Snow Blankets Mills County

A heavy blanket of snow covered the entire Mills County area this week bringing much needed moisture to winter grain and range land.

Harry Allen, weatherman, reported six inches of snowfall for Goldthwaite. Some reported snowfall from less than six inches to eight and nine inches in unofficial measurements.

It started to snow in Goldthwaite Monday night about eight o'clock and by 10 p. m. the ground was sporting a light white cover. By early Tuesday morning there was a heavy blanket of snow over the area and it kept up a steady fall until late Tuesday night.

Driving on roads and highways in Mills County Tuesday was hazardous and continued until midday Wednesday, when a warming trend moved in and ice began to disappear.

Eagle To Publish 11th Special Soil Conservation Issue May 19

Plans are underway for the eleventh special Soil Conservation edition of the Eagle to be published on Thursday, May 19, it was announced this week. The announcement was made by members of the Eagle staff and Elgin Smith, supervisor of the local work unit, Soil Conservation Service.

Members of the Eagle staff, members of the Soil Conservation Service and a number of other interested individuals will take part in preparing material for this special edition.

The special edition will come out on Thursday during Soil Stewardship Week which will be observed this year from May 15 through May 22. Many churches in the area will observe Soil Stewardship Sunday on May 22.

The theme for Soil Stewardship Week this year is: "Crisis In The Countryside."

Last year the tenth annual such edition, received favorable comment from a wide area. There were more than fifty special feature articles and pictures telling the story of benefits from soil conservation practices. A large number of business firms and individuals who are interested in the program carried special advertising messages in the issue. Also a number of contractors who do much of the work in connection with soil conservation practices in the area.

Plans this year call for more pictures of soil conservation and range management practices and their benefits in Mills County.

A number of those who carried ads in last year's issue have already indicated that they will again want space this year for their special messages.

Work on preparing material is already underway and typesetting on feature stories for the issue will start soon.

Sale Of 1966 License Plates Is Going Slowly

Sale of 1966 license plates for cars, trucks and trailers, is going at a slow pace, it was announced Wednesday by H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector.

To date only 200 new license plates have been issued auto owners while last year on the same date 300 had been issued, according to Brooks.

Deadline for purchase of new license plates without penalty is March 31. New tags must be on cars, trucks and trailers by April 1.

Brown & Mullin Creeks Watershed Flood Control Work Plan Approved

The Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District and Mills County Commissioners' Court approved the work plan for flood control on Brown and Mullin Creeks in Mills County last Tuesday, at a meeting in Goldthwaite.

The co-sponsors had called the meeting of all interested Federal, State and local agencies to review the proposed work plan as prepared by the Soil Conservation Service.

The Brown-Mullin Watershed, a part of the Middle Colorado River Basin, is that part of the Pecan Bayou drainage

area located in Mills County below the confluence of Blanket Creek. The Watershed comprises an area of 134 square miles, or 85,760 acres.

The plan calls for construction of seven floodwater retarding dams, having a total sediment storage and floodwater detention capacity of 6,494 acre feet. The total estimated installation cost of the structural measures is \$623,629.00.

The estimated average annual flood damages without the project are \$31,748, at long-term price levels. With a conservation land treatment program and structural measures installed, these annual flood damages will be reduced 64 per cent. The ratio of the average annual benefits to the average annual cost is \$1.30 benefits for each \$1.00 cost.

Actual cost of the structural measures is borne by the Soil Conservation Service under the authority of the Flood Control Act of 1944. Easements and rights-of-way for construction are provided by local interests. Operation and maintenance of the structures will be performed by the Commissioners Court through arrangements with the Soil and Water Conservation District.

Scott Lanford, Chairman of the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District, presided at the meeting. Those attending the review included County Judge and the Commissioners Court of Mills County; Supervisors of Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District; local landowners, and representatives from State Health Department, Corps of Army Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Soil Conservation Service.

E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist, and Paul Kenner, Planning Party Leader of the Soil Conservation Service, Brownwood, explained the Work Plan as prepared by the Soil Conservation Service.

Candidates have until March 5, to file with City Secretary Collier and have their name printed on the official ballot.

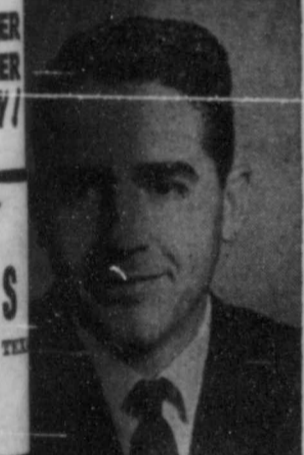

Seniors Present Talent Show Friday Night

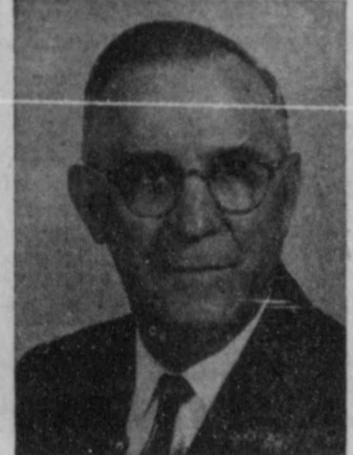

HOUSEPLANTS REQUIRE OCCASIONAL BATHS

To stay healthy, house plants need an adequate supply of warm water, not cold, which may chill or even shock them. Most plants should be thoroughly soaked once a week, but never over-watered.

