Rank Of Eagle Scout Goes To Glen R. Dunlap, Jr., In Nebraska

Glen R. Dunlap, Jr., a member of Troop 457, received the rank of Eagle Scout in a Court of Honor ceremony June 7, at Peter Sarpy School in Bellevue, Nebraska. Dr. J. Harry Murphy, assisted by cubscouts J. Beck and D. Perry, presented the Eagle award. Mr. Paul Zorad presented the Eagle trophy.

The son of Lieutenant Colonel and Mrs. Glen R. Dunlap, Headquarters, Strategic Air Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, Glen met and mastered the strenuous physical, mental, and moral requirements that becoming an Eagle Scout entail. Between May 1962 and March 1965 he earned 21 merit badges and in November 1964, after one year of continuous study, he received the "God and Country" award.

Glen began his scouting career in 1959 at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, at the age of eight. After progressing through the Cub Scout ranks he was invested as a Tenderfoot Scout in March 1962. He earned the rating of Life Scout in December 1963 after moving to Offutt where he has also proven his leadership abilities as Patrol leader, assistant senior Patrol leader, and senior Patrol leader. Glen is a member of the eighth grade at Bellevue Junior High School. This year he served on the student council and

Gala 4th Of July At Fredericksburg To Feature Horse Races

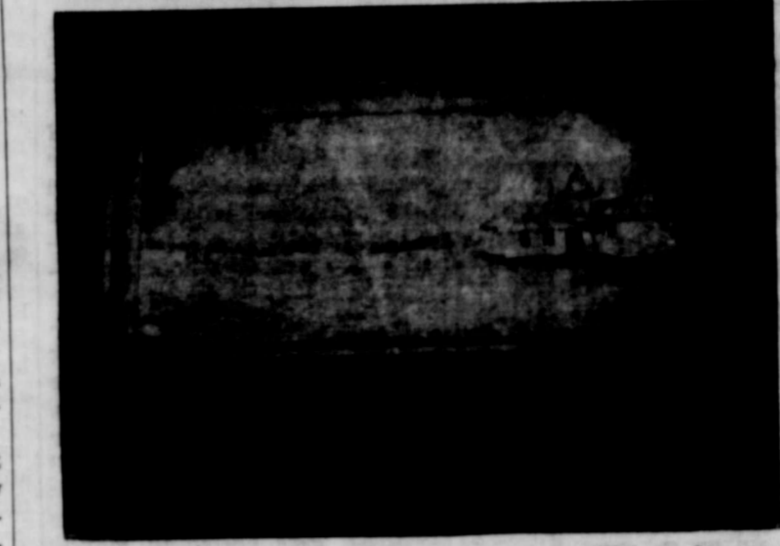

Texas Safety Association Issues July 4th, "Accidental Death Alert"

The Texas Safety Association today issued its annual "Accidental Death Alert" for the July 4th holiday period and called on Texans to put safety first in all activities.

"Holidays can be a time to remember, or a time of tragedy," S. Ross Carr of Houston, TSA President, said. "It often depends on knowing and using your safety rules—whether you are driving on the highways, spending the weekend at the lake, or just relaxing at home."

The TSA "Accidental Death Alert" begins at 12:01 a. m. Friday and ends at 11:59 p. m. Sunday. It coincides with the Department of Public Safety's traffic accident watch—"Operation Motorcade."

The Association is coordinating its traffic safety program with the DPS and other state agencies. Subject for the TSA safety promotion is "Courtesy and Caution."

"Adding courtesy to caution, can take you a long way in traffic. Your attitude about your driving and that of other drivers has a profound effect on the possibilities of your being involved in an accident," Carr said.

"Treat other drivers the way you want to be treated — with courtesy."

In addition to issuing traffic warnings, the Association has urged care in recreational activities, especially those associated with water.

"Boating enthusiasts should take all safety precautions when putting their crafts into crowded waters. Carry a life preserver for everyone on board.

Don't overload your craft with too many passengers, and watch for swimmers, water skiers and other boats," Carr advised.

He reminded homeowners to be on the alert for the backyard-variety accidents and advised parents to be on guard for fireworks accidents.

"If your celebration calls for a backyard barbecue, be sure to use caution in handling starter fluids. Treat fires with respect. Keep a water hose handy to put out any fire that gets out of control," he said.

"Parents should take charge of any fireworks displays. Keep small children at a safe distance and supervise the handling of fireworks by older children.

"Even those harmless looking little sparklers can be dangerous. They burn at a temperature of 1,650 degrees, which is nearly hot enough to melt copper."

In concluding, Carr stated that each year many lives are lost during holidays simply because people put away their safety rules for the occasion.

"But, the fact is," he said, "there just aren't any holidays on accidents!"

