Be a choosy buyer and buy eggs from stores where they are refrigerated. Carry them home promptly and refrigerate them at once. Remove from the refrigerator only those eggs that are to be used immediately. Eggs left four days in a warm store or kitchen lose much freshness as those kept several weeks in a refrigerator. Eggs in carton with large end away from foods with strong odors.

Congressman Omar Burleson announced today that he is presenting to the Goldthwaite High School Library a copy of the beautifully bound volume, "Compilation of Works of Art and Other Objects in the United States Capitol."

It contains illustrations and descriptions of the accumulation of the works of art in the United States Capitol. More than 400 illustrations, executed with great skill and craftsmanship, make this volume a potential treasure for art lovers and historians alike.

The work was prepared by the Architect of the Capitol under the direction of Congressman Burleson, as Chairman of the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress and also Chairman of the House Administration Committee. In presenting the compilation, Burleson said, "This volume catalogs the works of art reposing in our best-loved National shrine, the United States Capitol, and adds both luster and dimension to the rich heritage of America."

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Omar Burleson Makes Statement For Re-Election To Congress

Omar Burleson, veteran Congressman from the 17th District, today pledged a vigorous, active campaign for the Democratic Primary nomination for re-election.

In announcing his plans to seek re-election, Burleson stated he will base his campaign on his record of nearly 20 years service in Congress.

"In that time, I have never been a 'yes man' to anyone or any group, but have fulfilled my responsibility to vote on each issue for what I thought was in the best interest of our Country, our State, and our District; people have the right to expect no less," Burleson said.

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service.

His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman of the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice-Chairman of the other.

"In all my years in Congress," Burleson said, "I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions as their Representative. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State, and the Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through his years of public service.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, with duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

As a leader in Congress, Burleson has consistently urged the return to a sounder fiscal policy and the cutting of unnecessary and extravagant federal spending.

"I have tried to see that your tax money is spent wisely, and as judiciously, as you would have spent it had you been in my place," Burleson said. "The record will definitely show that on many occasions I have found myself in the minority—especially on needless spending of the taxpayers' money. I am proud that I have never failed to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best."

"At every session of Congress, I have voted for expenditures

below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said.

"When it comes to the defense of this Country, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the World," he said.

Burleson said he feels there are those other things for which the Government was designed and, of course, it costs money. "Such things as the conservation of our natural resources—caring for God's gift to people that they may be preserved for future generations," he said.

Burleson also said that the individual, groups of individuals or local governmental entities are unable to cope with matters of flood control and, in many cases, an adequate water supply. "We have got to look to the future if our area progresses. For one thing, this means water is a priority concern."

"The Federal Government has assisted our area in numerous respects in coping with some of these problems. We have our share of flood control projects and our share of attention to those now in the planning stage. An example is the effort to find an answer to the flood threat in Abilene and several other places.

"An example of other Federal activity in our area is, of course, our military installations, new Post Office buildings and other Federal interests which are proper and needed."

Further, Burleson said that he "certainly subscribes to the idea that the Government should help the elderly and those people who are unable to help themselves."

Burleson has been an implacable foe of the constant encroachment of the Federal Government into the area of State and local affairs.

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal pro-

"Big Government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big Government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance."

Burleson stated he was proud of the "trust and the confidence placed in me by the people who send me to Congress—and to violate that trust in any respect would be unthinkable."

He urged residents of the 17th District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made — "And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Well-known throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the 17th District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School. Following graduation, Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School. Later, he studied postgraduate law at the University of Texas.

A series of questions and answers regarding low-rent public housing have been released by Goldthwaite Housing Authority chairman, L. B. Burnham and Executive Director Clyde Cockburn to help acquaint residents of the city with the program.

Other Commissioners of the Housing Authority are: Houston Owen, Harold Yarborough, Kel Landrum and Doug Collier.

Q. Does the public pay "someone else's rent"?

A. No. Each tenant pays his own rent. The cost of maintaining and operating low-rent housing is paid entirely from rentals.

Q. What's meant by "elderly housing"—old houses?

A. No. "Elderly housing" is special housing especially constructed to meet the living requirements of senior citizens in our community. Such important features are included as no-slip floors, electrical out-

lets at no stoop, no squat levels... ramps instead of stairs... grab bars around tubs and showers... storage and shelves within easy reach... "buddy system" buzzers for emergencies and other helpful features to make life more pleasant for the elderly.

