It is time to get your Christmas packages mailed to members of the Armed Forces overseas. For airmail parcels the period is December 1 to December 10.

Greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed within the periods dsignated for parcels if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas, it was announced this week by Acting Postmaster Ray Duren.

All packages should be securely wrapped and tied with strong cord for overseas mailing

The postoffice department urges each postal patron to tie local and out of town Christmas cards in separate bundles. When possible use ZIP Code on the mailing address and your ZIP Code number after your return address. This cooperation will speed up the delivery of your Christmas mail.

Goldthwaite's ZIP Code is 76844. Route 1, Route 2, Route 3, and Goldthwaite Star Route have the same ZIP Code as Goldthwaite.
