Ten Propositions To Be Voted On In Amendment Election Tuesday

Mills County voters, along with all Texans, will go to the polls next Tuesday, November 2, to cast their ballots on 10 proposed amendments to the State Constitution. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. next Tuesday. Mills County citizens will vote in fewer precincts at this election, the same as in the special election in September, since five boxes were eliminated and annexed with others.

Boxes effected with the changes are as follows:
 Pompey Mt. box 20 annexed to Mullin box 8.
 Mt. Olive box 18 annexed to Caradan box 7.
 Rock Springs box 12 annexed to Big Valley box 11. The Big Valley box was also moved from the old school building in the lower valley to the basement of the Baptist Church building in the upper valley.
 Ratler box 13 and Regency box 14 annexed to Ridge box 16.

Governor Connally Cites Need For Amendment Election Turnout

Gov. Connally said that 357 aged residents of Mills County will have their medical benefits jeopardized if Constitutional Amendment No. 3 fails to win passage in the November 2 election. During the past year, \$107,292 was expended on behalf of these needy aged in this county. Governor Connally urged all Texans to support and vote for this crucial amendment. Governor Connally also endorsed Amendment No. 4 which extends the two-year terms of statewide officials to four years. "Texas is one of the few remaining states which has not enacted this far-sighted and efficient legislation," Governor Connally said. The governor warned against voter apathy. He pointed out that only 257 voters in this county went to the polls last month in another Constitutional Amendment election.

Voters will cast their ballots "For" or "Against" the 10 proposed amendments.

The ten amendments are listed in the ballot in the following order and they would:

1. Increase the state property tax from 42 to 47 cents and allocate the extra five cents to college buildings.
2. Authorizing an increase of \$200 million in bonds that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board.
3. Permit full state participation in federal medicare program.
4. Authorizing four-year terms for Governor and other elected state officials.
5. Clarifying investment authority for the Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System.
6. Set up \$85 million student loan fund for higher education.
7. Exempt from local property taxes a hospital that spends as much as \$1,500,000 a year on care of indigents.
8. Providing automatic retirement for District and Appellate Judges and procedures for dismissal.
9. Authorizing the Legislature to set salaries for the Lt. Governor and Speaker of the House. Increasing per diem pay of members of the Legislature from \$12 for 120 days to \$20 for 140 days during the regular session.
10. Providing four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives.

Bank Deposits Gain \$300,000 During Past Year

Deposits in Mills County State Bank have increased better than \$300,000.00 the past year, according to statement of condition released the past week on bank call as of October 13, 1965 were \$6,525,372.08 while on October 1, 1964 they were \$6,220,146.86. Loans also showed a substantial increase over a year ago. On October 1, 1964 loans were \$3,235,357.45 and on October 13, this year, they were \$3,732,978.17.

HD Agent Appointed Mills County

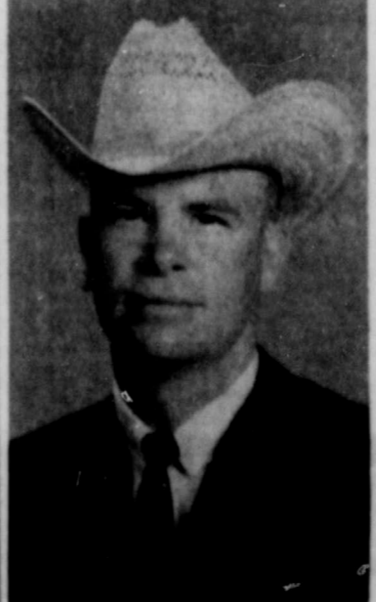

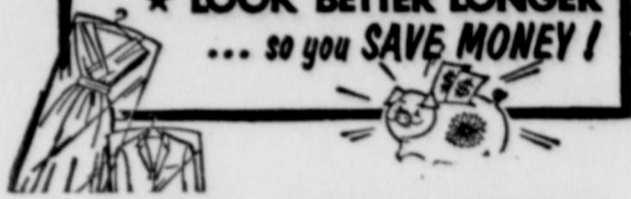

50 YEARS AGO—

(Taken from The Eagle Files of October 30, 1915)

Mr. W. W. Westerman met with a severe accident Tuesday morning while en route from his home in Jones Valley to this city, where he brought cotton. He was riding on the spring seat which had been placed on the cotton frames in his wagon. When he reached a point in the road near G. T. Stewart's house the coupling pin in the wagon broke and the front wheels ran out from under the frames, causing Mr. Westerman to be thrown to the ground. The first report reaching this city was that his back was broken, but happily this report proved to be untrue.

Up to the time the Eagle was put to press 2,181 bales of cotton had been received at the public yard here, against 4,358 on the same date last year. At the Farmers Union yard 1,783 bales had been received and on the same date last year 2,702 bales had been received.

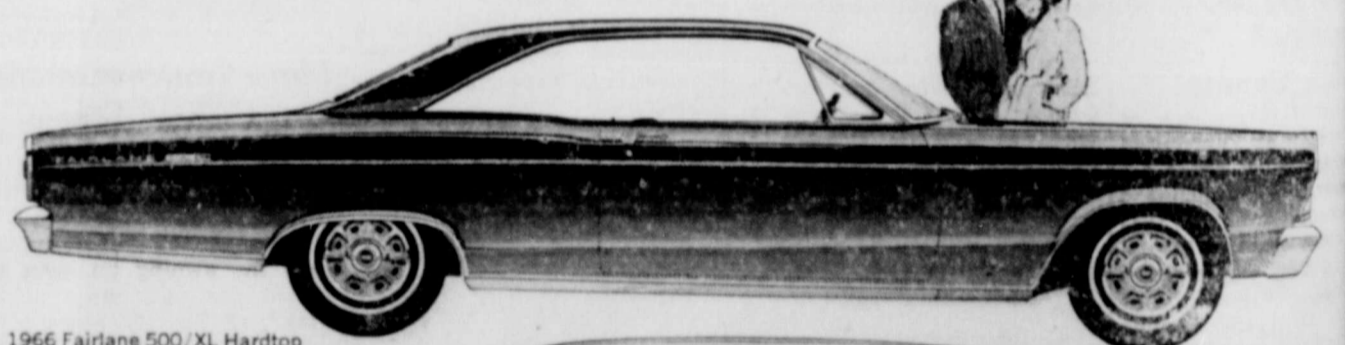

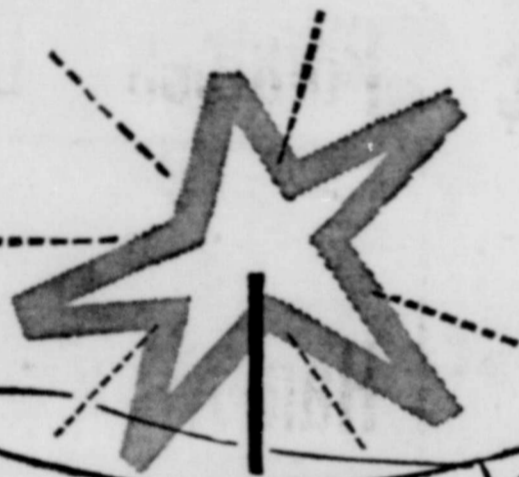

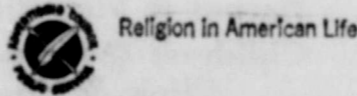
