The De Leon Bearcats edged out the high flying Eagles 18-13 last Friday night at Lions Stadium in Brownwood, in their bid for Bi-District Champs. On September 10, the Eagles met the Bearcats on De Leon field, where they defeated the Bearcats 14-8 in their second game of the season.

Both teams turned in fine football performances in a hard fought battle for the Bi-District title.

Tommy Hudson, Jerry Rountree, Randy Holland, and Rick Mason of the Bearcats, received minor injuries, but returned to play.

After several plays, De Leon's Donnie Sharp threw a pass to

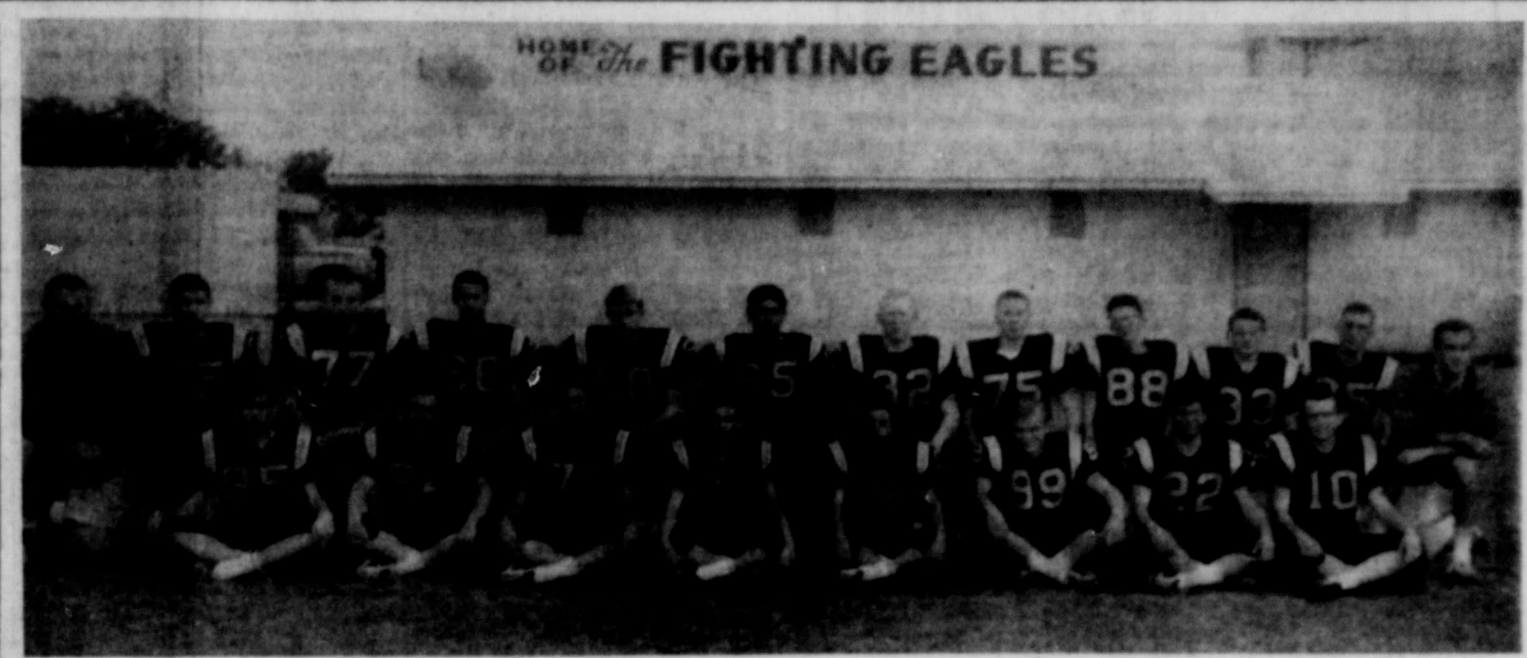
end Bodie Weaver who romped 81 yards for the first touchdown. The try for the extra point failed, as the De Leon Bearcats led 6-0.

