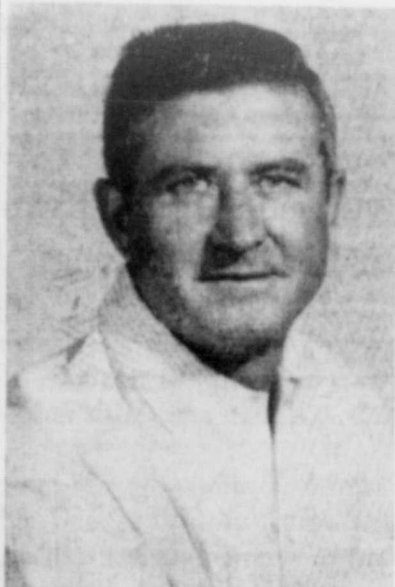

Possibility Of Multi-Purpose Lake On Bennett Creek Told To Sponsors

Frank McClung Named Commander Of American Legion

Frank McClung was elected Commander of the Harry F. Edmondson Post 289, American Legion, Goldthwaite, at the regular election of officers for the new year.

Officers were elected at the meeting of the group held at the American Legion Hall on Wednesday, August 25.

Other officers elected were: 1st vice commander, Victor Williams; 2nd vice commander, Floyd Daniel; adjutant, Bruce Archer; sergeant-at-arms, Howard Weaver; and service officer, L. B. Porter.

Officials have announced that dues for the new year are now due and ask that all veterans that are eligible sign up as a Legionnaire.

E. W. Buchtein, Watershed Planning Leader with the Soil Conservation Service, last week told local watershed sponsors of the possibility of a multi-purpose lake on Bennett Creek.

Buchtein, headquartered at Waco, E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist at Brownwood, and Elgin Smith, local SCS representative, were meeting with Bennett Creek WCID directors, Bill Bishop, a local soil conservation district supervisor, and Mills County Judge Cecil Egger.

The Bennett Creek WCID was represented by local chairman Jim Soules and members J. S. Owens, Arnold Head, Walter Tubbs, and Homer McCasland. Local sponsors were told by Buchtein that the Federal Government could cost share development on a lake in Bennett Creek for flood detention and recreation. This cost share would consist of, in addition to the dam, aid on the facilities such as boat ramps and docks, bathhouses, picnic tables, and other items essential for recreation by the public. He further stated that two of the four

watersheds in the planning stage assisted by his SCS work crew are considering such a project, in their work plans.

"A flood detention dam developed by an organization for recreation with cost-share must be a public facility," said local SCSer Elgin Smith. "It can be profit making but the sponsoring body must have taxation powers such as a Water District, Commissioners' Court, or a City, such as Goldthwaite."

E. J. Hughes cited examples of such projects by other towns and communities and pointed out that the part not cost-shared by the Soil Conservation Service could be borrowed from the Farmers Home Administration at a low interest rate.

Bennett Creek WCID, the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District and the Mills County Commissioners' Court are developing a flood detention work plan, with SCS assistance, on Bennett Creek. They will be considering, during the coming several weeks, if there is an interest in building a multi-purpose lake.

Joe Dean Dickerson Finds Work With Livestock Rewarding

Joe Dean Dickerson, a 16-year-old youth of Robstown, has won enough trophies, ribbons, buckles, riding gear, and other prize paraphernalia to almost fill the sizeable den in his home.

Joe Dean has been working with horses and sheep for four years and the results of his work are amazing.

He began his work in 1961 at the age of eleven. Much of his work has been under the guidance and training of Joe Joyce, assistant county agent of Nueces County. He has spent many long hours of hard work, which were a pleasure for him and the results are there to see in numerous prizes and awards from shows.

He began his work with horses with one mare and two years later had a mare and a gelding. This year he had a mare, colt, and a gelding. He is not working with sheep this year in order to concentrate on horses.

The following is a partial list of his record:

In 1964—high point award for 4-H field day—trophy, six ribbons; grand champion gelding—buckle and rosette; livestock show, grand champion mare—horse blanket; first place senior mare—halter; reining, first place—halter.

In 1965—livestock show,

champion mare in class—buckle; champion gelding—buckle; champion showman—buckle; champion halter horse—name plate for saddle; first place roper of class—trophy; first place colt—trophy; first place aged mare—trophy.

Joe Dean, a native of Mills County, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Dickerson of 325 Kissing, Robstown, and the grandson of Mrs. Claude Dickerson of Goldthwaite and the late Mr. Dickerson. He is a junior in Robstown High School.

Eagles Beat Armadillos 33-15; Play De Leon There Friday Night

The Goldthwaite Eagles pushed back the AA San Saba Armadillos last Friday night in the opening game of the season 33-15.

The Eagles won the toss and elected to receive the ball. An early lead was taken by Goldthwaite in the first quarter when a 62 yard drive was climaxed by Jim Childress' five yard run. Fullback Emmett Miller's attempt to kick for an extra point failed but the Eagles were in the lead 6-0.

Charles Blackburn brought the Eagles another six-pointer by running 37 yards for a touchdown only 3 minutes after the second quarter began. Miller again kicked. This time the kick was good and put the Eagles ahead 13-0.

The Armadillos, refusing to be beaten, battled back with fullback David Little plunging over the one yard line and then adding two points. This brought the Armadillos back into the

game with the score 13-8.

But the victory was short lived when Sandy Watkins kicked off for the Armadillos. Jerry Rountree caught the ball from Bobby Rountree, on a switch play on the Eagles' 22 yard line and ran 78 yards for the Eagles' third touchdown, bringing the score to 19-8 at the half time.

San Saba opened the third period with Jerry Oliver tossing the ball 25 yards to halfback Tom Edmondson for a touchdown score. Sandy Watkins booted the extra point. This brought the Dilos within four points of the Eagles with the score 19-15.

Quarterback Tom Hudson threw a 25 yard pass to Rountree, setting up for the Eagles' fourth TD for a score of 25-15.

Blackburn of the Eagles made the final score by running 39 yards for a touchdown in the fourth period. Tommy Hudson

then pitched to Jerry Rountree for the final two points, making the final score 33-15.
