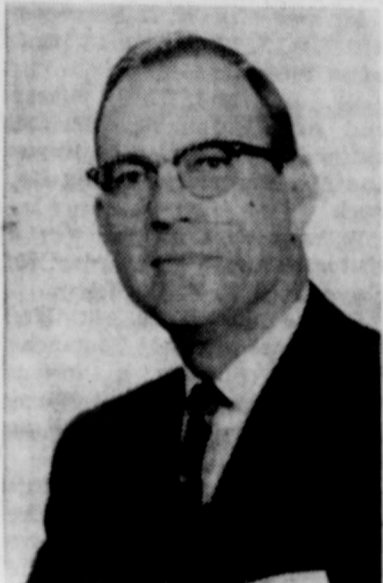

School Board Meets Monday

Members of the Goldthwaite school board held their regular meeting Monday night in the high school office.

Bills were approved and tentative budget was discussed. Official budget will come up for approval at a later date.

The board agreed to act as the sponsoring body for the Community Action Program for the Mills County area.

TAX LEVY
Tax levy for the new school year was approved by the school board at \$1.80 per \$100 valuation. Last year it was \$1.75. The tax levy for local maintenance was changed from \$1.20 to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation while the interest and sinking fund for bonded indebtedness remains at 55¢, the same as last year.

The five cents increase for local maintenance had become necessary because of the new teacher pay raise legislation and increased costs in general operations of the district, officials announced.

President's Economic Opportunity Program Discussed Thursday

The President's Economic Opportunity program was discussed at a special meeting held here last Thursday night.

J. C. Petty, Supt. of Schools, San Saba, explained the program and the various projects to the local group.

Mills County has been tentatively approved in a four county set-up with Lampasas, Llano and San Saba counties, it was announced last week.

Approximately two dozen persons attended the meeting.

The group went on record authorizing the four school superintendents in Mills County to select a board of directors to represent Mills County as application will be made to participate in the program.

Former Mills Countian Tells Of Trip To Greece

(Editor's Note: The following account of a Trip to Greece is part of a letter to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Venable from their daughter, Mrs. F. M. Philips, the former Theresa Venable.)

The Philips family has returned to this country after three years in Turkey where he was employed to coordinate the Regional Insect Control Program for Turkey and the Middle East. They arrived in New York June 25th. After leaving Turkey the Philipses visited Greece, Rome, Geneva, and London. They sailed from Southampton, England, the 18th on the S. S. United States. They will live in Falmouth, Mass., where Mr. Philips will continue to work as an entomologist.

The Eagle printed parts of another letter that was written earlier and described the Philips family's travels through Turkey.)

A Visit To Athens

Dear Mother and Daddy:
I had a wonderful trip to Greece and would like to describe it to you and share it with you as far as it is possible in a letter. There were twenty of us who traveled together to attend a Protestant Women's Rally held in Athens. The women who attended the rally came from Greece, Turkey and the island of Crete.

We left Ankara Airport at 7:20 a. m., October 14th. We landed and cleared the customs at Izmir, Turkey. Izmir is the city known as Smyrna in New Testament times. We arrived in Athens at 10:45 a. m. Chaplain Hughes and Chaplain Deming met us. Chaplain Hughes is from Ankara and Chaplain Deming resides in Athens. After customs clearance we took a bus for a thirty minute drive to the Hotel Acropole Palace, one of the finest in Athens. The lounges and dining rooms are beautiful, and the rooms are very comfortable and nicely furnished and our only complaint was a shortage of hot water. Our afternoon was free, so several of us took advantage of this to shop. Greece is famous for their fine furs, handmade linens, woolen goods, pottery, wood carvings, brass objects, and other things.

We took all our meals in the beautiful dining room. I found the food similar to the food in Turkey. The meals each day were there were the same except breakfast. We had either mushroom or chicken soup and it was very good, also fillet of fish, the main course, with car-

rots, green squash, potatoes, chicken done in tomato sauce or you could have veal cutlets that tasted more like mutton. You could have pear, apple or grapes for dessert. The bread was the same dark, unsliced bread we have here in Ankara, remained dark on the hillside where we were sitting. It was an effect from the lights and changing sounds from stereo recordings. stantly changing as the story of the Golden Age of Athens was narrated. The voices of both men and women came from different directions, sometimes the sounds of crowds. We heard the sound of hoofbeats of a rider's horse from far off but getting closer and closer and the rider was bringing a message of a battle. Sometimes there was only the sound of music but finally the Persians burned the Acropolis using flaming arrows to light the fires. During this spectacle the light inside the temples with the Parthenon always the most outstanding were a deep red. This show was wonderful to see and to hear. This Golden Age of Greece, more than four hundred years before Christ left all mankind a priceless heritage of philosophy, art, science and literature.

That evening we went to a hillside across the valley from the Acropolis. We were going to a program called "Sound and Light" that is performed each evening during the warm months. It is done in English one hour and French at another hour. The night was warm and still and we sat on a hillside, looking across at the Acropolis in all her ancient glory on the highest hilltop. The lights faded away and from the darkened hillside a trumpet sounded out and was followed by another closer to us. Then the lights came back to the old temples on the Acropolis and majestic music traveled across the hills. It Breakfast consisted of bread, butter and jam with coffee or tea. I preferred Nescafe which they offered instead of their coffee. This Nescafe is a lot like Express that we had in Italy. The price for dinner was \$2.65 and rather expensive. Breakfast was included in cost of the room.
