Supt. Fields Hines Is Honored At P-TA Founders' Day Program

The Lometa P-TA honored a very surprised outstanding educator, Fields Hines, Supt. of Lometa schools, at a special Founders' Day program.

The program was narrated by Gordon Kirby, who gave some highlights of the life of Mr. Hines.

Mr. Hines was born in the Scallorn community in 1911, son of Mrs. Frank Hines and late Mr. Hines. He attended school at Scallorn and later graduated from Goldthwaite High School. Following his graduation he attended Howard College in Brownwood.

He began his teaching career at the Scallorn School in the fall of 1931, and taught two years. In the fall of 1933, he taught in the Naruna School and taught two years there.

In 1934 he was married to Bonnie Wheeler. He started teaching in the Lometa Public Schools, and continued teaching through the school year 1941.

The War interrupted his teaching for a time, and he entered defense work and took basic training at Ragood AFB near Chicago, Ill. Later he was stationed at Lincoln, Neb., for about a year in the teaching staff for Uncle Sam. From Lincoln he was stationed at Willow Springs AFB in Michigan for a year and following that at Seattle, Washington for about a year.

Sheep Flocks In Mills County To Be Inspected

It was announced this week that the Texas Animal Health Commission assisted by the Animal Health Division of the United States Department of Agriculture will conduct an extensive inspection of all sheep flocks within Mills County, which started Monday.

All inspections are under the supervision of Dr. J. B. Henderson, Area Veterinarian, and will be conducted in Mills County by inspectors Harry Dunnam and Joe Davis.

The inspectors have announced that this is a range inspection and sheep do not have to be placed in a pen for the inspection.

As a result of two outbreaks of sheep scabies within the last year other states have imposed dipping requirements that hamper the marketing of Texas sheep. Relinquishing of these requirements will be considered upon an inspection of all flocks without evidence of scabies being found. Industry cooperation is needed so that the necessary inspections may be conducted in an organized manner with a minimum of inconvenience to the sheep producer.

Thirty Register By Tuesday Noon Under New Voter Registration Law

Thirty persons registered in Mills County by Tuesday noon under the new Texas Voter Registration Law, according to H. G. Brooks, tax assessor-collector.

Registration started last Thursday, March 3, and will continue until next week Thursday, March 17. Applications for conditional voter registration certificate must reach the office of the assessor and collector of taxes not later than midnight, March 17, 1966.

Brooks announced that his office is open from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a. m. to 12 noon on Saturday to serve persons who desire to register under the new law.

Copy of application for conditional voter registration certificate appears in this issue of the paper.

COUNTY BOARD

Trustees on the County School Board serve a two year term. Col. V. Z. Cornelius is seeking re-election in precinct 1; Carylon Wall is a candidate for re-election in precinct 2, and J. D. Berry is a candidate for re-election in precinct 4.

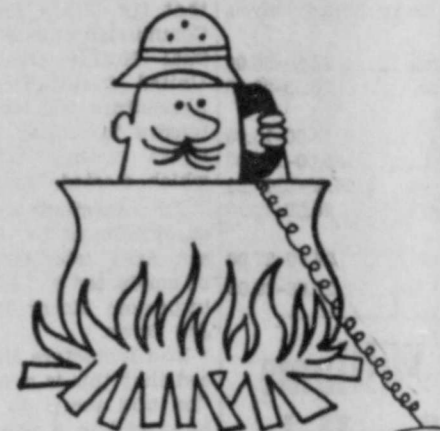
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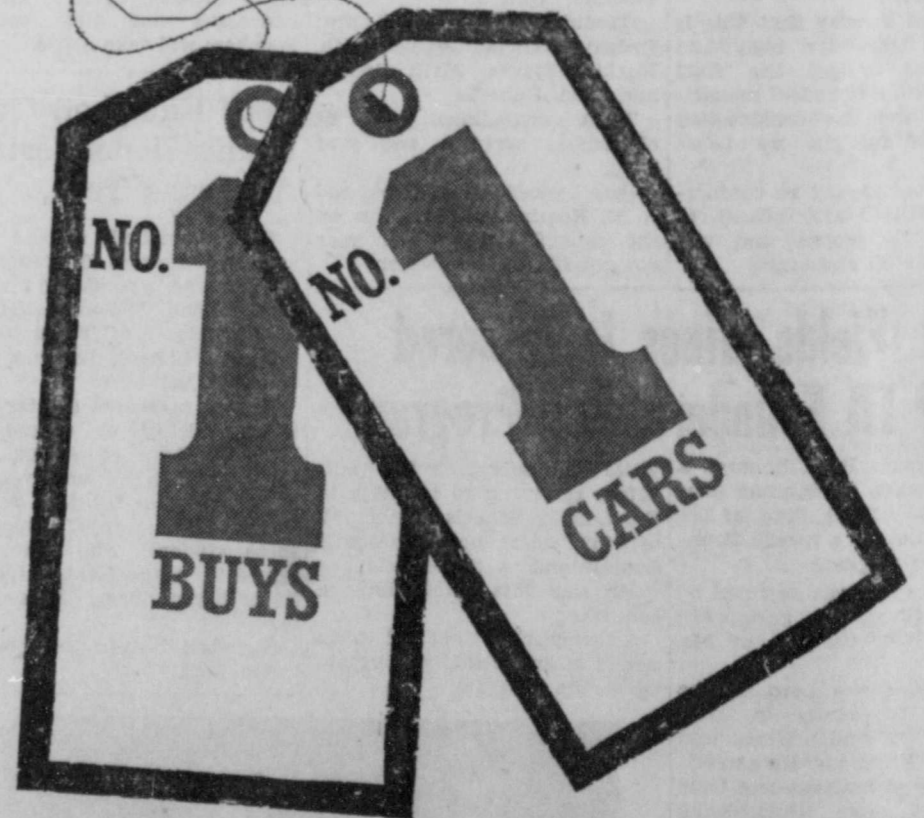