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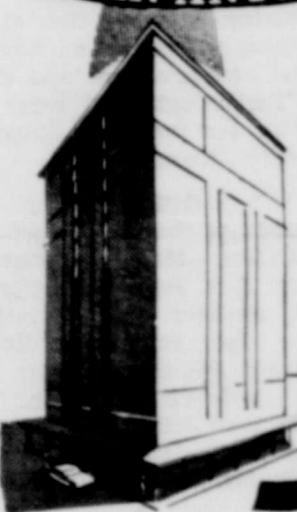

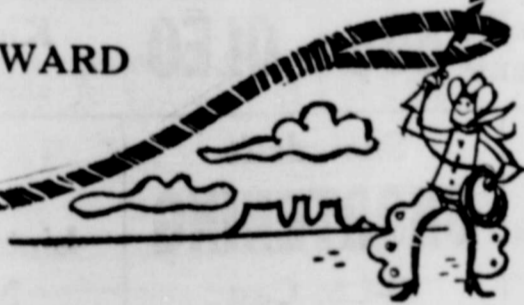

AUSTIN, Texas—Two of the three redistricting plans passed by the last Legislature soon will come under courtroom attacks.

In a legislative redistricting case in Houston, motions will be filed asking that the new plan for dividing Texas into 150 districts for the House of Representatives be declared unconstitutional.

State Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr. has announced that the Harris County plaintiffs in the Congressional redistricting case, headed by George Bush, will drop out of active roles in the case because that county was treated fairly in the redistricting plan.

But the Republicans plan to bring in new plaintiffs from Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, Midland, Ector, Jefferson, Orange and Brazoria Counties to try to convince the three-judge federal court in Houston that the new law violates several apportionment principles.

On legislative redistricting, state Reps. Jake Johnson of San Antonio and Robert C. Eckhardt of Houston, who joined in the suit which led to present reapportionment procedures being declared unconstitutional, will ask the court to say that the new plan violates the U. S. Constitution, too.

Main attack is expected to be purely on the question of whether county-wide districts with more than one legislator serve to discriminate against minority racial and political groups.

No attack is expected on the plan passed to divide the Texas Senate into 31 new districts.

Auto Rates To Go Up
A State Insurance Board public hearing confirmed the earlier warning that auto insurance

rates will go up an average of some 13.4 per cent on August 1.

Actually, new rates for property damage, liability and collision lines carried by most motorists will be increased more than 20 per cent in most areas.

A rising toll from traffic accidents is blamed for the hike. Insured drivers paid \$404,000,000 in premiums last year against \$198,000,000 settled by companies on claims. Another \$16,000,000 in pay-outs is pending. Board decides premiums should go up when more than 63 cents of the premium dollar goes to pay claims and adjustment costs.

Building, Sales Down
Texas building and retail sales dropped off in May, according to UT's Bureau of Business Research.

Sales fell off about one per cent from the April level, in contrast to a normal seasonal gain of about three per cent. The January-May total is four per cent above the same period for 1964 but has not kept pace with the nationwide increase. Trade is expected to improve with repeal of federal excise taxes.

Building authorizations decreased 13 per cent last month to the second-lowest level in the last 12 months.

Courts Speak
State Supreme Court affirmed Court of Civil Appeals finding that the two-year-old law which placed bonded liquor exporters along the Mexico border under state regulation is unconstitutional.

In two separate opinions — from Harris and Matagorda counties — court held that holders of hurricane insurance policies which specifically excluded water damage coverage could not collect for flood water damages to their homes from the Sept. 11, 1961, Hurricane Carla.

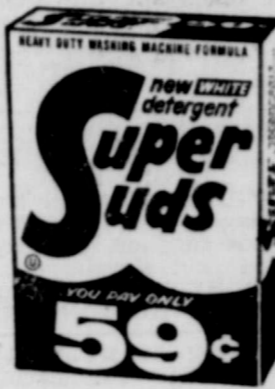

Four Times To Consult Social Security Office

"There are four times when it is very important to consult your social security office," Jack Calvert, social security district manager in Temple, said today. "One of these is when a worker in your family dies. It is important to find out whether survivors insurance benefits are payable."

Calvert went on to say that monthly social security payments can be made to certain dependents of a worker upon his death. Some of these dependents are: unmarried children under 18 years of age, or who were disabled before 18; widows; and dependent widowers. There are also times when payments can be made to the dependent parents of the deceased.

In addition, a lump-sum death payment may be made to the widow or widower who was living with the deceased at the time of death, or it can go toward payment of the worker's burial expenses.

"Remember," Calvert concluded, "it is most important, when someone in your family dies, to get in touch with your social security office." The Temple social security office is located at 210 West Central Avenue, Telephone number PRospect 8-1861.

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Tagged Cat Has A Ball In 30 Day Trip

A seven and one quarter pound flathead catfish, tagged and released in the new Canyon Lake near New Braunfels, must have had a premonition that its days were numbered because it really ate its way forty-five river miles upstream on the Guadalupe River before it was caught thirty days later and two and three quarter pounds heavier.

This was revealed by Dick White, fishery biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, who said it was very unusual for a catfish to gain so much weight in such a short time.

He said the traveling urge probably was accentuated by periodic rises in the Guadalupe, and that the upstream foray doubtless was inspired by instinctive desire to explore new feeding areas.

The flathead, known in the records as Number 7609, had a contrasting experience with two others among eighteen cats tagged and released at the reservoir damsite on April 29. One was caught the next night and the other two nights later.

White complimented Neil Ohrt, who caught Number 7609 the night of May 28 on a trotline on the Walter Dierks Ranch near Berhelm, for alertly informing White of the catch, thus contributing to fish management research.

White invited fishermen catching any of the missing 15 flatheads to send the tag, along with information on the weight of the fish, its length and where caught to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas.
