**GREETINGS:**  
Special observance of increased emphasis on our education system has been marked annually for fifteen years by a Public Schools Week in Texas.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with their school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our tomorrow's leaders with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period of March 5-11, 1966, as

## Diversion Programs Have Built-In Natural Disaster Insurance Feature

Farmers taking part in the 1966 wheat, feed grain, and cotton diversion programs have built-in insurance against natural disaster, according to Ralph Duren, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Mills County Committee.

The Chairman explained that last year, when flood, drought, and other such natural disasters prevented farmers from carrying out their signed-up program intentions, special legislation was enacted to enable participants to qualify for the program payments, and thus meet the emergency situation. Because of the experience, similar provisions were included in the omnibus Food and Agriculture Act of 1965, enacted last November.

Therefore, farmers who sign up to take part in the 1966 wheat, feed grain, or cotton programs may still qualify for feed grain and cotton price support payments and wheat marketing certificates if the farmer files a special application at the ASCS county office and it can be determined that disaster conditions prevented the planting of part or all of the acreage intended for production under the adjustment programs. However, the acreage would not qualify for the disaster benefits if it was subsequently devoted to any income-producing crop for harvest in 1966.

The price-support payments and certificates available under this program provision would be figured on the projected yield of the unplanted acres. Ordinarily, the payments and certificates are computed on the projected yield of the "acreage planted for harvest."

This insurance feature of the program assures the program participant that he will have some income from acreage he intends using for production even though he may be overtaken by natural disaster.

## Four Candidates File For Places On City Ballot

Four candidates have filed to have their names placed on the official ballot for the four places to be filled in the forthcoming city election on April 5, according to Glynn Collier, city secretary.

J. Raymond Little has filed as a candidate for mayor. Incumbent mayor H. B. Campbell did not seek re-election stating that he felt serving on the council and as mayor for a period of nine years was long enough.

Candidates filing for the three aldermen places to be filled are incumbent V. A. Hudson and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa and E. R. Bruce. Other aldermen whose terms expire this year are Ray Duren and Lewis T. Hudson.

This week Saturday, March 5, is the last day for candidates to file and have their names placed on the official ballot. The City election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 5, and the filing deadline is 30 days before the election.

## New Law Voter Registration Starts Today

Supplemental voter registration under the new law passed by the Texas Legislature in special session will get underway in Mills County today, H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, has announced.

Registration will be from March 3 through March 17, at the tax assessor-collector's office in Mills County Courthouse. There is no charge for registration.

Those persons who paid their February 11 poll taxes need not register.

Also persons over 60 years of age; Mrs. Amos who are exempt by law need not register in counties of over 10,000 population, which includes Mills County.

All persons who would have been required to purchase a poll tax or get an exemption certificate under the old law to be qualified to vote, and failed to do so, must register in order to vote, Brooks stated.

Brooks also stated that children of legal voting age may register their parents and parents may register their children, but outside of these cases no person may not register another.

## Clean-Up Campaign Next Week

The Goldthwaite Garden Club, in cooperation with city officials, is sponsoring a Clean-Up, Paint-Up, and Fix-Up campaign for Goldthwaite beginning March 7 and continuing through March 11.

All home owners, all businessmen and residents of the city are requested to do their part in the clean-up drive in seeing that all alleys and vacant lots are cleaned during the drive.

The city is giving the fullest cooperation to the Garden Club's civic project in the hope that this year's clean-up week will be more effective than ever before.

City trucks will be made available for hauling away trash, rubbish and debris, according to W. C. Barnett, city manager. Hauling will be done by city crews on Thursday, the 10th, and Friday, the 9th, according to Barnett, who is urging everyone to do as much of their clean-up work as possible before hauling gets underway. Trash must be placed in a pile where it is easily accessible for trucks to pick up.

Mayor Howard B. Campbell has issued a proclamation in support of this spring clean-up, paint-up, and fix-up drive.

There will be no supper served, according to the announcement.