In the second quarter, Bearcat Bo Shifflett made a touchdown on another pass play. Tom Aplin tried for the extra point by passing, and again the try was no good and the first half closed with a 12-0 score in favor of the Bearcats.

After several plays in the third quarter Jim Childress carried the ball for the first touchdown of the evening for the Eagles. He made a flying dive over the line for three yards for pay dirt. Emmett Miller kicked the extra point, and the score was 13-7 as the third quarter ended.

In the fourth frame of the game a terrible break for the Eagles and a good one for the Bearcats took place when Mike Smith intercepted a pass from Tommy Hudson intended for Jerry Rountree, and rushed 80 yards for another touchdown for the Bearcats. The try for the extra points again failed with the Bearcats leading 18-7.

Eagle Jerry Rountree made the final touchdown for the evening on a punt return. He took the ball from Bobby on a single reverse play and romped 85 yards for a touchdown. Emmett's kick was no good, and the score stood at 18-13. The Eagles kept digging but the clock played out, and De Leon took the Bi-District victory 18-13.

Leaflet Explains Social Security Tax Increases

A small leaflet, prepared by the Social Security Administration, is available to employers as a payroll check stuffer. The leaflet explains the increase in the social security contribution rate and amount of earnings on which the tax is paid, set for January 1, Jack Calvert, social security district manager in Temple, announced today.

The leaflet shows how these increases will affect a worker's take home pay; how his contribution helps finance retirement, survivors, and disability insurance benefits; how they will pay the costs of the hospital insurance part of medicare; and why they are necessary.

The handy size of the leaflet will allow it to be easily inserted in payroll envelopes. Employers should get in touch with the Temple social security district office, located at 210 West Central Avenue, for more information about the leaflet.

"We can provide employers with a supply of these informative leaflets without charge," Calvert pointed out. "But," he added, "the supply is limited and employers should make their requests early."

Mills Highway Improvements In New Program

Mills County highway improvement projects are included in the new two year Consolidated Highway Program which has been approved and announced by the Texas Highway Commission.

In Mills County reconstruction is planned on US 84 from Brown County line, Southeast to Mullin; and bridges and approaches are to be widened on US 84 East of Goldthwaite and on US 183 South of Goldthwaite.

These projects are part of the district 23 program which includes nine counties and will cover an expenditure of more than eight million dollars, according to District Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood.

RV's Cafe Adds New Departments

RV Geeslin this week announced plans for two new departments to be added to RV's Cafe at the North Y in Goldthwaite.

New Farm Program

In response to a number of inquiries, Ralph Duren, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today that the ASCS County Office is not ready at the present time to sign up participants in programs authorized by recently enacted farm legislation.

Programs for which signups will be conducted—probably early in 1966—include feed grains, wheat, cotton, and cropland adjustment.

"It is gratifying that farmers are showing so much interest in these diversion programs," the Chairman said. "However, there are many details to be taken care of before field offices are in position to answer questions about how any of the programs may apply to a specific farm and to accept applications showing the grower's intention to participate.

"When the signups do start, farmers will be reminded in plenty of time to file program applications before a stated deadline. Normally, such signups continue for about 6 weeks," Duren concluded.

Texas Wool And Mohair Producers Assured Higher Income Next Year

Texas wool and mohair producers are assured of a higher income next year as a result of the National Wool Act, just passed by President Johnson.

The four-year extension bill was viewed as a major victory by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, said Clifford Hanks of Rockledge, president.

"Obtaining an extension of the National Wool Act has been high priority to our Association all year," Hanks declared. "We have probably devoted more time, money and effort to this project than to any other thing."

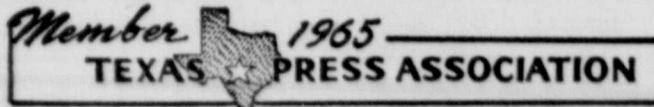