The Lenten season generally increases interest in consumer information about the various kinds of fish in best supply.

Cold storage holding of edible fishery products on January 1 of this year were approximately 16 million pounds higher than during the corresponding period in 1965, says Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Texas A&M Extension consumer marketing specialist.

Some frozen items in heavier supply than last year include fish sticks and portions, crab meat, scallops and breaded shrimp.

The 1965 pack of canned red salmon was especially good—two million standard cases—an increase of 1,168,000 over the small 1964 pack. Salmon is packed mainly in three different cans, the one-pound tall and one-pound flat, each containing two cups and serving four. The half pound flat can contains one cup and serves two. The quarter-pound flat can containing 3/4 ounces is less common and serves only one.

Canned salmon is economical as well as healthful. The entire contents of the container can be used. The attractive color and delicate flavor of salmon combine nicely with such extenders as rice, noodles, spaghetti, corn meal, and potatoes without losing its identity in the dish.

Food packages can be very useful, says Mrs. Clyatt. Food packages protect our food, and are convenient to buy and store. Some of the food bought in certain packages can be eaten out of or cooked in the contain-

The wise food shopper looks for the net contents on the package even though she may have difficulty finding it.

Price increases sometimes are misleading by use of a smaller package for the same price. The color or shape of the package may make a new package look as large as the original.

You, as the consumer, can stop package deception. Anytime you find misrepresentation, or any attempt to de-

ceive, discuss it with the store manager. If enough people call this to his attention, the manufacturer will hear about it. Particularly he will get the message if you stop buying the "new" package. Your purchase is a vote for the product.

Mahon Issues Opening Statement In Congressional Race



ELDON MAHON

Mahon, Abilene attorney-businessman, has issued the following statement concerning his candidacy for the U. S. Congressional race in the 17th District:

"I feel that there is a definite need for a change in our district representation in Washington. If I didn't feel this way, I had not found a substantial amount of agreement with voters with whom I've talked—I wouldn't be making this statement."

"The reasons for feeling that a change are based on the fact that our district has always been represented in Washington by the kind of individuals and enthusiasm I think we need to get the results our district needs and deserves."

"I am announcing my candidacy originally, I have personally visited all twenty-four counties of the new 17th district and have been extremely impressed by the widespread support and encouragement I've received. There appear to be many who feel as I do that it is time for a change."

"I have selected, I will start work immediately upon my arrival in Washington to be assigned to those committees that deal with the problems affecting our new district and in this way endeavor to do something concrete and meaningful."

"The scene of action is now in the national Congress. We of the new 17th district must have our voice heard in Washington stronger than it has been in the past. We need a representative who is truly concerned with the new 17th district needs, one who will listen to all the people, then represent their interests in an effective, effective manner. If I am elected, I intend to be that kind of Congressman."

"Although I have been a member of the Administration's 'rubber-stamp' Congress for the Administration's terms. Nor, on the other hand, will I be a rubber-stamp member of measures that are not automatically each time a new proposal comes up."

"I believe that too much control of our government's affairs has passed out of the hands of Congress, and into the hands of the regulatory and administrative agencies. This authority, which has been lost by default, must be re-claimed by the Congress. The trend of transferring authority to agencies and commissions—who are supposed to administer the government instead of make them—must be halted. I think it is time that Congress recognize its usurpation of its power and authority for what it is: government by bureaucracy. When Congress loses its authority, the people lose theirs, for Congress is the voice of the people."

"One of my most important objectives is to get something done about our district's water situation. There is no greater problem facing the new 17th district than the need for adequate water, now and in the future. I will work for and support any feasible legislation that promises to create greater water resources for our area. Legislation is a must, because we don't have enough water as it is, and to neglect it further would be to compound a tragedy. The problem is of such magnitude that it is going to require great study, imagination and vision to solve it. I, for one, am ready to begin."

"Farming is another area in which something must be done that would be of direct benefit to our district. I believe that the present Omnibus Farm Bill places too much authority in the hands of the Agricultural Department and its Secretary. A glaring example of this is the arbitrary policy ruling by the Department which changes skip-row planting in such a way that it works a great hardship on most of our district's farmers. If elected to Congress, I will start working at once to get skip-row planting rules amended so that our farmers can again engage in the kind of farming that is most productive and profitable for them."

