

Report of activities for the Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire De-


The report covers the period of this year.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need for the operation of hospitals by private charitable enterprises which will furnish free medical and/or hospital cile. care for the indigent in Texas;

and WHEREAS, The operation of such hospitals and the furn-ishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent in Texas will add to the welfare and well-being of the State of Texas and its

residents and citizens; and WHEREAS, The need for the operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent is especially great in counties having a population in excess of one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000); and

WHEREAS, It is found and declared to be the Public Policy of the State to foster and encourage such operation of hospitals as aforesaid; now, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Texas is amended hereby, by the addi-tion of a new Section to Ar-ticle VIII thereof, to be numbered Section 2-A, and reading as follows:
