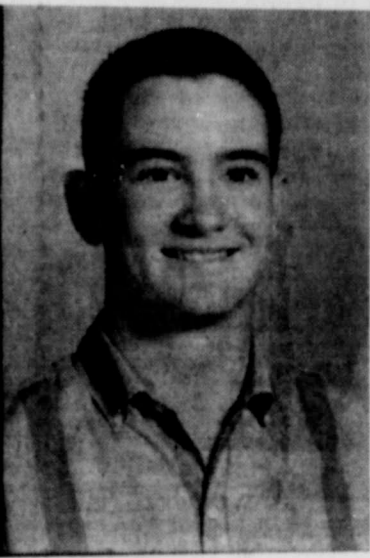

Landrum Acquires Collins' Interest In Ford Dealership In Goldthwaite

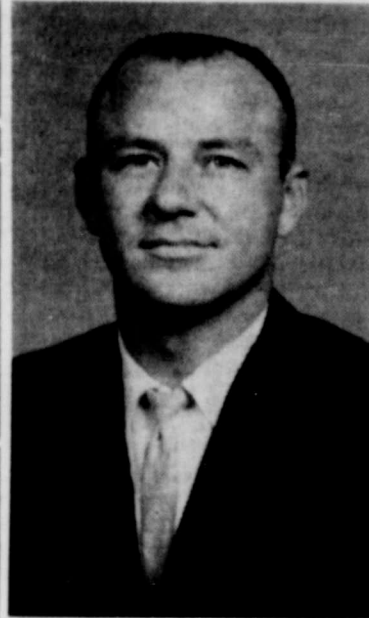
Kellis Landrum this week announces the purchase of the interest held by W. R. "Bob" Collins in Landrum & Collins Motor Company, Mills County Ford dealership, in Goldthwaite.

Mr. Landrum is now the sole owner of the firm and will operate the business in the same location under the firm name of Landrum Ford Sales.

Landrum has been associated with the Ford dealership in Goldthwaite for the past five years. He came to this city from Houston where he had been associated with a Ford dealership.

When he moved to Goldthwaite from Houston he acquired an interest in the firm and became general manager of the business which was at that time Edgington Motor Company.

D. R. Edgington later sold his interest to W. R. "Bob" Collins

and the name of the firm was changed to Landrum & Collins Motor Company. Mr. Collins took little part in operation of the business since he continued his ranching interests and raising and training registered quarter horses.

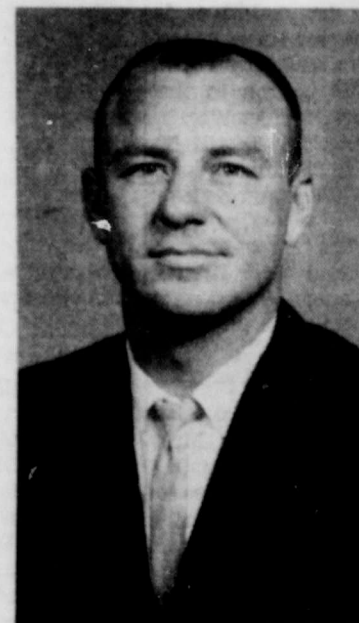

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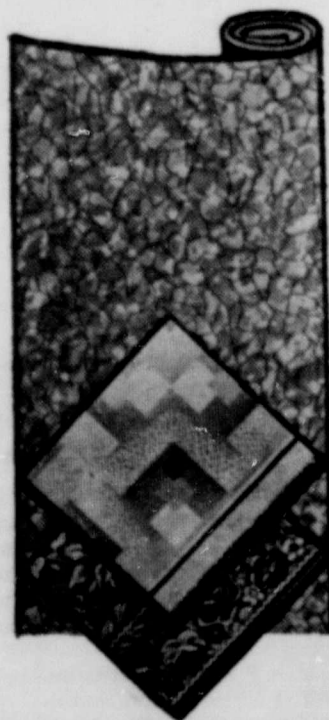

WANTED BY THE FBI



ALSON THOMAS WAHRlich

Wahrlich, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for the crime of kidnapping. He allegedly abducted a 6-year-old Arizona girl in Tucson, Arizona, on April 16, 1964, and brutally beat, choked, and sexually molested her before leaving her abandoned in the same city. A Federal warrant was issued at Tucson on April 28, 1964, charging Wahrlich with unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for this offense.

A white American, Wahrlich was born in Rensselaer County, New York, on February 4, 1936. He is 5' 2" tall, weighs 135 to 140 pounds, wears glasses, has blue eyes, brown hair, a medium build and a medium complexion. He has a scar on his left shoulder, a vaccination scar on his left arm, a scar on each side of his abdomen, and a tattoo of a heart and the name "Cindy" on his left arm.

Wahrlich has worked as a truck driver, ranch worker, dishwasher, house trailer repairman, hospital orderly, insurance salesman, and ice cream truck vendor. He is very interested in guns and strongly prefers traveling by personally owned car. Wahrlich reportedly has mental blackouts, has been previously imprisoned for aggravated assault, child molesting, and a crime against nature. He reportedly is armed with a pistol and is said to carry a surgical scalpel in his trouser's pocket. Consider him armed and extremely dangerous.

Should you receive any information concerning the whereabouts of Alson Thomas Wahrlich, you are requested to immediately notify the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which may be located on the first page of local telephone directories.

U. S. Sen. John Tower told Austin reporters that Texas Republicans will concentrate their statewide efforts on the senate race in 1966, and will field no active candidate for governor. Death Penalty Out?

Some attorneys contend that the new code of criminal procedure abolishes the death penalty for crime in Texas.

They believe that absence of procedures for assessing punishment—where the state asks for execution of a criminal — makes it impossible for a death penalty to stand up in appellate court even if assessed by a jury.

A member of the State Legislature, Rep. Bob Armstrong of Austin, is asking Governor Connally to submit proposed revisions in the controversial code to a special session of the Legislature. Complains Armstrong: the revision goes too far in requiring accused persons to be warned of their rights against giving statements to police.

Seek Federal Funds

Twenty-five Texas school districts filed early applications for a share of the \$81,000,000 provided under a federal act aimed mainly at helping underprivileged children. Aid will be dispersed at the rate of about \$195 a pupil for those from families with incomes of less than \$2,000 a year.

First districts applying were Houston, San Antonio, San Angelo, Poteet, Lipan, Fannindale, Paducah, Longview, Dimmitt, Del Valle, Crystal City, Taft, Gonzales, Rochester County line, Dickinson, St. Jo, East Lamar, Cunningham Rural High School, Deport, Laneville, Graham, Jasper, Bandera, Giddings and Withrrail.

Redistricting Row Goes On

Attorney General Carr and the Republicans still are swapping legal broadsides over congressional redistricting.

Carr, in a new brief filed with the Houston federal court, urged judges to give lawmakers another chance at reapportionment in 1967 if the 1965 redistricting act is invalidated. He repeated his earlier opinion that the law adopted this year meets the court's specifications, however, since population variance among the 23 districts is below 15 per cent.

A new GOP brief chides that the redistricting act borders on "sheer lunacy" and demands that it be redone by electrical

computers rather than politically-minded legislators.

Tourist Conference Called

Some 500 Texans are expected to attend a tourist development conference in Austin on October 14. Purpose is to insure better cooperation between state and community efforts to promote travel.

Governor Connally will keynote the sessions. Other speakers will include Jon McCarty, chairman of Texas Tourist Development Agency advisory board; pollster Joe Belden; Kern Tips, TTDA advertising account executive; Tom Taylor, State Highway Department travel and information division head; J. Weldon Watson, Parks and Wildlife Department director; John Ben Shepperd, president of Texas State Historical Survey Committee; and Don Epperson, Texas Tourist Council executive director.

Meetings are open to the public, says TTDA Director Frank Hillbrand.

AG Opinions

Attorney General Carr has ruled that either parent may consent to the marriage of a minor, and a County Clerk may issue a marriage license.

However, if both parents are alive, the mother's consent is sufficient upon a written affidavit subscribed and sworn to by her that she and the minor have lived in the county more than a year, and the father has been out of the county for more than six months, or that the mother and father are divorced

and she has custody of the minor more than six months.

In other official opinions, he ruled that:

A college student who takes and passes an advanced standing examination in the field of American History, or Texas history, does not fulfill specified requirements by merely passing the examination.

