The Mills County FFA Rodeo Association had announced earlier that donations of live- stock would be accepted as part of their finance drive for \$5,000.00 to pay for the new arena. A number of farmers and ranchers have indicated that they want to donate some sheep or goats to help finance the project.

Association officials and other interested parties held a special meeting last Thursday night and set the date for the stock sale.

There will be no commission charged for selling the animals for this fund.

Stock should be brought to the auction company Thursday afternoon or Friday morning. Anyone needing someone to haul their donated animals is asked to call Layton Black, Truett Aldridge, Don Geeslin or Dick Hughes.

Work Underway For New Track Field For Goldthwaite High School

Work is underway for a new track field for Goldthwaite High School athletic department. It was announced this week by W. T. "Buddy" Rountree, president of the Goldthwaite Quarterback Club.

The project is being sponsored by the Quarterback club with the help from many interested individuals. It will be located west of the elementary school. Earth moving got started about 10 days ago for the new track which is part of a long range program to provide a new track and football field for the schools.

Grain Crop Off One-Third Due To Late, Heavy Rains

Mills County farmers are completing their harvest operations this week with a grain crop approximately one-third off from last year's bumper crop of wheat and oats.

Many observers state that while this year's wheat and oat crop is off from last year, it still is a good crop for Mills County farmers in general.

Most of the oats are being placed in the barns by farmers while the wheat crop is being sold as a cash crop.

The cut in yield per acre in wheat was described as resulting principally from rust which observers say cut the yield about one-third.

In the Priddy area wheat reportedly made 12 to 20 bushels per acre with average approximately 18 bushels. Some fields made more than 20 bushels.

In other sections of the county wheat yields were reported up to 25 and 30 bushels per acre while a few reported less than 10 bushels.

Yields in oats per acre suffered from the rains coming just a little late and then too much. This resulted in much of the crop falling which made it a problem to pick up with the combines.

This condition, some farmers report, caused a loss of from 10 to 20 bushels per acre in oats.

Yield in oats ran up to 65 and 80 bushels per acre, according to reports to the Eagle office. County Agent George Reese said there was considerable 40 bushel oats this year. Last year there was a lot of 60 bushel oats.

Wet fields due to heavy May rains held up the start of harvesting this year. A good many fields still have areas where combines cannot operate because of seeping conditions.

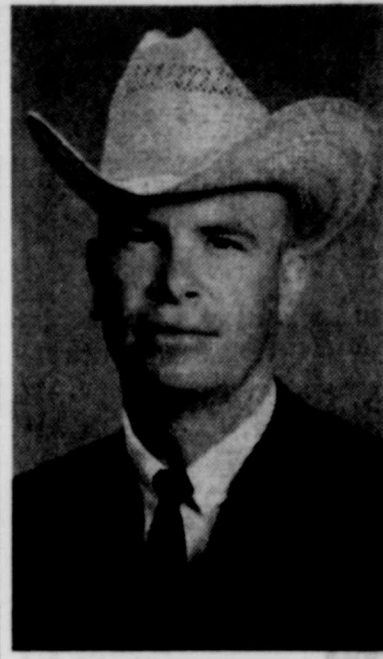
Layton Black Leaves Faculty To Join Mills County Feed & Supply

Atty General Names Wayne House To Youth Conference On Crime

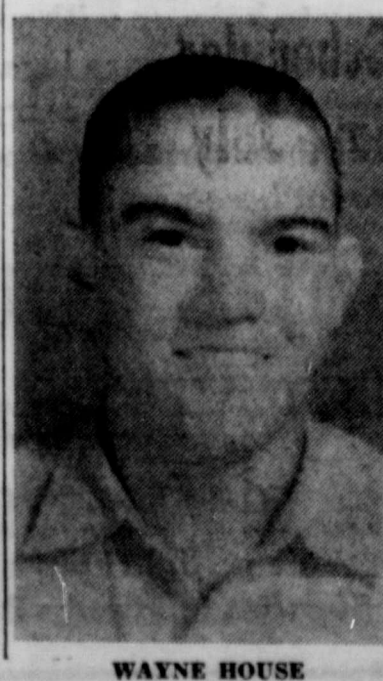

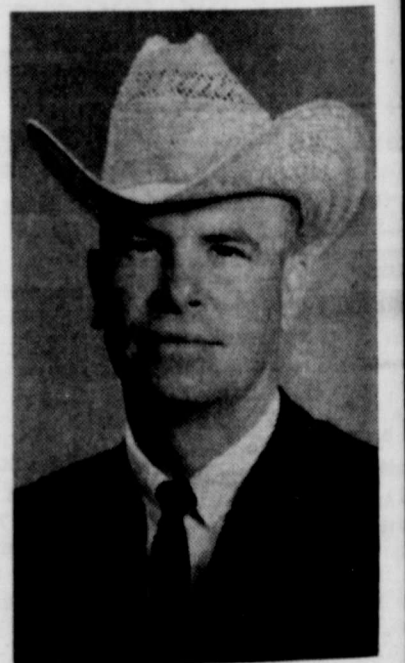



PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:
"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."
"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."
"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."
