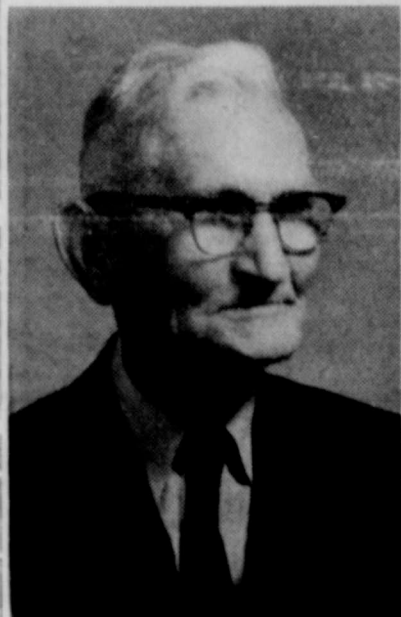

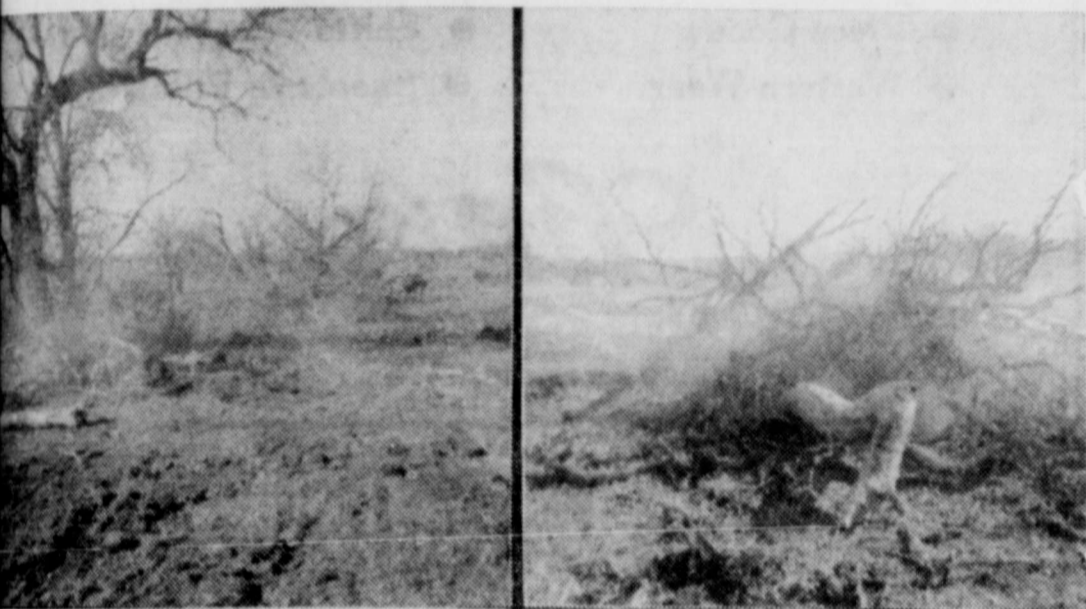

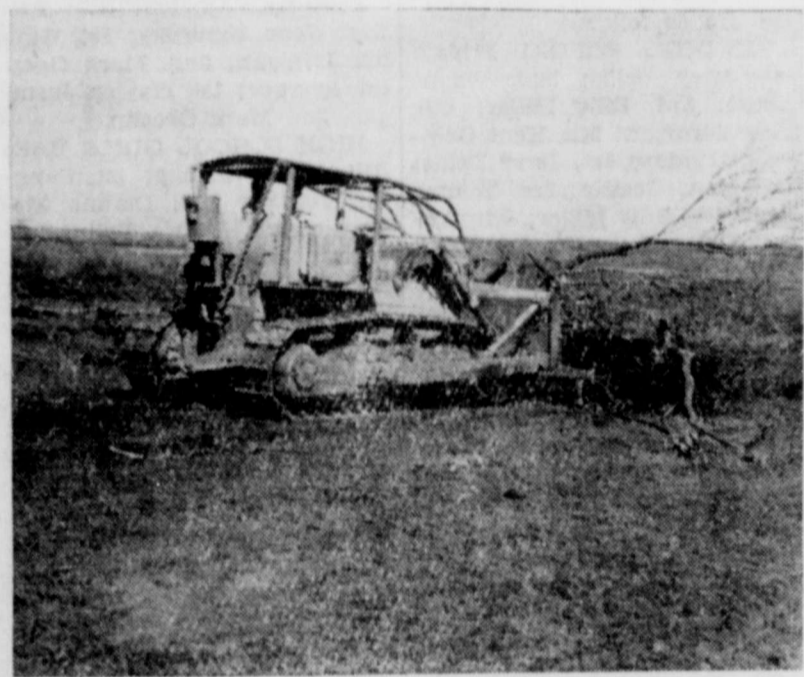


This picture shows step number one with our cat uprooting timber on the R. D. Egger ranch in the Regency community.

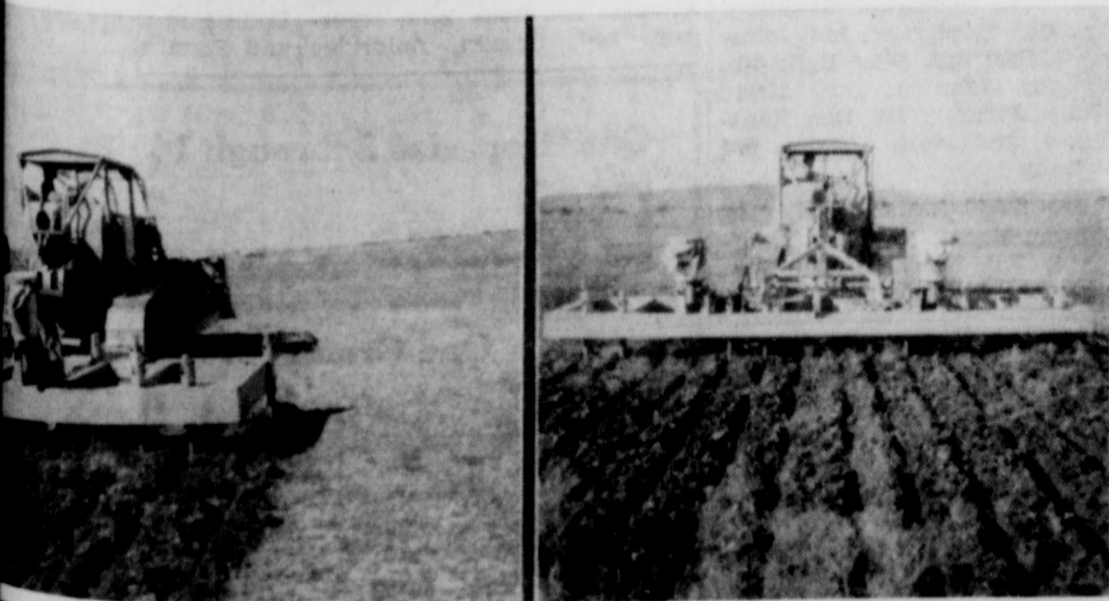
