Former Mills Countian Tells Of Trip To Greece

Thursday morning we went to a Greek Evangelical Church, where we had been invited to hold our meeting. There were 114 women from Ankara, Izmir, Istanbul, Crete and the ones from Athens. The pastor, Rev. Michael Kyriakakes, led our opening prayer. Our business session was short.

This is a large area with poor communications and there are many problems to function as a group. This is the second meeting of this kind. Our speaker was Dr. Dorothy Bucklin and she is making 25 rallies in Europe and ours was the farthest east of all of them. She brought a vital up to date message to women of today. Our offering was given to the host church to help buy a cross to put on top of their building. The Protestant Church in Greece is treated much like it is in Spain. The Orthodox Church is the State religion or rather it is the official state supported church. The Evangelical Church where we had our meetings, is one hundred years old. For the past twenty years this church has tried to get permission to erect a cross on their building. They had just received permission to do so when we arrived. The church building looked good to us from Moslem lands where a Christian Church of any kind is never seen. We contributed \$150.00 to assist this congregation in improving their building, but they still need about \$4,000.00 to complete it.

This will enable producers to do a better job in selecting Angora goats for their ranches.

Members of the Jaycees and members of the Future Farmers chapter will sponsor a Sheep Dog Trial at 8 p. m. at the new FFA Rodeo Arena. Everyone is invited to come and watch the dogs work. Those who have sheep dogs are invited to bring them for the event.

Mr. Straley, a native of Callahan County, has been serving as highway patrolman in Brady the past three years. Before then he was stationed in Cameron. He has been with the highway patrol for nearly 10 years.

The Mills County highway patrol office will be headquartered in the sheriff's office in the courthouse.

This is an approved highway patrol station for Mills County and it is the first time that Mills County has had a resident patrolman.

In the past Mills County has been served along with San Saba County by patrolman Jesse Askey who took care of the two county area.

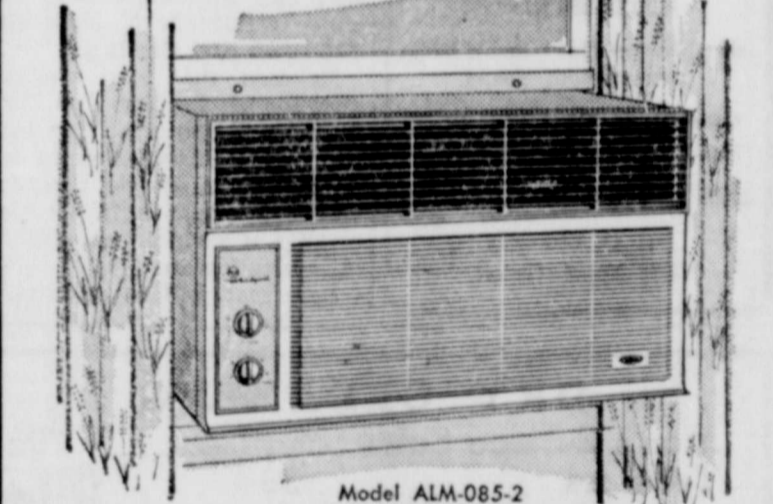

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

A Trip To Greece

Corinth is not as well preserved as old Ephesus, but there is an excellent museum which we visited. Most of the exhibitions of this museum were found in ancient graves. There were two tombs covered with glass that contains the bones of children, still laid out in proper order, along with pottery they needed to eat with. There were things in this museum dating as far back as 750 B. C. A special room that is usually locked was opened to us. It contained relics of pagan religions of the distant past. Chaplain Deming told us the Greek Orthodox Church still uses some of these pagan practices.

Inside the Orthodox Churches you see parts of the human body modeled in silver or tin and laid on the altar.

In this museum is a large marble slab with the carvings obviously done by an amateur with this inscription: "Synagogue of the Hebrews." This is done in Greek. This indicated that the Jews of this area were probably very poor and could not hire professional carvers to do the lettering. The spot where the marble was found was the probable spot where St. Paul preached, or as the Acts of the Apostles says, "Reasoned in the synagogue every Sabbath."

After this we went to place in the old city where the wall of the Bema or Judgment seat remains. Here Paul was brought before Gallio when he was accused by the Jews of persuading men to worship God con-

trary to the law. It was at this place that Paul said, "Henceforth I will go unto the Gentiles." While sitting in the shade of this ancient wall, the Chaplain read to us Acts, Chapter 18, verses 1-22, which is the account of Paul in Corinth. He then led us in prayer and we sang the Doxology. It was a great privilege to have this moment of worship in a place so sacred to all Christians.

It was 3 p. m. when we returned to the hotel and our last few hours in Athens were passing rapidly. Five miles west of the city is a knitting factory we wanted to see. None of us being able to speak any Greek presented a problem, however, we got to the factory without much trouble. We got on the wrong bus once and we used sign language, even to drawing a woman's suit when trying to find the right building. The suits made here were beautiful and very reasonable priced. I bought a very pretty three piece brown suit. My only other purchase except some souvenirs was a brown fur hat.

The next morning we left the lovely old city of Athens with its warm climate and returned to Ankara. The flight was comfortable and fast. When we landed at the airport everyone's family was there. Twenty men and lots of lots of children, including Flip and our three. It was a fine welcome and it was good to be home.

Fatma, our new maid, is such a nice woman and works so hard. She had made it easier for Flip and the children without me. I had prepared plenty of food and put it in the freezer so they had plenty to eat.

A week from today Flip and I are driving to Beirut, Lebanon. It will take two days to drive there. His conference starts on Monday, November 2nd. They will coordinate the insect control projects for this Middle East. The quality of agricultural products has improved in all this area since they are learning how to control the insects.

It is much cooler in Ankara than in Athens, but it is still lovely Indian Summer weather during the daytime. The roses have about quit blooming, but the chrysanthemums in the back yard are just beginning to open up.