Commissioners Court of Jefferson County is not authorized to grant salary increases of the Criminal District Attorney, the Judge of the County Court at Law, or the Judge of County Court at Law, Number 2.

Joint Hearings Proposed

Legislative budget writers are considering joint hearings by House and Senate committees as a method of abolishing controversial riders to spending bills.

Budget Board staff reviewed for members a long list of governmental studies it has been called on to undertake.

Thomas E. Riggs, Certified Public Accountant in Austin, has been appointed executive director of the Texas Hospital Association, replacing Bob Burkhardt who joined the staff of the State Department of Health.

Governor Connally has appointed Benjamin Orland Sims of Paint Rock and re-appointed M. L. Schulz of Eola and Curtis L. Stevens of Millersview to the Concho Water and Soil Conservation Authority.

House Speaker Ben Barnes named to key committee to study adequacy of faculty compensation in state colleges and universities Amarillo attorney Wales Madden and Reps. Tom Bass of Houston, W. Reed Quilliam Jr. of Lubbock and W. C. (Bud) Sherman of Fort Worth. Lt. Gov. Smith earlier named Sens. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur, Andy Rogers of Childress and Pete Snelson of Midland to panel. Barnes emphasized need for more "fringe benefits" to faculty members.

Education Leap

A major characteristic of the Texas government's budget this year is a leap forward on education.

Texas spent 40.8 per cent of the state tax dollar on education during the last two years but it will spend 44.5 per cent for the next two-year period.

Highway spending will rise from 27.8 to 23.5 per cent. Welfare and assistance rise from 15.6 to 16.6 per cent. Health and hospitals will decline from 4.9 to 4.6 per cent. Other stat activities are expected to hold even.

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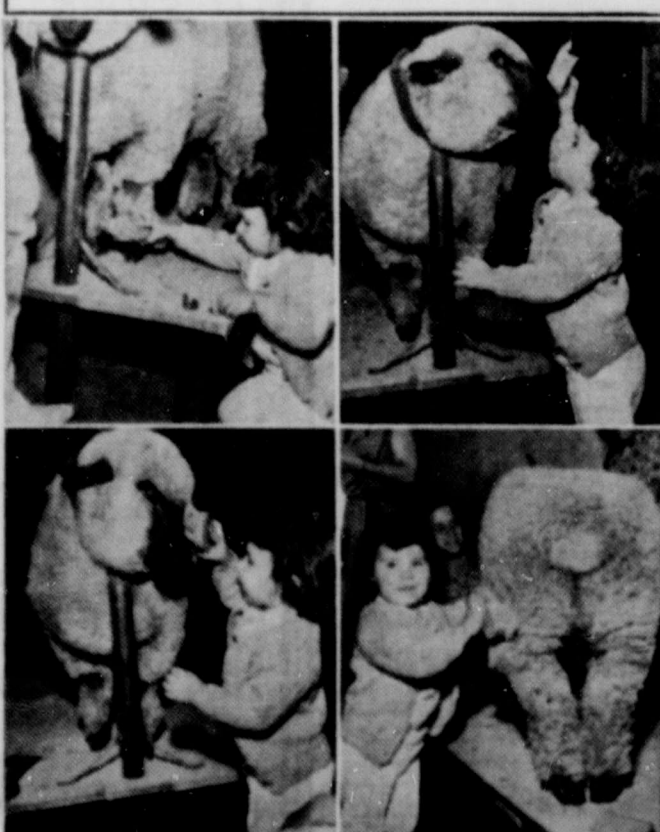

Clayton Egger Is Named Chairman 1965 TS&GRA Membership Drive

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has launched a new general membership drive with a goal of 1,000 new members in 30 days.

Clayton Egger of Mullin, membership chairman, said at the TS&GRA quarterly meeting in Del Rio that the campaign slogan will be "1,000 in 30." Present membership is 5,163, an increase of 476 from a year ago.

The drive will be on a county-by-county basis, with county chairmen and co-chairmen. Present members will help in acquiring new members. Eleven district chairmen will coordinate the program with Egger.

Fifty new members were signed in the first three days of the drive.