It is important to know each plant's preference regarding sunlight and temperature. In general, foliage plants thrive between 60 and 70 degrees and should not be "roasted" near a radiator in winter. Fertilize plants at regular intervals, and provide proper drainage and soil aeration.

Cleanliness is vital because plants breathe through tiny pores which lace their leaves. If these become clogged, plants wither and die. Thus dust and soot should be removed, and the easiest and best method is with soap and water. Washing leaves gently helps a plant to maintain both its health and luster.

If the plant is reasonably sturdy, put it into a sink or tub of tepid soapsuds. To protect the soil, first cut a piece of plastic to fit the top of the pot allowing an inch of overhang. Slash this plastic to the center, fit it around the plant, and fasten it around the edge of the pot with an elastic band. Up-end the plant and swish it gently through the suds until clean, then rinse it the same way.

When leaves are broad and not too dense, they can be washed individually. Dip a sponge or soft cloth in warm soapsuds and wash both sides of every leaf, supporting it from underneath with one hand. Rinse with a fine spray of clean water, or with a sponge or cloth wrung out of clear water. When stems are long and there is danger of breakage, or if the plant is in bloom, leaves

must be sudsed individually instead of being immersed. After washing, some plants—such as African violets—should be kept out of sunshine until the leaves are completely dry.

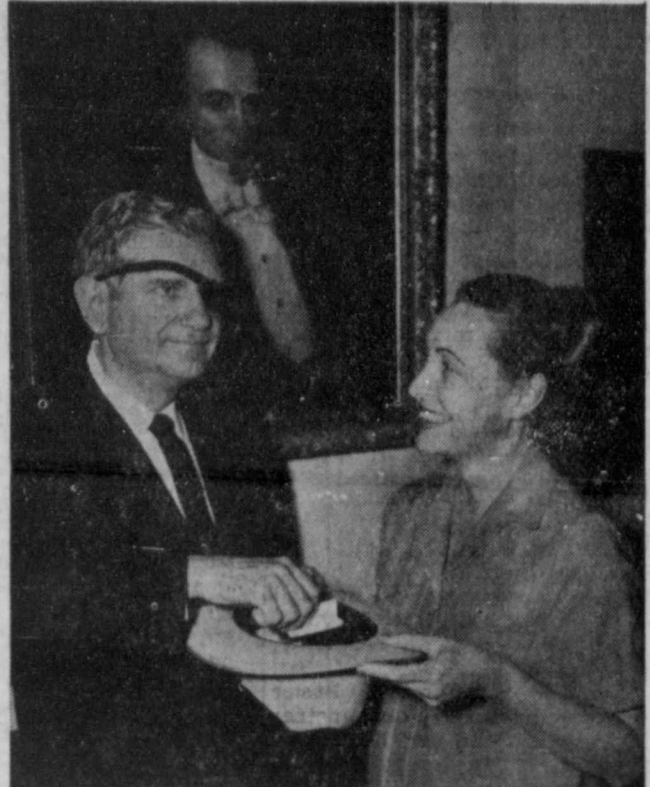
If foliage is very fragile, spray soapsuds over it with an atomizer; then spray-rinse the same way. This technique is especially good for loosening and washing off the sooty mold which often attacks sensitive gardenia plants. Once foliage is clean and dry, a commercial plant polish may be applied evenly over each large leaf—or may be sprayed over tiny-leaved plants from an aerosol dispenser.

PLANT CARE—INSECTS AND BACTERIA

Don't wait until house plants are infested with insects or bacteria before doing something about this problem. A weekly bath in sudsy water is the recommended method for controlling these annoying pests. Place the plants in a sink or bathtub and wash all exposed areas with suds, using a soft flat paint brush about an inch long. Make sure no bugs are lodged in the joints of the branches, then spray the plants with clear water.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture affirms a need for washing by stating: "It doesn't always take an insecticide to rid house plants of insects and other pests. Sometimes a bath will do the trick. Washing with soapy water and a soft brush (or cloth) may be all that's needed to remove aphids, mealybugs, and scale insects from broad-leaved plants."

This pest-removal treatment can be supplemented by using a toothpick wound with cotton and dipped into soapsuds to lift them away. Or scrape insects off of sturdy leaves with an old toothbrush dipped into sudsy water.

Heavier Ballot With Amendments For Texans In November Election

Texans will have a heavier general election ballot next November than usual with the appearance of 16 proposed Constitutional Amendments on the voting agenda.

In a public drawing in Austin, Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin drew numbers from a hat to determine the sequence in which the amendments will appear on the November 8 ballot.

At the top of the ballot, getting the Number One designation, is the amendment "to provide that all land owned by

natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Other proposed amendments are less confusing in their text. Some of the others, and their number on the ballot, are:

Abolishment of the poll tax (Number 7), allowing members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote (Number 14) and \$200,000,000 in water development bonds (Number 11).

All together the proposed amendments contain about 14,300 words.

To help Texans understand the proposed Amendments, they will be published in Texas newspapers beginning in August.

The work was prepared by the Architect of the Capitol under the direction of Congressman Burleson, as Chairman of the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress and also Chairman of the House Administration Committee. In presenting the compilation, Burleson said, "This volume catalogs the works of art reposing in our best-loved National shrine, the United States Capitol, and adds both luster and dimension to the rich heritage of America."
