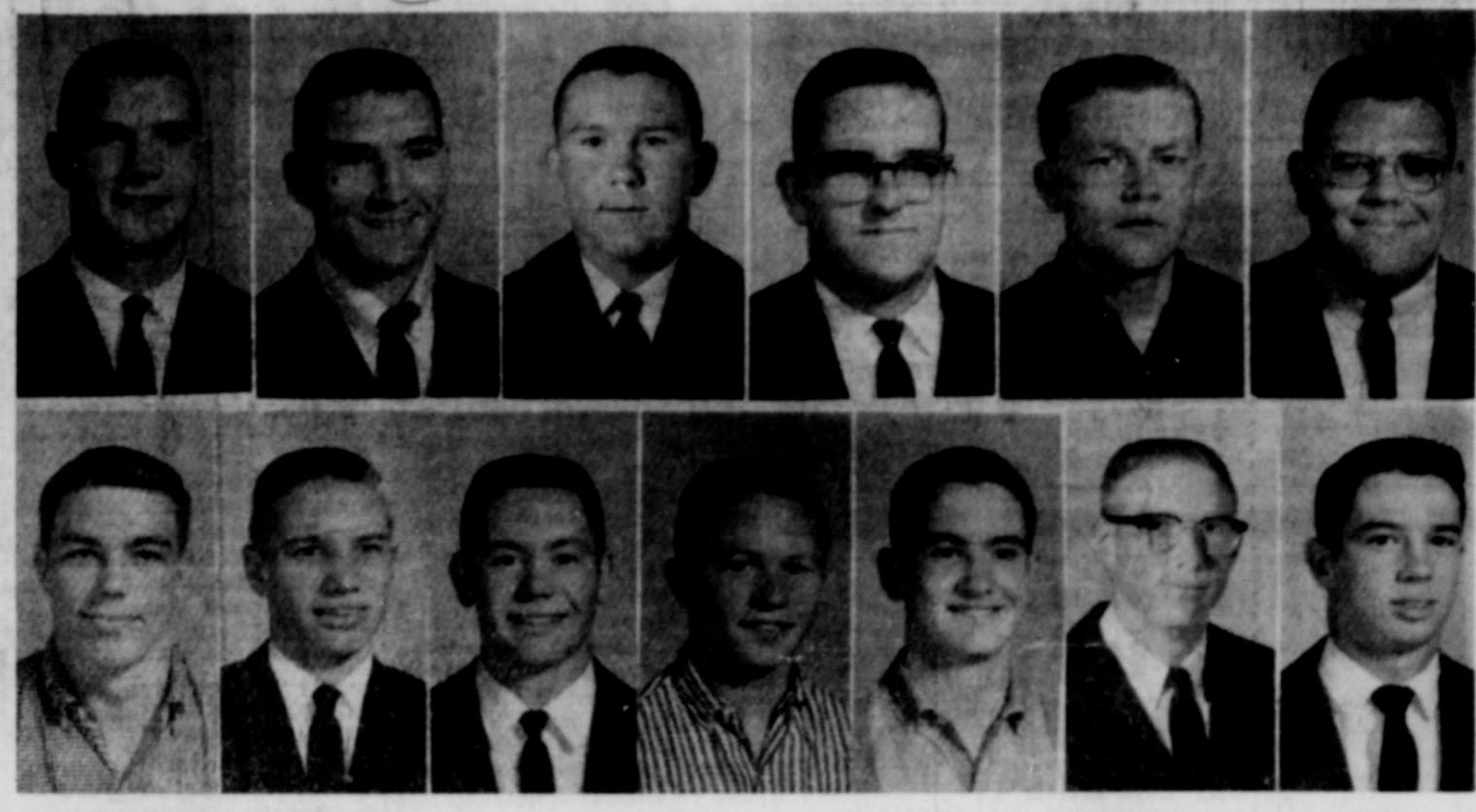

structed under long term lease
agreement for the grocery firm.

