Increases In Postal Services Are Scheduled To Start This Saturday

Increases in money orders, insurance, registry, certified mail and C. O. D. rates will become effective March 26, 1966, Acting Postmaster Ray Duren said today.

Fees for money orders, registry and C. O. D. were last changed in 1961; insurance and certified mail in 1957.

The increases include:

Money Order Fees: Domestic and international money order fees will be increased by 5 cents.

Insurance Fees: The minimum fee bracket will be increased from \$10 to \$15 and the minimum fee will be 20 cents instead of 10 cents. The revised insurance fees will be as follows:

\$ 0.01-\$ 15	20 cents
15.01- 50	30 cents
50.01- 100	40 cents
100.01- 150	50 cents
150.01- 200	60 cents

Registry Fees: The present 60 cents and 75 cents fees will be combined into a single fee at 75 cents for values up to \$100.

C. O. D. Fees: The present 40 cents and 50 cents fee brackets will be combined into one fee bracket at 60 cents for amounts up to \$10.

Certified Mail: The fee will be increased 10 cents from the present 20 cents per item to 30 cents.

Project Will Include 36 Units; 24 Will Be Designed For Elderly

The Public Housing Administration—in the Department of Housing and Urban Development, has announced approval of a Federal loan for construction of 36 low-rent homes in Goldthwaite, it was announced here this week by L. B. Burnham, chairman, and Clyde Cockrum, Executive Director, of the Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite.

Twenty-four of the 36 units are to be designed for the elderly, the announcement stated.

Mayor Howard B. Campbell also received a telegram from Congressman O. C. Fisher which stated: "Department of Housing and Urban Development has Authorized \$463,000.00 Federal Loan for Construction of 36 low-rent homes at Goldthwaite. Twenty-four will be designed for the elderly."

Average cost to build and equip the new homes is estimated at \$9,136 each. The Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite will award all contracts for construction.

A \$463,003 Federal loan will be repaid by the Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite from proceeds of the sale of its long-term bonds to private investors.

The loan will provide funds for construction and equipment, site acquisition and improvement, utilities, planning and design fees, space for management and maintenance and tenant activities, interest on the loan, and administrative costs.

A contract between PHA and the Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite also provides for annual contributions by the Federal Government. These contributions help keep rents within the means of low-income families.

The 36-unit project is part of a long-range building and improvement program by the City of Goldthwaite. This "Workable Program for Community Improvement" is required for Federal aid for public housing. Goldthwaite is also eligible for Federal urban renewal assistance in carrying out its civic improvement program.

Further details may be obtained from Clyde Cockrum, Executive Director or L. B. Burnham, Chairman, of the Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite.

Milton Schwartzes Attend 20th Annual Stockholders Meet

Mr. and Mrs. Milton Schwartz spent Sunday and Monday in Dallas where they attended the 20th annual stockholders meeting of Affiliated Food Stores, of which Schwartz Food Store is a member.

Over 3,000 stockholders, wives and special guests attended the annual meeting when directors and officers were elected for the new year and progress reports were heard.

Theme of their meeting was: "Progress — Yes, We Are Going Places." The organization was chartered for only 50 members in 1946 and has grown to 712 stockholders with 856 stores scattered across Texas. Gross business has grown from \$340,000.00 the first year to \$150 million the past year, the annual reports showed.

Their warehouse operation handles over 10,000 items with an average of 100 rail cars and 500 large trailer trucks being unloaded there each week, Schwartz reported.

Schwartz announced that a program of re-merchandising of their store will begin next Monday. The job calls for adding more new shelving and a new check-out system with an additional check-out stand to be installed.

April 1, Is Sign-Up Deadline For '66 Wheat, Grain, Cotton Programs

Farm operators were reminded of the fast approaching deadline, April 1, 1966, for signing up to take part in the 1966 programs for wheat, feed grain and cotton.

Ralph Duren, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, emphasizes the importance of signing up before the deadline.

Program benefits include diversion payments and price-support payments in addition to the regular price support loan. Program benefits will be available only to farmers who sign up and then carry out the intentions indicated in the application.

Applications may be filed at the ASCS County office any day Monday through Friday. Office hours are from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. Producers that are unable to sign up during regular office hours may contact the office manager, Lee W. Tabor, and arrange for a suitable time. Sign-up deadline is April 1, 1966.

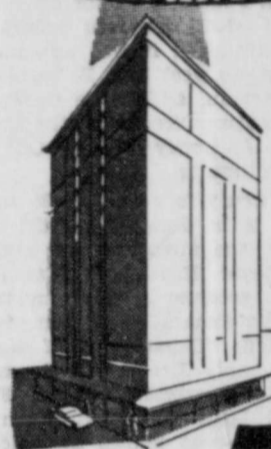

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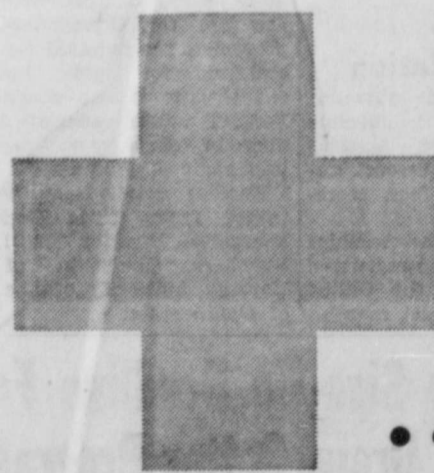
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Goldthwaite Garden Club Hears Program On "Propagation," March 16

EAGLES NO. 2 AT MID-WAY MEET

Another mile relay winner gave the Eagles a second place at Mid-way last week. A 3:29.7 was the relay's time, setting a new meet record. A 52.6 came from the blocks with Ronnie Hill finishing the first lap. James Cook's 52.7 dominated the second leg stretching the lead for his teammate Owen Yarborough. Owen's 52.6 stretched the gap wide enough that anchorman Jerry Rountree ran only against time. With Jerry turning in a time of 51.4 the relay team bettered the old record 3 seconds.

The sprint relay (J. Cook, H. Moore, G. Warlick, J. Rountree) placed third with a time of 44.0. A 9.9 in the semi-finals qualified Charles Blackburn for the finals in the 100 yard dash, which he was unable to attend. Gary Warlick clocked a speedy 10.1 to place 4th in the finals.