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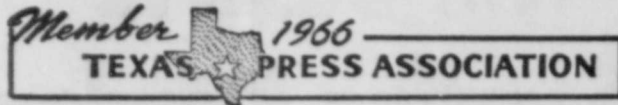

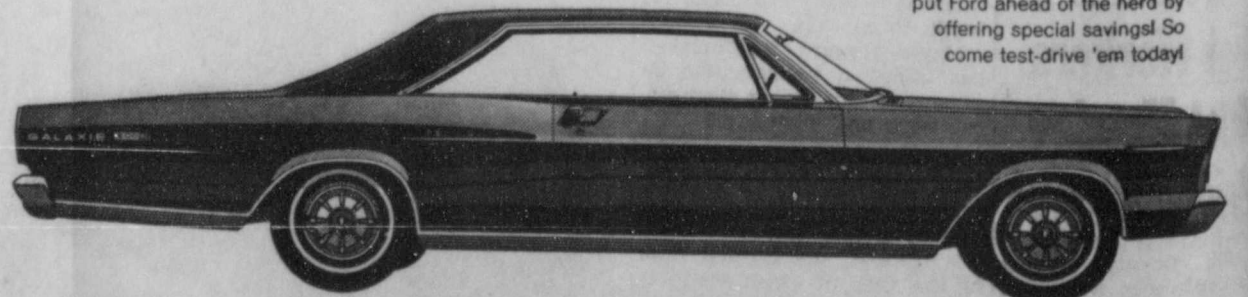

### PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK IN TEXAS RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: Since the founding of the Texas Public School System 112 years ago, the growth and development of our State has been tied closely to the educational advantages available to Texas citizens and depend upon the continuance and furtherance of educational opportunities for all Texas children; and

WHEREAS: The Texas Citizens' Committee for Public Schools Week in 1951 originated the observance annually of this Week for citizens to visit in the schools; and

WHEREAS: House concurrent Resolution No. 161 of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session, 1965 urges citizens of Texas to participate in the annual visitation programs of our public schools, reminding visitors in the schools of each citizen's obligations and responsibilities as a contributing member of a free, self-governing society; and

WHEREAS: Members of the State Board of Education are mindful and grateful for this continued interest of the people of Texas in their public schools;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

That the State Board of Education hereby designates the week of March 7 to 11, 1966, as the sixteenth annual Public Schools Week in Texas, and urges all citizens in the State to visit a public school during that week; and

That the State Commissioner of Education and the State Department of Education staff shall join with the State Board of Education in encouraging public school administrators and teachers to work with individual citizens, parent-teacher organizations, and other organizations and agencies interested in improving educational opportunities to the children of their respective communities; and

SEWING TIPS

If you do a lot of home sewing, chances are that you need a good centralized place to store all of your sewing attachments, gadgets, materials, etc. Reba Broyles, Extension clothing specialist at Texas A&M University, has a good suggestion for storing these items.

If you have a spare bedroom closet—one you don't need for clothes—turn it into a storage area for sewing supplies and equipment. A closet makes an ideal hide-away for all those little things you need in sewing.

For example, tape, thread, scissors and patterns can be arranged on the back of the closet door. A few hooks, shelves and bins will hold them nicely and put them within easy reach.

In the closet itself, install a four-drawer chest. Or have the handyman around your house build these drawers to order—with lots of partitions for the little "extra" things that accompany sewing. Allow space above the drawers to store your

portable sewing machine. For things in the making and on the mend, add additional shelves as space permits.

One extra step in making "heavy duty" items, such as children's play clothes, helps to guarantee finished garments which fit as well after repeated launderings as when new.

This step entails putting the yardage through a complete wash-rinse-dry-press cycle before spreading it out for cutting. If fabric is going to shrink—and even pre-shrunk cloth tends to shrink a bit, especially if dryer-dried—it will do so before being cut. The finished garment will then retain its original size and shape through countless washings. When pressing yardage after pre-washing, avoid setting a deep center crease. If piece goods must be ironed double, don't press down hard on the folded edge while damp.

If the fabric is either very bright or deep-toned, pre-washing is particularly useful since such color tends to "bleed" into the water during the first laundering. This means it cannot be washed even with other colored items until the excess surface dye has been flushed away by a series of sudings and rinsings. Accomplishing this before cutting does away with special handling later, assuring that the finished piece can be safely laundered with other colored washables right from the start.

An added caution: before pre-washing loosely-woven or slippery fabric, turn in the raw edges and baste a temporary hem to prevent troublesome raveling.

A practical version of the popular simulated leathers is a textile material in a wide range of colors—plus finishes that vary from Morocco, kid, and calfskin to suede and even patent. This "leather"—designed for apparel, footwear, and accessories—is breathable for wearing comfort and is completely sudable for convenient care.

CONTAINER CARE

Porous or glazed clay flowerpots re-used repeatedly for planting, transplanting, or decorating must be kept clean and spray-free. They need to be scrubbed thoroughly and often with hot suds—for good appearance, and also because dirt residue often contains disease "bugs" or insects that destroyed the previous plant. If left-over soil is not washed out, it remains to re-poison new soil and damage the plant.