The new building will be con-
structed on a lot located on
Fisher Street between First and
Second Streets. The site is be-
tween the Graves Dental Build-
ing and Shelton Bros. Auto

Parts. The building and parking
area will take in the entire area
which has a frontage of 178
feet and is 125 feet deep.

The building will be located
in center and on the back of
the lot with parking in front
and at two sides of the building.
There will be parking space for
approximately 40 cars. The en-
tire parking area will be paved.

The building will be 90 feet
across the front and 60 feet
deep, covering 5,400 square feet
of floor space. There will be a
small stock room and office and
the balance will be devoted to
selling area. Selling area in
the new building will be approx-
imately double that of the pre-
sent store, Mr. Long stated.

Construction will be of ma-
sonry type with brick and glass
front and tile side and back
walls. The entire building will
be completely air-conditioned
for year around heating and
cooling. The building will have
tile floor and acoustical tile
suspended ceiling.

When completed this will be
as nice a super market in the
medium size class as can be
found in Central Texas, accord-
ing to Mr. Long.
The new store will have two
checkout stands and many new
fixtures.
Mr. Long has been in the
grocery business since 1927 with
the exception of a short time.
He sold coffee for two years,
from 1934-1935 and worked as
bookkeeper for Saylor Chevrolet
from 1939 to 1942. He is a na-
tive of Mills County and has
been owner of Loy Long Grocery
in the present location 18 years,
since 1947. Before then he was
manager of the same store for
Lamkin Bros. for a period of
five years from 1942 to 1947.

COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

Mr. James S. Denton Jr., Extension Area Farm Management Specialist of Stephenville, conducted an Income Tax School Wednesday afternoon in the Mills County State Bank Conference Room. This meeting was sponsored by the local Extension Office.

Mr. Denton stressed the importance of keeping good records of the year's expenses and income so that whoever completes the income tax form will have records to substantiate the deductions taken. He also told the audience that individuals should exercise every privilege allowed by the tax laws.

Some other reminders brought out by Mr. Denton were to be sure to include your Social Security number, failure to do so can cost you an additional \$5.00. Also, the ASCS Office must notify IRS of every person receiving assistance and the amount received, just as all insurance and savings and loan companies must report to Internal Revenue all interests paid to you. All tax refundable gasoline purchased after June 30, 1965 through 1966, the tax refund claim will be made on your 1966 Income Tax Form — so keep those records.

Other points discussed were business expenses deductible, insurance premiums on farm buildings and machinery, soil and water conservation expenses, types of depreciation, and investment credit. Mr. Denton explained tax savings to the seller of selling real estate as an installment sale. Anyone buying anything on installment plan should have the amount of the interest stated in the installment contract so they can take the interest off their income tax. All persons 65 years or older are allowed an extra \$600.00 exemption on their income tax form.

The meeting was very informative and those present had many of their tax questions answered by Mr. Denton. As soon as the new Farmers' Income Tax Guide is received, they will be available in the County Agent's Office for free distribution.

TIPS ON HOLIDAY FOOD PREPARATION

Foods and nutrition specialists for the Texas A&M Extension Service have several good tips on how to safely prepare favorite holiday foods.

You should be particularly careful in your preparation of your stuffing. This holiday treat usually contains bread crumbs, seasonings, chicken broth, fat, perhaps an egg or two, and sometimes chestnuts and meats. Chances of bacterial growth are great, because the small pieces of food are handled often when the stuffing is prepared.

Stuff the turkey just before roasting it and combine the ingredients just before cooking time. If pork, such as sausage, is to be added to the stuffing, be sure it is thoroughly cooked.

You should never partially cook a bird ahead of time. If you do, the stuffing will only be warm by the time the bird is ready to be eaten. If the stuffing is not thoroughly cooked, bacterial growth will form more readily.

We must be careful to thoroughly cook all holiday foods. In five hours, there can be enough toxin to cause illness. In seven hours, at room temperature, the possibility of poisoning is even greater.

Don't let undercooked foods spoil a safe, pleasant holiday.
