Bert Geeslin Named Semi-Finalist Merit Scholarship Competition

It has been announced by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation that Bert Geeslin, a senior at Star High School, has been named one of the Semi-Finalists in the 1965-66 Merit Scholarship competition. Geeslin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Geeslin, is among the highest-scoring students in the state of Texas on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Examination administered last March at 17,600 schools nationwide. More than 14,000 Semi-Finalists were appointed across the country.

Childress & Cruzcosa LVN School To Start Second Class February 7

Opening date for a new class for Childress & Cruzcosa School Of Vocational Nursing has been announced.

Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa, C. R. N. A., school director, set February 7, 1966 as the opening date of her second class.

She added that the number of students will be limited to eight to afford closer supervision.

Four have been accepted, leaving four more positions to be filled for the new class.

Essential requirements are the following:

1. Applicants must be residents of Mills County.
2. They should have at least finished second year high school or its equivalent.
3. They should not be older than fifty years old, younger

applicants given preference.

4. They should have the full approval and cooperation of their families before they apply.

All applicants are to be interviewed by Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa, medical school advisor, and Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa before final approval is given. The main purpose of such interviews, especially for those who have had no previous hospital experience, is to be informed as to what the school curriculum will consist of.

Mrs. Cruzcosa added that application should be made as soon as possible as positions will be filled with the first deserving applicants.

The school hopes to maintain its high scholastic record. Its first six graduates passed the State Board exam ranking fourth in the state.

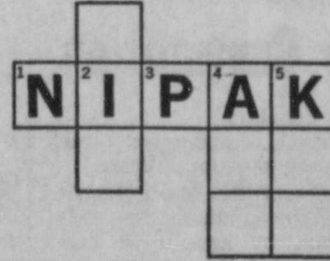
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Miss Betty Ann Robertson And Joe Edward Polk Repeat Vows

Mohair Promotion Council Rules

Following are the rules governing the Mohair Promotion Council.

TITLE

This organization shall be known as the Mohair Promotion Council.

PREAMBLE

The sole purpose of this Council shall be to promote mohair and its products through publicity, research and advertising.

MEMBERSHIP

Any individual, business firm, organization or association contributing to mohair promotion through this council shall be eligible to membership.

RULES

1. Any individual, business firm, organization or association contributing to this Council shall be entitled to appoint one member to the Board of Directors for each five hundred dollars they contribute. Directors shall serve one year or until a successor is appointed.

2. The Board of Directors shall have charge of the affairs of the Council and shall hold an annual meeting. At each of these annual meetings they shall elect an Executive Committee composed of five members. This committee shall see that the purpose and plans of the Council are carried out and, in the absence of instructions from the Board of Directors, shall have

the authority to proceed in such manner as their judgment shall dictate.

3. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to set the amount of annual membership dues and how it shall be collected. They also shall have the authority to determine how the money shall be spent, but must abide by the rules of this Council in so doing.

4. The Board of Directors shall elect or appoint at their first meeting a Secretary-Treasurer and select the bank they consider the most convenient as a depository for all funds of the council. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all monies received and its disbursement.

5. The Secretary - Treasurer shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors and serve for one year.

6. The Board of Directors shall not have the authority to enter into any contract that will exceed the amount of money on hand.

7. No funds of this Council shall be spent for anything or purpose other than Mohair promotion.

8. No funds of this council shall be spent for promotion of anything in connection with Mohair.

9. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to add to these rules.
