## FFA All School Rodeo Scheduled For Friday And Saturday Nights

The Eighth Annual FFA Goldthwaite School Rodeo will be held this Friday and Saturday, April 15th and 16th, at the Rodeo Arena just north of Elementary School.

Friday at 3:00 p. m., there will be a street parade led by McKenzie, sweetheart of Goldthwaite FFA Chapter, with Wayne House, FFA Chapter, and Gaylon Jernigan, Greenhand president.

Western Day will be observed on Friday.

Rodeo will get under way at 7 p. m. both nights with cowboys and cowgirls competing in calf roping, barrel racing, break-away roping, ribbon roping, flag race, rescue race, goat scramble, calf riding, riding, and donkey race.

Work is underway on remodeling the Kight Mobil service station which will be completely rebuilt and modernized, J. D. Kight announced this week.

Truett Audridge is contractor and the job is expected to be completed in 45 to 60 days. Cost of the remodeling and modernizing job is approximately \$11,000.00.

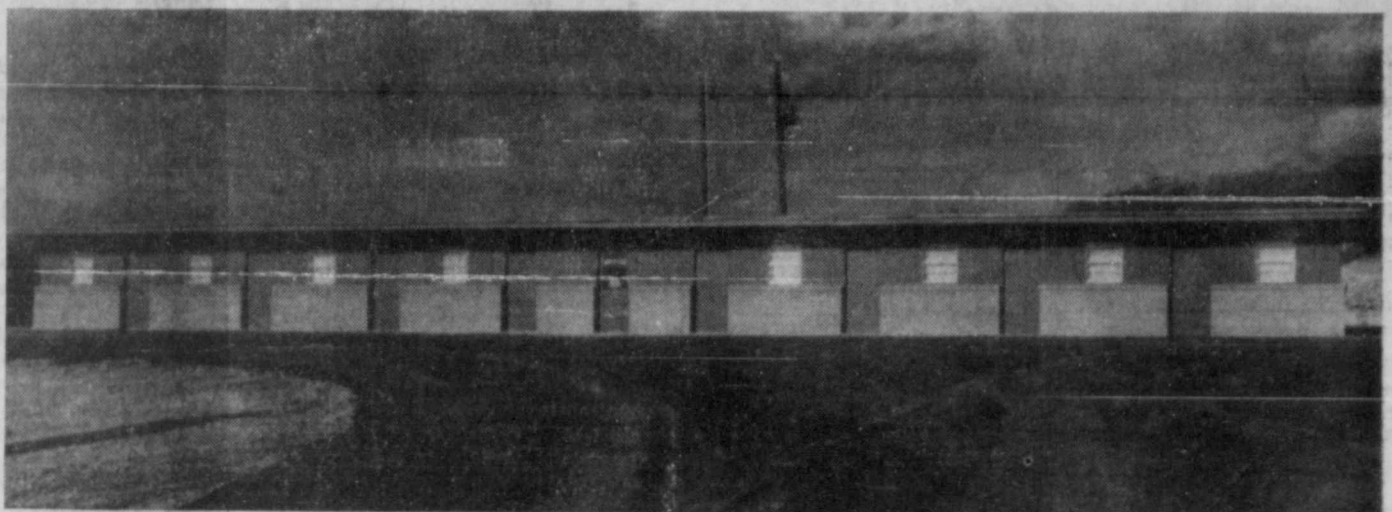
The old telephone exchange building will be torn down to make room for additional driveway which will be extended about 25 feet. The washing and lubrication stalls will be enclosed with doors and will be under one roof.

New pumps will be installed, the brick posts will be eliminated and new island will be constructed. The old roof will be removed and new modern streamlined roof will be added.

A new storage room, 11 by 23 feet, will be added to the rear of present building and the drainage ditch at the north of present building will be covered. Rest rooms will be moved to new location in the new addition to be added and the entire interior will be remodeled with new lower ceiling.

Business operations will be moved into the old telephone building while the station is being rebuilt, according to Kight.

Glynn Collier was appointed city secretary and W. C. Barnett was named city treasurer and tax assessor and collector for the next year. Other committee appointments were deferred by Mayor Little until the next meeting.

W. C. Barnett, City Manager, presented quarterly treasurer's report and also monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments.

Other matters including reduced summer water rates were discussed and will be considered further at the next meeting.

The council approved plans to have a regular two year city audit at the end of this fiscal year which ends on June 30.

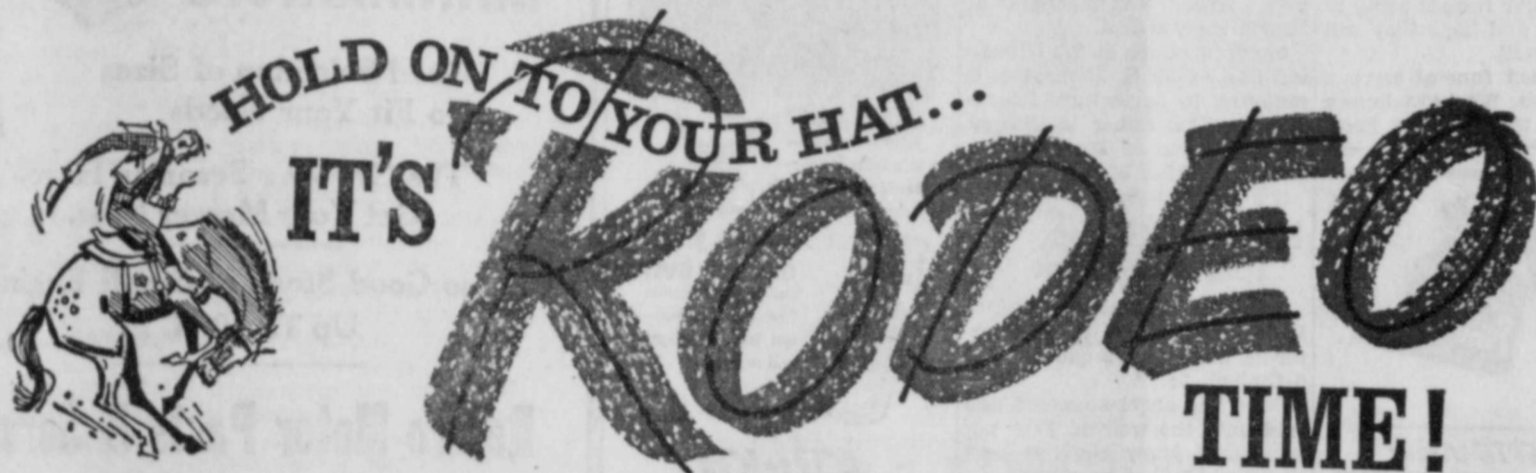

for labeling and mailing, IRS District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr., announced today. The rates at which tax is withheld have been revised to more closely approximate the rates upon which year-end liability is based. However, this is not a tax increase, since the taxpayer's total yearly liability will not be affected.

Although new withholding rates will not become effective until May 1, IRS is expediting information to give employers and employees maximum time to adjust to the new withholding system.

It is expected that IRS Service Centers will complete labeling and mailing of the Employers' Tax Guide and Employee Fact Sheet (Document 5642) to all employers with 225 or less employees by the end of March.

Employees in this category total approximately four million and have on their payrolls 30 million employees.

All employers with 256 or more employees (16,000 employers with a total of 40 million employees) should obtain

