Manager W. J. Parks said, "We are very pleased to be able to make these refunds because this fulfills the Cooperative's obligation to truly furnish electric service at cost. It is necessary to retain the margins long enough to maintain a reasonable reserve fund against emergencies and to build a good member's equity in the Cooperative. The Cooperative now does have these necessary funds and the Board of Directors and management are most happy that we can make these re-

unds." Each year the amount of left over after all expenses of operation have been met is allocated to the members in proportion to their total bill. This money which is left over is not called a "profit" because it does not belong to the cooperative—it belongs to the members. For this reason, it is called the "margin" and is shown as belonging to the member in the ledger accounts of the Co-op.

The refund of \$37,000 was mailed to the members in time for Christmas and gave an added boost to the economy of the entire area. There were over 3,000 individual checks and the amount represented 15% of the total electric bills paid during the period 1944 through 1945.
