Mrs. Jones was born in Denver, Colorado, reared in Amarillo, Texas, and is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene.

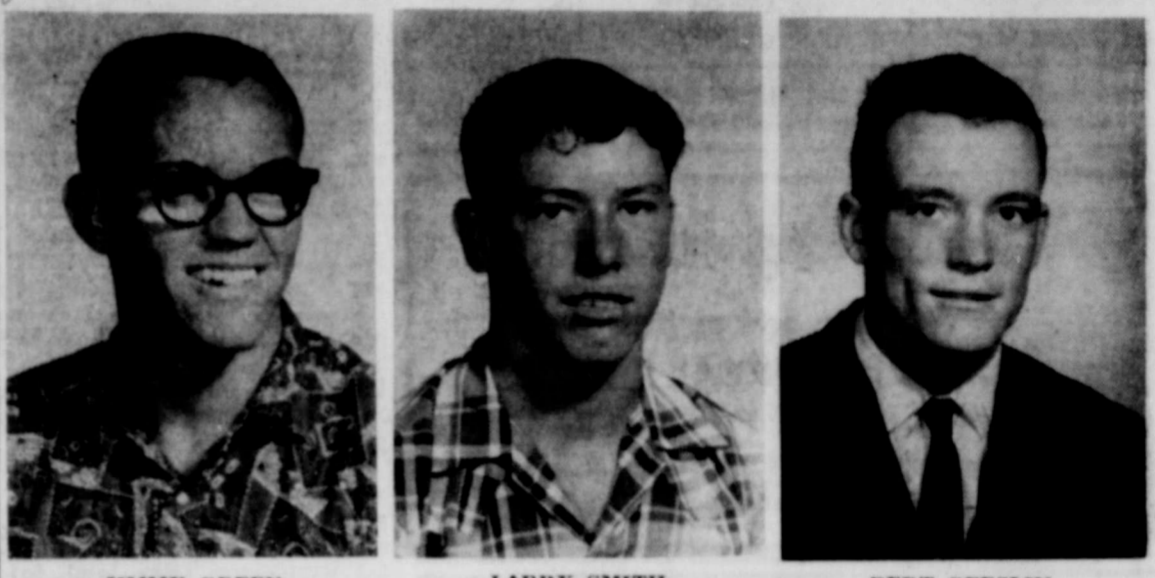
## Plans Are Outlined And Mills County Mohair Promotion Committee Named

The meeting of the Mohair Promotion Council, called here on Monday night, December 13, by temporary chairman, George Weddell, was attended by approximately thirty commercial producers in Mills County. The meeting was successful and everyone agreed that they must form a broad organization to follow through on research and the promotion of mohair. It was also agreed that without an organization of this type, the mohair industry would have little chance in competing with other fibers now in use, especially in America.

At the meeting held in Junction, Texas on November 11, the rules governing the Mohair Promotion Council were approved, and it was agreed that five cents per head would be the desired assessment for each producer. Every time a county raises \$500, one member of the county will be selected to serve on the Mohair Promotion Council. At this writing, Mills County has raised nearly \$500. Most of the producers present and contacted think that this county should at least raise \$1,500, which will give the county three members on the Council. Mills County has some 85,000 goats, and Texas has about 4,800,000 goats.

Governor Connally's Industrial Committee is now in the process of letting a contract for the study of mohair from the time it leaves the shearing pen, through the warehouses, to the factories, and back to the wholesale garment industry. Mohair producers are glad that this study is being made, so that all may know more about the mohair industry.

### New Grocery Building Contract Is Awarded To Truett Aldridge

Contract for construction of the new building for Loy Long Grocery was awarded to Truett Aldridge of Goldthwaite who submitted the low bid on the job. Aldridge's bid was \$37,565.00, it was announced by Loy Long and Dr. T. C. Graves, who is putting up the building on long term lease agreement for the new home for Loy Long Grocery.

Five contractors bid on the job. Work on clearing the site for the building is already underway and actual construction of the building is expected to get underway shortly after January 1.

The construction contract calls for the building to be completed in 120 days.