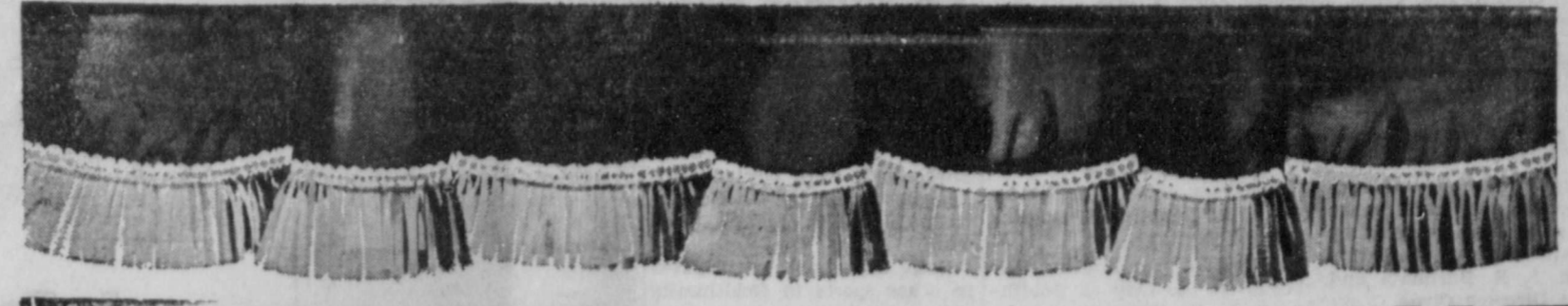

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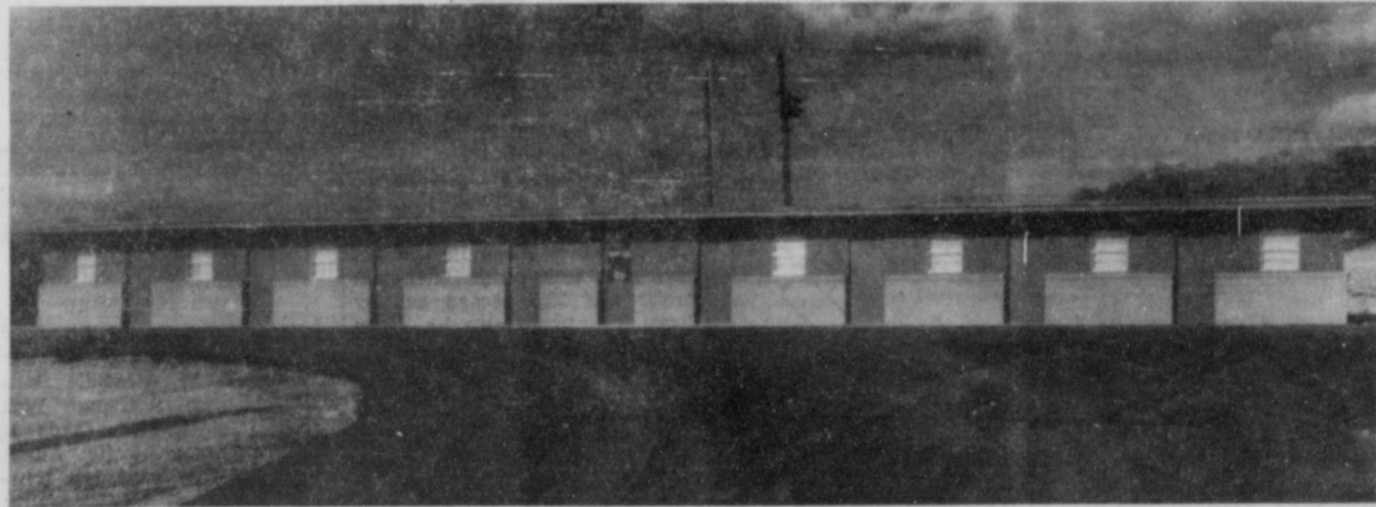

A series of questions and answers regarding low-rent public housing have been released by Goldthwaite Housing Authority chairman, L. B. Burnham and Executive Director Clyde Cockrum to help acquaint residents of the city with the program.

**Q. How much rent is charged?**  
A. This depends entirely on the family income. Rents are based NOT on the size of the apartment, but rather on a percentage of earnings, usually approximately 20 per cent.

**Q. What does Organized Labor think of low-rent housing?**

A. Organized Labor has supported the low-rent program since its birth in 1937—not only because Labor realizes that construction of low-rent housing in an area means more and better jobs—but because Labor believes in the principle that every family is entitled to a decent place to live—in a respectable neighborhood.
