Eagles Are District 9-A Champions

Bi-District Games This Week

Goldthwaite is one of seven district teams that chalked up undefeated, untied records this season as they go into bi-district play-off this week. The Eagles scored more points this season than any other team in the state for they scored 416 points in games while their opponents scored 57. In district play-off they scored 229 points against their opponents.

Next year, 1964, the Eagles scored 183 points in nine games while their opponents scored 88. In district play last year the Eagles made 123 points and their opponents remained scoreless.

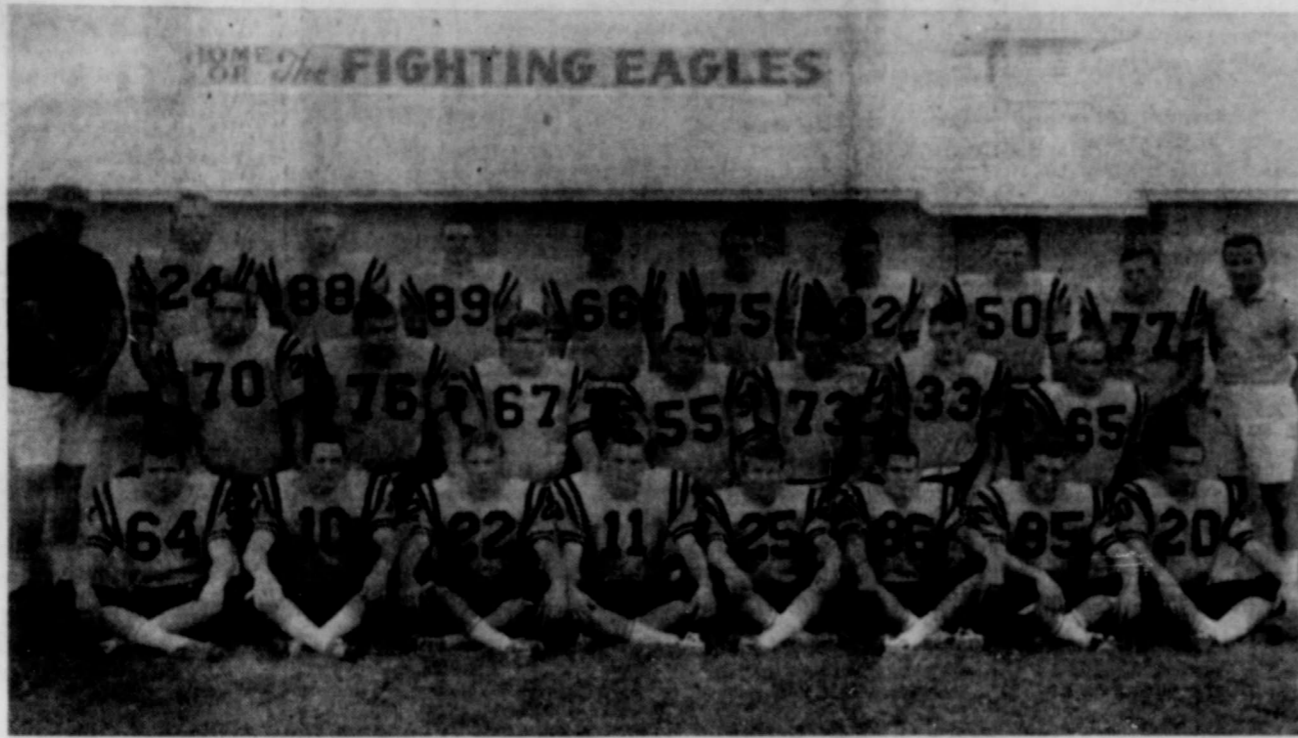

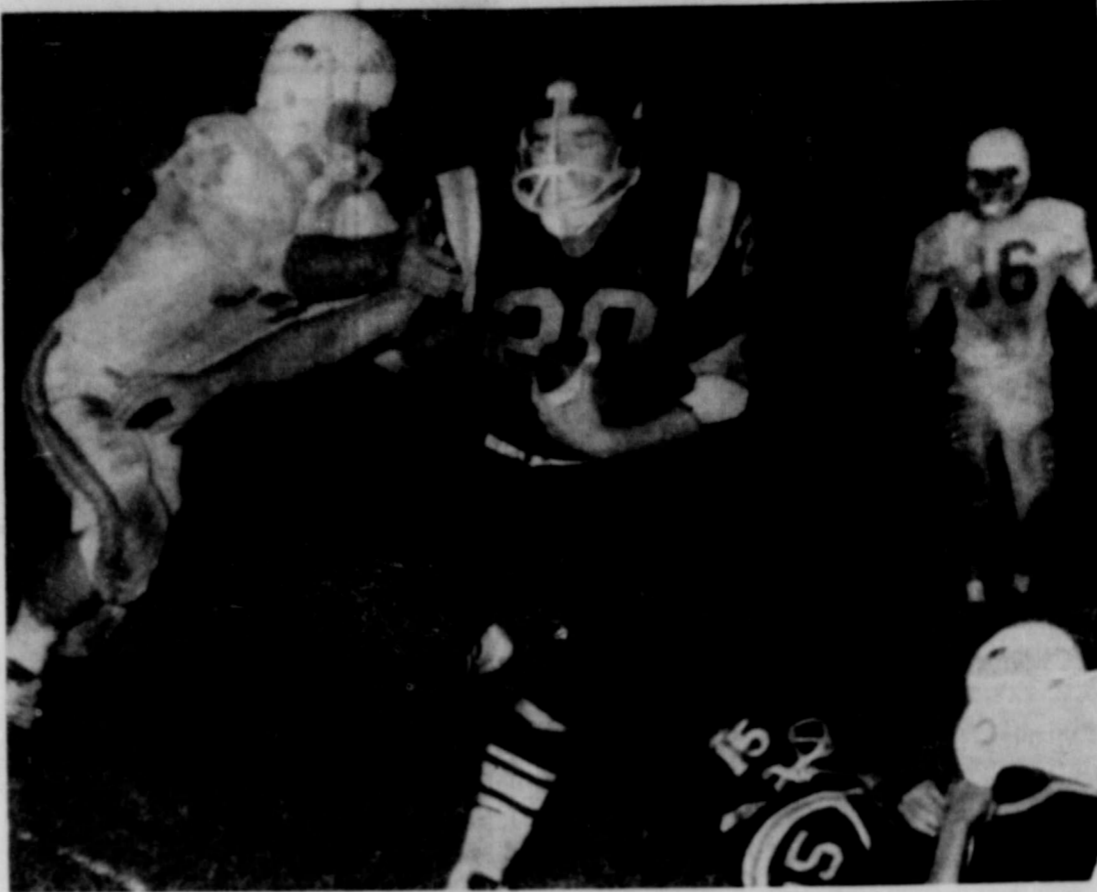
