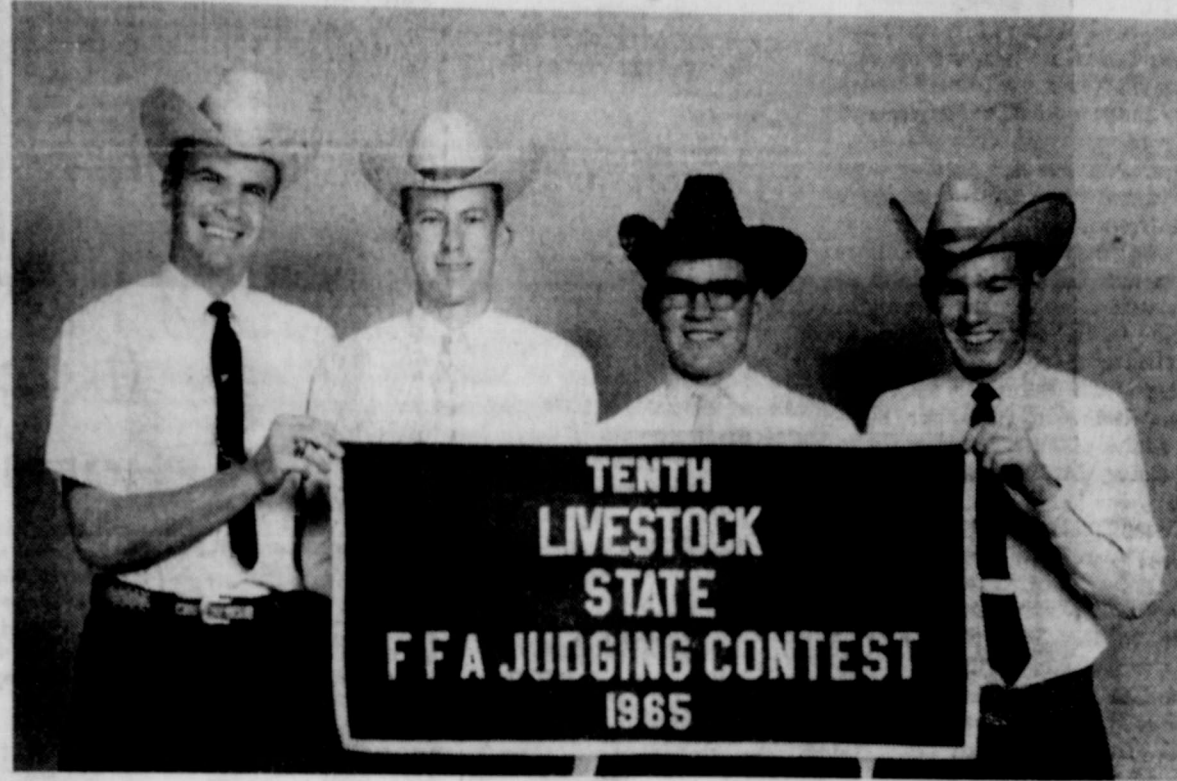
Maintenance Fund Boosted 2.50 As 17 More Contribute

Additional Private Rooms Opened As Hospital Wing Nears Completion

Some additional private patient rooms of Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital were opened this week as construction of the new hospital wing draws closer to the completion date.

Dr. M. A. Childress and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa announced that several private rooms with private baths have been completed and opened for patient use although actual construction of the entire project will not be completed for about 30 days.

Some patients were moved into the new wing Monday.

Work on the new wing is moving ahead as well as some changes in the other part of the building which is part of the construction contract.

Contract for the new wing was let last October. Work was delayed some during the winter months due to cold weather, but, is moving on schedule now.

The new wing, 73 feet by 66 feet, will provide 10 additional beds. There will be six private

rooms with private baths and two double rooms with baths. One of the double rooms will be equipped so that it can be used for isolation patient.

Present capacity of the hospital is 22 patients, with 25 or 26 in emergencies. With the addition the capacity will be 32 patients, and 35 or 36 in case of emergency.

In addition to the eight rooms there will be a new surgery room. It will be larger than present surgery and will have new lighting equipment. Present surgery will be used as hospital records room. It will also have a new obstetrical room and the present one will be converted into new dining room for staff.

There is also a basement which will provide an area for heating and cooling units and allow extra space for storage.

The school district owns 50 acres and the Rodeo Arena will use approximately five acres. The plans were approved by the school board earlier.

Purpose of the project is for the development of the youth of Mills County and Central Texas. All improvements will become the property of the Goldthwaite FFA Chapter, officials stated.

Truett Auldridge was appointed finance chairman to raise \$5,000 which is the goal of the association for the project.