A. To be eligible, an applicant of applicant group (1) must be a family; that is, two or more members, a single person age 62, or the remaining member of a tenant family. Single persons who are under a disability as defined in the Social Security Act are also considered to be a family. (2) The family's net income must not exceed the admission income limits established by the LHA and approved by PHA.

Q. What is the federal government's role in Low-Rent Public Housing?

A. The federal government guarantees payment of the mortgage on the property. If the Local Authority's income isn't sufficient to cover all operations and meet annual mortgage payments, then Uncle Sam makes up this difference. This is the so-called "subsidy" that worries some folks.

Q. Does low-rent public housing compete with standard local rentals?

A. No. Low income families cannot afford high rents on modest income. As a result, they must resort to slum and sub-standard housing.

Q. Who owns low-rent housing units?

A. The City of Goldthwaite Housing Authority, an arm of the City of Goldthwaite. The Local Housing Authority develops, builds and manages these dwellings.

Q. How much rent is charged?

A. This depends entirely on the family income. Rents are based NOT on the size of the apartment, but rather on a percentage of earnings, usually approximately 5%.

Q. Who is eligible to live in low-rent public housing in Goldthwaite?

A. Families of low-income and elderly single persons over 62.

Q. Isn't public housing wasteful? Can't privately financed home builders do the job at half the cost?

A. These charges are false, since public housing is built by private local contractors through competitive bidding. Most of these contractors also build privately financed local housing. When true cost comparisons are made, based on size of the dwelling units, the price of land and quality of construction, development costs of low-rent public housing compare favorably with privately constructed housing.

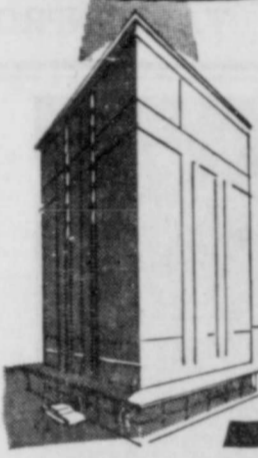

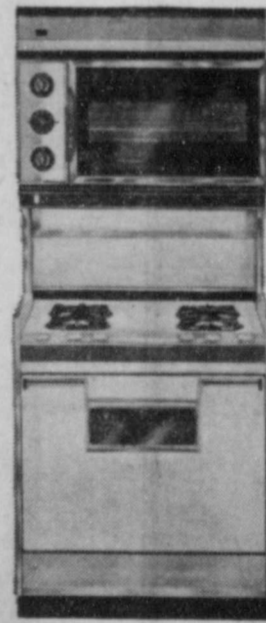

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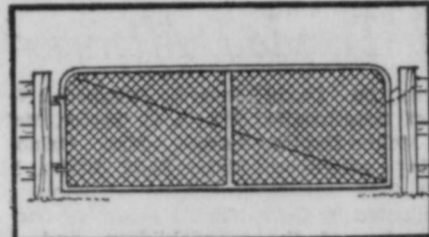

Goldthwaite On New Route Of Supersonic Training Flights

OFFUTT AFB, Neb. — Super-sonic training flights by Strategic Air Command B-58 Hustler bombers will be flown between April 1 and June 30 from a point south of Uvalde, Texas, to the termination point near Era, Texas.

Flying in a north-easterly direction, the corridor begins south of Uvalde proceeding in a straight line over Utopia, Ingram, slightly east of Goldthwaite, continuing over Granbury and Boyd, Texas, and terminates near Era, Texas.

Army Nike units will determine the accuracy of simulated bomb drops through the use of radio and radar signals, while at the same time providing realistic training situations for the scoring teams. No bombs are

carried by the SAC aircraft on these training missions.

In order to reduce the sonic booms over major cities where scoring equipment is located, traject selections are made to by-pass or to allow deceleration to sub-sonic speeds before reaching these cities.

The bombers will make a maximum of two runs daily, flying at supersonic speeds up to mach 1.65 (1,100 m. p. h.) at altitudes above 35,000 feet. Because of the high altitudes, the booms they create are comparatively weak in strength.

Although sometimes startling or distracting in the suddenness, the booms will in no circumstance cause personal injury or damage to a structurally sound building.
