Three Men Charged After Burglary and Pickup Stolen Here Sunday Nite

Three men have been placed under arrest after Moreland Hardware was burglarized and a pickup truck was stolen here Sunday night. The burglary and theft took place in San Saba Sunday night shortly after midnight.

The three were returned from Dallas at 5:30 a. m. Tuesday morning by Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks and two Texas Rangers. The officers went to Dallas Monday night about 9:00 p. m. to pick up the three men from Dallas police officers.

Barlow, who was in the pickup, was stopped in San Saba by night watchman Oda Hyatt, 57, who was shot through the pickup door with the 30-30 Winchester rifle taken from the Goldthwaite store, according to officers. The shooting took place about 1:30 a. m. Monday.

All four guns were recovered later Monday from Simpson Creek South of San Saba where they had been thrown into the water.

After the three men split up in Goldthwaite one hitched a ride to Llano, the second drove to Llano in the car they came to Goldthwaite in, and the third met them there after abandoning the pickup he had stolen.

Sheriff Brooks reported they came from Dallas and were to report in Llano for a job on Monday morning. He also reported that they burglarized three business firms in Hamilton en route here.

In learning from one that he had shot the night watchman in San Saba the other two drove him to Austin Monday morning and left him there and they in turn drove to Dallas where they gave themselves up to officers.

\$49,215. In Social Security Benefits Paid To 877 Mills Countians Monthly

Monthly social security benefits in Goldthwaite and Mills County amounted to \$49,215 on January 1, 1965, Jack Calvert, district manager of the Temple social security office announced today. These monthly benefits are received by 877 persons, representing 19.6% of the population of the entire county.

"This money stimulates the city and county business since most of it is spent for food, clothing, and shelter locally," Calvert said. "There is no doubt that these monthly social security benefits help to stabilize the income and spending power

of many of our residents." In the seven counties of Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba served by the Temple district office, 18,190 persons are receiving \$971,800 each month. This comes to a yearly total of \$11,661,600.

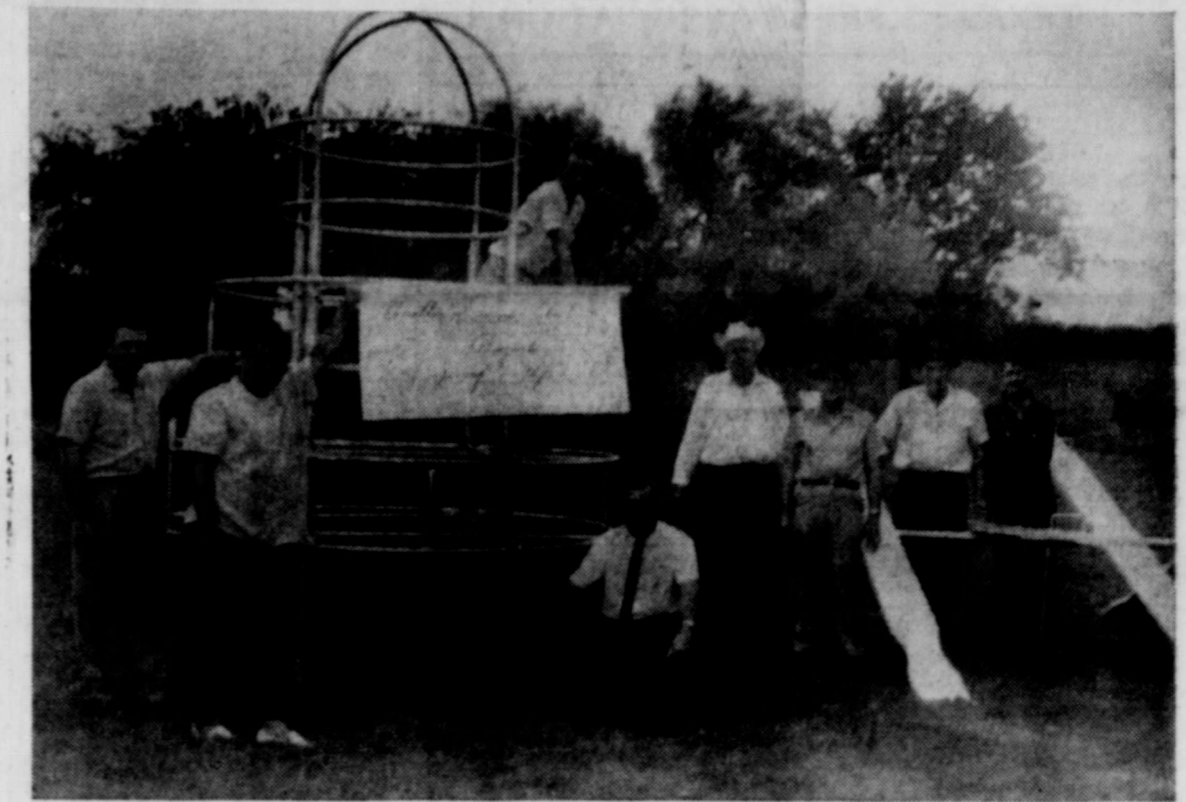

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new wheat farm" allotment for 1966 on a farm which does not have a 1965 wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS County Office during the next few weeks, Edgar L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. Such farmers have until July 1 to file applications for such an allotment.

Producers eligible to file such applications are those with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established, who have no interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, and where the farmer expects to receive more than 50 per cent of his income from total production on the farm.

The historic Mills County Jail in Goldthwaite and Center City Lodge No. 558 at Center City, have been designated as Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks, John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, president of the Texas Historical Survey Committee, announced today.

These awards came with the announcement of the award of an interpretive plate to be placed by the Official Texas Historical Building Medallion which was awarded three years ago. It is sponsored by Mills County Historical Survey Committee.

Having completed the requirements for the Landmarks award, these structures will be noted on a special certificate to be presented by Mrs. John A. Hester, chairman of the Mills County Historical Survey Committee.

The plate for the Mills County Jail states:

"Mills County Jail, 1888. First Structure Built By Newly Organized County, Before County Seat Was Chosen. Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, 1965."

Plate for the Center City Lodge Building states:

"Center City Lodge, Old School. Built 1876. Lumber Hauled from Waco. Site Then Hamilton County.

"Church and School Building For Community Hoping To Be Future County Seat of Mills County.

"Center City Lodge No. 558, A. F. & A. M., Chartered Dec. 16, 1882. Had Following Charter Members: T. N. Berry, Hugh Carroll, A. P. Carson, N. J. Daniel, Jas. Dow, J. P. Grundy, D. I. Haralson, J.