Approximately \$1,400.00 was raised at the meeting, either by cash donations, pledges, labor, equipment or material, it was announced Tuesday.

The association set annual dues at \$2.50 per member. The Goldthwaite FFA Chapter will help conduct the membership drive.

Don Geeslin was re-elected president of the association. Dick Hughes was elected a director to replace Logan Adams.

Thirty-seven members paid their dues at the meeting Monday night.

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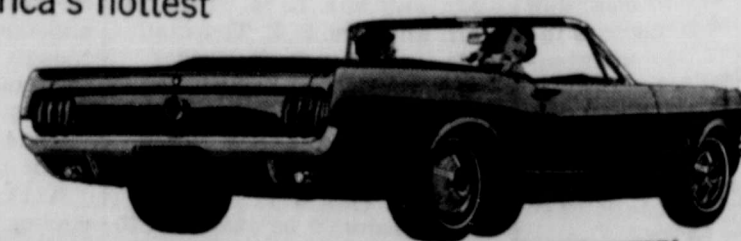

HOME ECONOMIC NEWS

More spring vegetables are moving to your market now as more production areas are shipping produce.

Here are some tips to help in preparing and cooking these fresh vegetables to get the most nutrition from them.

Trim sparingly such greens as cabbage and head lettuce. Remember that dark outer leaves are rich in iron, calcium, and vitamins.

Cook potatoes in their skins to start such dishes as hash-browned potatoes or potato salad. The jackets help retain the nutrients.

Fresh vegetables are best when cooked quickly and served hot. The longer they are exposed to heat and air, the more vitamin C they lose.

When boiling vegetables, use as little water as possible. Some vitamins and minerals cook out into the water, and losses are greater when a large amount of water is used. Whenever practicable, serve any remaining cooking liquid with the vegetable, or use it in a sauce, gravy, or soup.

When using boiling guides for fresh vegetables, keep in mind that vegetables may require shorter or longer cooking than given, depending upon quality and variety.

Be especially careful not to overcook vegetables when using a pressure cooker. Follow the cooking times that come with the cooker.

Use Foil To Reflect Heat

Aluminum foil, that all-purpose "Handy Andy" of the camper, can make you an efficient camp oven.

Also, it can double as a fire reflector in cold weather.

Here's how to do it: Drive four 18-inch stakes in a square around your campfire. Leave one side open to stoke the fire and handle the food. Fasten the foil to the stakes to cover the other three sides. Make a top of small, straight, interwoven, green sticks and cover with foil. Secure top to the four stakes.

Foil surfaces reflect heat, creating high, even temperatures even with a small ember fire.

To Break A Gun-Shy Dog

Nothing is more dismal than to watch the terror of a gun-shy dog. His fear completely ruins him for hunting.

Break this habit by taking him to a trapshoot, or skeet range. Hold dog on leash, well back from the firing. As he gets used to gunfire from that distance, move him up closer.

TO THE PEOPLE OF MILLS COUNTY:

The most important, pressing issue to be considered in the Legislature these next two weeks will be the legislation proposing a teacher pay raise. The two plans presently being considered are commonly referred to as the "T. S. T. A. Bill" (which is the Texas State Teacher's Association) and the "Governor's Bill" (the plan advocated by Governor John Connally). Both plans will require a major tax bill, with the T. S. T. A. plan costing the state \$97,000,000 over the next two years, while the Governor's plan will cost the state \$68,000,000.

In order that you might better understand the plans, I have had the legislative assistants representing both sides prepare a statement as follows:

T. S. T. A. Plan: by L. P. Sturgeon, legislative director: "The '45 in '65' teacher salary plan pending in the Texas Legislature does two things:

- (1) It provides an increase of \$45 per month (\$405 per year) in the minimum salary schedule for public school teachers.
- (2) It contains the present cooperative financing feature of the Gilmer-Aikin laws, with the state paying 80 per cent of the MINIMUM program and the local district 20 per cent.

The present minimum schedule offers \$4,014 to a beginning teacher with a BA degree and \$4,239 for a master's degree. The '45 for '65' plan would increase these starting salaries to \$4,419 and \$4,644, respectively.

Texas is now almost \$800 below the national average salary paid classroom teachers. This proposed \$405 increase still would leave Texas below average this year, while other states are making plans to again increase their salaries next year in order to provide enough qualified teachers."

Governor's Plan: by Larry Temple, legislative assistant:

"Governor Connally's teacher pay proposal would provide \$68 million in benefits to the teachers during the next two years.

Higher pay raises would be granted to the more experienced and better trained teachers. Selective pay raises of up to \$1,000 per teacher could be granted as decided by local school boards according to local needs; or funds provided by selective increases could be distributed by the local boards as