Indications are that Texas sheep numbers by next year will be appreciably larger because most ranchmen are retaining ewe lambs and rebuilding flock numbers trimmed by dry weather and unfavorable markets.

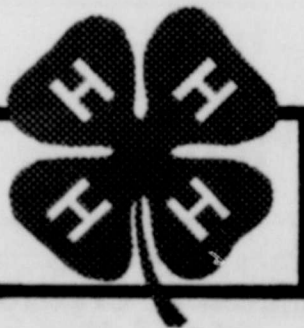

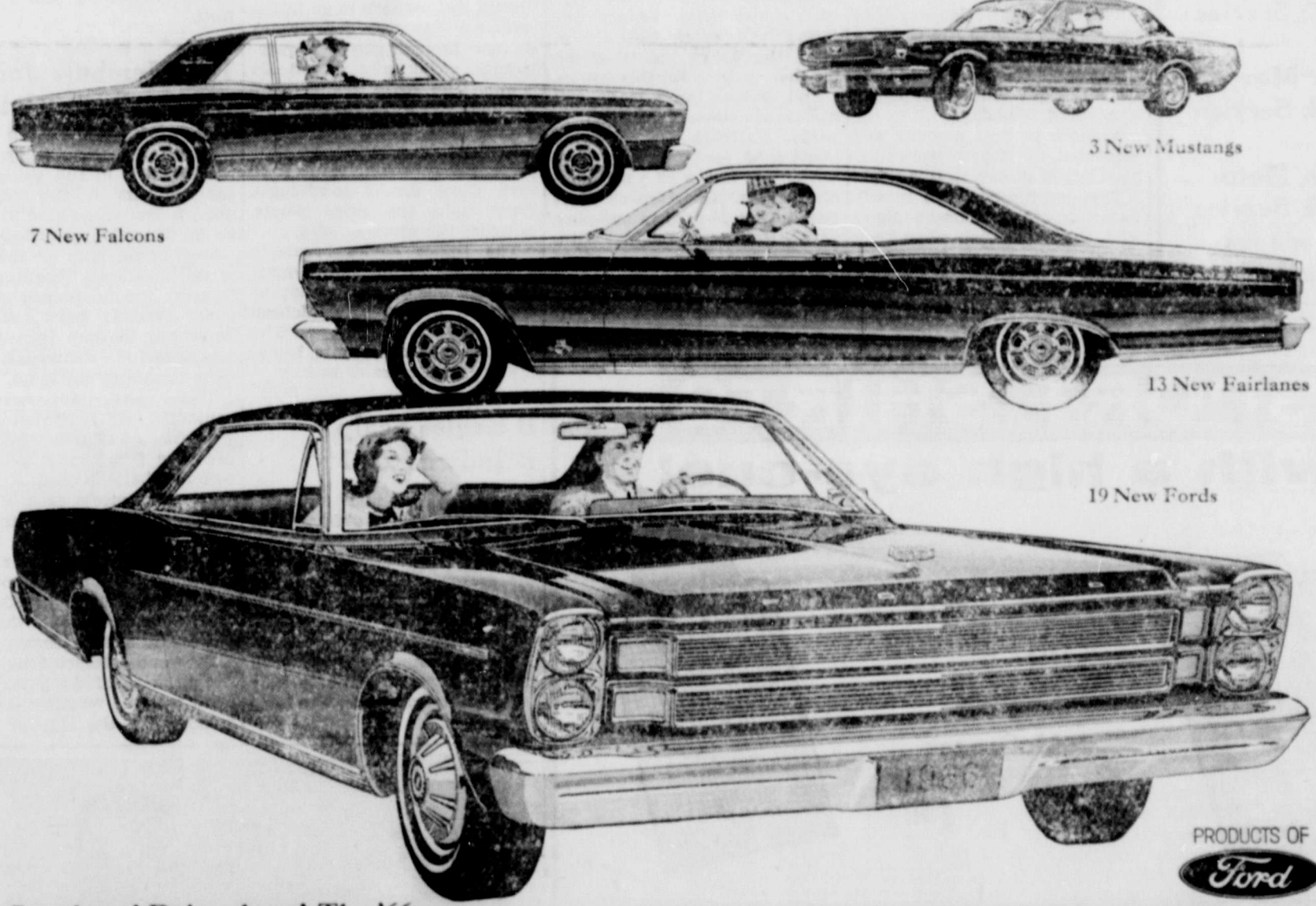

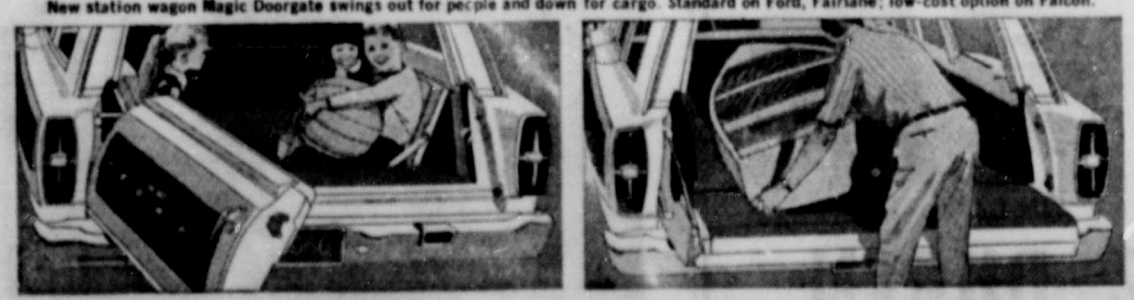

Parks & Wildlife Commission Sets Fall Openers For Ducks And Geese

The Texas and Wildlife Commission set the annual duck season for forty consecutive days beginning Wednesday, November 24 and ending January 2 and the goose season for seventy consecutive days from Saturday, October 30 to January 12. Shooting hours will be from sunrise to sunset, including the opening day.

The daily bag limit on ducks will be four, not to include more than one mallard and one pintail, and the possession limit eight not to include more than two mallards and two pintails. However, for the first time in several years the previously rigid protection on red heads was lifted and hunters permitted to fill their legal limits.

Goose limits are the same as previously, with a bag limit of five per day and five in possession. The one white front limit was retained, as well as the limit of two Canadas, with alternate permission to have one white front and one Canada.