The new building will be constructed on a lot located on Fisher Street between First and Second Streets. The site is between the Graves Dental Building and Shelton Bros. Auto Parts. The building and parking area will take in the entire area which has a frontage of 178 feet and is 125 feet deep.

The building will be located in center and on the back of the lot with parking in front and at two sides of the building. There will be parking space for approximately 40 cars. The entire parking area will be paved.

The building will be 90 feet across the front and 60 feet deep, covering 5,400 square feet of floor space. There will be a small stock room and office and the balance will be devoted to selling area. Selling area in the new building will be approximately double that of the present store, Mr. Long stated.

Construction will be of masonry type with brick and glass front and tile side and back walls. The entire building will be completely air-conditioned for year around heating and cooling. The building will have tile floor and acoustical tile suspended ceiling.

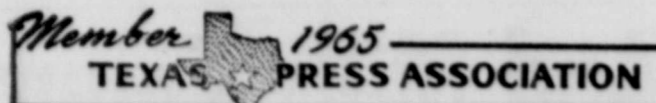

## Paul H. Walser, Guest Speaker At Garden Club Meeting December 15

The Goldthwaite Garden Club met Wednesday, December 15, at 7 o'clock in the Library club for the regular meeting. Ray King, president, presided at the business meeting. Mrs. Walter A. Bryant, Park Improvement chairman, announced that 21 holes had been dug for sumac shrubs, a part of the Park Improvement project. Mrs. King announced that Mrs. O. Weddell would do the landscaping and make cacti beds and the old well on the Lona highway. Mrs. King also announced the club for all the year put into the Yule Time Show held December 4. The Garden Club, in cooperation with other clubs in town, is

planning a Talent Show to be presented on March 4 and 5. In the absence of Mrs. Jim Weatherby, Therapy chairman, Mrs. King reported that at the Workshop held at the Methodist Fellowship Hall December 8, eighteen fresh material door swags had been completed and delivered to shut-ins of the city. Also 40 decorated Christmas balls were made and delivered to patients in the two nursing homes in Goldthwaite. After the business meeting, a refreshment plate of Christmas Cookies, toasted pecans, and coffee was served. The tea table was laid with an ecru linen and lace cloth over red and centered with a Christmas arrangement of red poinsettias, red Christmas ball and candles.

Mrs. W. P. Duren, leader for the program, "Conservation In Action," introduced Miss Norma Lee Robertson of Goldthwaite as, "Miss Conservation," a title she won recently in Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Survey. She also introduced Carl Casbeer of the local Soil Conservation office, who in turn introduced Mr. Paul H. Walser, Assistant State Conservationist of Temple, as the guest speaker.

Mr. Walser is a well known speaker on Soil Conservation and several ideas he brought out in his talk were: future of conservation is in the hands of women such as Garden Club members; preserving land; leveling and drainage of land; alteration of land not desirable; over-grazing of land; pollution of water (lakes and rivers); and destruction of natural beauty. He also said that conservation is the sound basis for good agriculture, good soil, protection of water sheds and that conservation is needed to produce food. Part of his talk was that conservation helps to protect wildlife, is applied to recreation and is a "Pattern of Beauty and Harmony."

### WHOLE OVEN MEALS SAVE TIME AND ENERGY

Whole meals can be prepared with one oven setting, saving the homemaker time and energy.

Combinations such as meat or fish, vegetable, desserts and breads can be prepared in the oven at the same time for unique flavor and saving of fuel. Another way to save time and energy in clean-up work is to bake these in bake and serve dishes.

To plan your meal, first select a vegetable, dessert or bread that can be cooked at the same temperature and for the same length of time as the meat being prepared. Or if the meat takes longer to cook than the other foods, start it first and put the vegetables and bread in later so that all finish cooking at the same time. This allows time for fixing a last minute salad and setting the table.

Since meat requires a more accurate setting of oven temperature than most other foods, plan your vegetables, dessert and bread around the recommended time and temperature for the meat dish.

If necessary, the vegetables and dessert can be cooked at temperatures 25 degrees lower for a longer time, or 25 degrees higher for a shorter time than the recipes or baking charts suggest.

Ideas for oven meals are included in Extension publication B-927, "Quick Meals." It's yours for the asking at the office of your county home demonstration agent.