Use a stiff-bristled or wire brush, well-lathered, to wash the pots and their saucers. Very dirty pots may need to be soaked for a few hours in a pail of hot suds to loosen caked earth or the white film which insecticides or fertilizers sometimes deposit on porous clay surfaces. Some experts suggest adding ½ cup of bleach to the suds. Rinse several times, and line the lowerpots up in the sun to dry.

House plants should be transplanted occasionally to make room for growing roots. Use a pot one size larger than the one the plant has been in. If the pot is old, scrub it inside and out with a stiff brush and thick suds to prevent the spread of disease. A new earthenware pot should be soaked overnight before planting.

Before painting pots, wash them so the painted surface will be smooth. When finished, with flowerpots for the season, wash them clean, pile them in stacks according to size, and store them in a cool dry place.

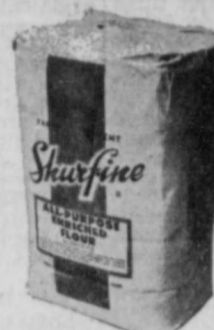

USS Barry (DD-933) (FH-TNC)—Navy Ensign Luther L. Schoen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Erwin Schoen of Priddy, Texas, participated in Operation "Double Eagle" the largest amphibious landing ever made in Vietnam, while serving with this command.

The assault landing of a large U. S. Marine force near Thach Tru, 30 miles south of Chu Lai, began when a 13-ship Naval Task Force steamed into the objective area in the predawn hours of January 28.

Fight waves of assault troops were landed on the beaches, while warships patrolled offshore to provide naval gunfire support. The Marines were virtually unopposed, and received only light small arms fire.

Late in the afternoon of January 29, more Marines were landed by helicopter four miles inland from the beachhead.

These forces, also reported seeing enemy fleeing the area, changing from green forces uniforms to pajama-like garb of Cong.

Annual budget for Goldthwaite school system this year is \$237,631. This does not include lunchroom operations. There are 29 teachers and administrators in the school system. The school system operates six buses and two private carriers driving approximately 102,000 miles per year. Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land. Total enrollment for the 1965-66 year has now reached 514 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary school. ## Louis Crump Drops Out Of Senate Race

State Senator Louis Crump of San Saba has withdrawn from the state senate race he announced last Saturday.

In making his announcement he issued the following statement from his home in San Saba.

"It is with much regret and only after long hours of deliberation that I have arrived at the decision to withdraw from my previously announced intention of running for Senator for the newly created 12th Senatorial District. The 12th District is comprised of twenty-seven counties extending from the Dallas-Tarrant county line on South to Bexar County, West to Tom Green County and from the Trinity River on the Northeast past the Guadalupe River on the Southwest.

"Although my family and I have many friends throughout this area and have had much encouragement these past weeks, I find that to continue this race would require the ex-

penditure of funds that I do not have. I cannot obligate myself for these funds, and I cannot, considering the welfare of my family, obligate my future for such enormous expenditures as appear necessary to complete this campaign. The alternative would be to accept contributions from sources with whom I do not desire to become associated or to impose upon my friends. I refuse to do either.

"We regret greatly the disappointment my withdrawal may bring to our many friends and supporters. Reports of progress made in the campaign have been enthusiastic and encouraging. However, I am confident our many loyal friends do not expect my family and me to suffer this financial burden and will understand the necessity for this decision.

"Words can never express the appreciation my wife, my daughter and I have for those who have supported us with their consideration, their votes, and their prayers. This decision has not been arrived at lightly, nor am I ruling out the possibility of offering myself for future public service.

"I shall always value the friendship of my colleagues in the Senate, the House, Governor Connally, Lt. Gov. Smith and my special friend Speaker Ben Barnes.

"I pledge continued service to my County, District and State."

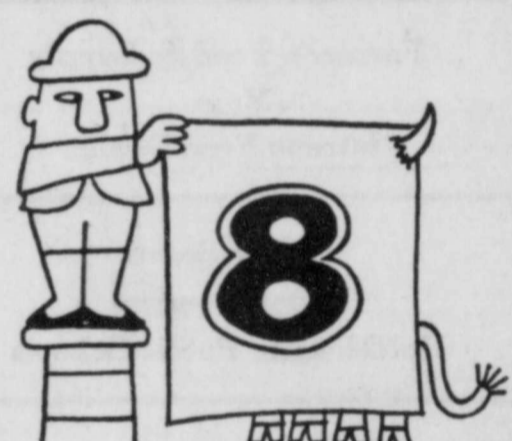