Working with a date framework prescribed by the U. S. Department of the Interior, the Commission timed the duck season to include both Thanksgiving Day and the Christmas and New Year holidays. The goose shoot, of course, will also include that period.

Here is the official text covering the duck limits:

"The daily bag limits of ducks may not include more of the following species than: (a) 2 wood ducks; (b) 2 canvasbacks; (c) 1 mallard; and (d) 1 pintail. The possession limit may not include more of the following species than: (a) 2 wood ducks; (b) 2 canvasbacks; (c) 2 mallards; and (d) 2 pintails."

Hunters thus will be privileged to take their legal limits of those species of ducks not included in the above noted restrictions.

The official proclamation on geese provides: "The daily bag and possession limit of five may include more of the following species than: (a) 1 Ross's goose; (b) in the alternative, 2 Canada goose or subspecies; 1 Canada goose or subspecies; and 1 white-fronted goose; or 1 white-fronted goose."

A season was set on the little brown cranes in the same far west Texas area as formerly. The daily bag is two and the possession limit is four. Heretofore it was two per day and two in possession.

The Quarterback Club has spent approximately \$1,500 on the field. Work done consists of clearing the plot, dirt moving, grading, leveling and fill.

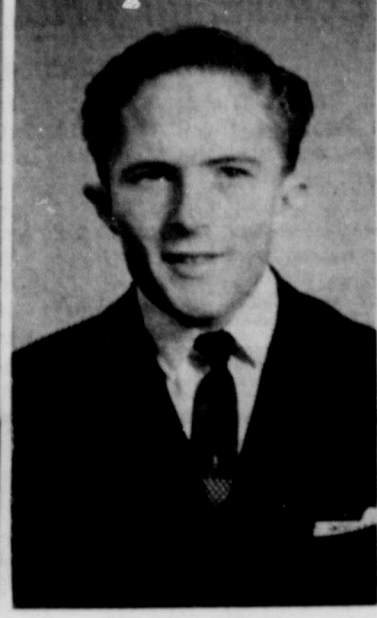
Buckholts Defeats Star Friday, 68-35