"The oil and gas industry is, of course, vital to all of us in the district and—as a Congressman—I would support legislation aimed toward putting it in a healthier condition. Oil and gas is a prime business—an indispensable business—and contributes heavily to the welfare of the district. I am in full accord with the 27½% oil depletion allowance, and would resist any measure that would seek to change it."

"As to my position on government spending, I might point out that I have always been opposed to excessive federal spending, and see no excuse whatever for the kind of waste in government that we have tolerated in the past. There is no justification for deficit spending except during times of national emergency. These are prosperous times and it is now that we should be paying the national debt, rather than creating more of it. After all, if we don't pay off our debt during good times, when do we pay it?"

"Regarding Viet Nam, I will always support an unyielding stand against communism, and I feel that there is no other tenable position for us to take in Asia than that which the President has taken. We simply cannot afford to be soft toward an ideology that has set out to destroy our own way of life. At all times, of course, I believe we should keep the doors open for possible negotiations that would bring about a peaceful solution to open conflicts such as we have in Viet Nam. Our goal there is to stop aggression on the part of the communists toward a peaceful people who have every right to seek their own destiny."

Mahon is running for the congressional seat now held by Rep. Omar Bureson of Anson. He is a native of Lorraine, Texas, son of a pioneer West Texas family, and a graduate of McMurry College and the University of Texas.

A former District Judge and District Attorney, Mahon is a partner in the Abilene law firm of Mahon, Pope and Glandon, and is a partner and general manager of radio station KVMC in Colorado City, in addition to maintaining farming interests in Mitchell County, Texas. His wife is a registered nurse, a graduate of Kendrick Memorial Hospital School of Nursing in Abilene, where they own their own home.

Mahon is on the board of trustees of McMurry College, is active in the Chamber of Commerce, the Lions Club and many other civic organizations, and is an overseas veteran of World War II.

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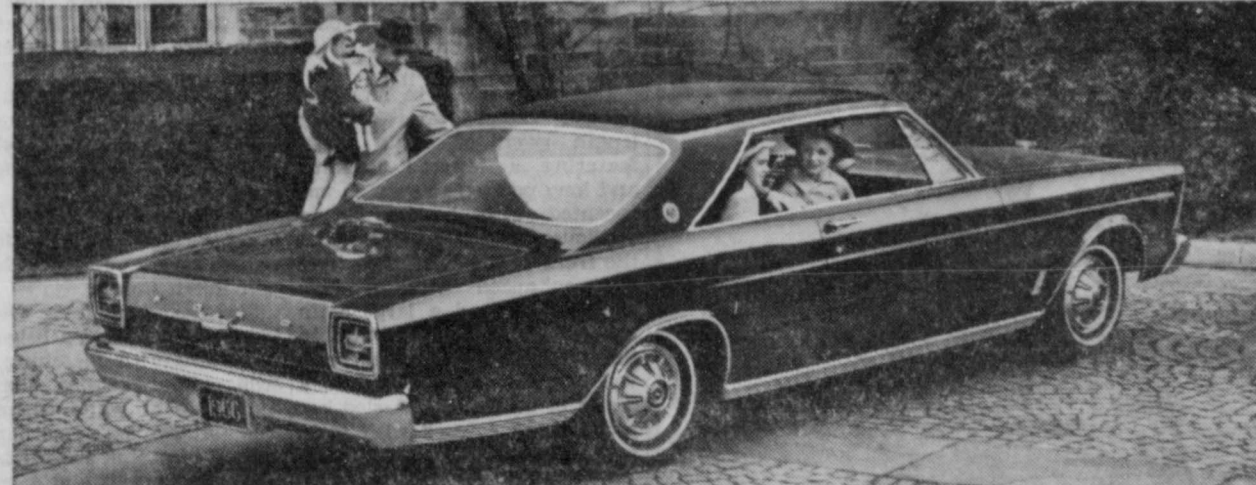

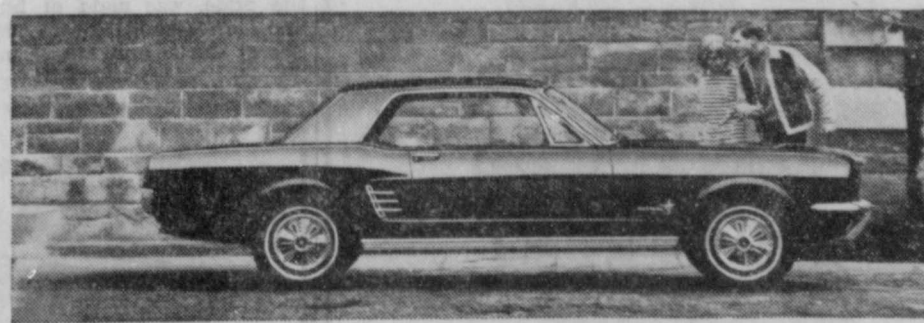
