\$175,242 Paid Wool And Mohair Producer For '65

Mills County wool and mohair producers were paid \$175,242.11 under the 1965 marketing year wool and mohair program, according to announcement by Lee Tabor, office manager of the Mills County ASCS.

The following rates were paid for the 1965 marketing year.

Shorn Wool 31.6 per cent; Unshorn Lambs, 60 cents per hundred-weight; Mohair, 9.9 per cent.

A promotion fund deduction of one cent per pound on shorn wool and five cents per hundred-weight was made from producer payments.

Checks, in the amount of \$175,242.11, were mailed to all eligible producers under the Wool and Mohair program on April 15.

At the April meeting of the Goldthwaite Parent-Teacher Association Mrs. W. C. Barnett installed the following officers for the school year, 1966-67:

At this meeting the association also voted certain revisions of the By-Laws to bring them up to date. Included in these revisions was one which raises the annual dues for members from fifty cents to seventy-five cents each. This is the first increase in dues in forty-five years and is necessitated by increases in the assessments paid the State and National associations.

Postal Savings System Will Be Discontinued Effective April 28

Acting Postmaster Ray Duren today urged depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Acting Postmaster Duren pointed out that as of April 28, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

He said that for convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postal Savings System was established January 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and

to attract savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however, with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates than the 2 per cent interest per annum paid on Postal Savings, the System has outlived its usefulness for the American people.

The acting postmaster noted that as of June 30, 1965, there were 997,029 depositors holding certificates in 3,130 post offices throughout the nation. The number of depositors has been declining, he said, at the rate of about 6,500 per month.

He said that unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and would be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

Charlie Haggerty of Goldthwaite, brother of the groom, served as best man.

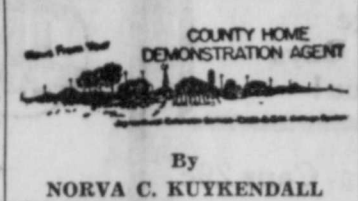

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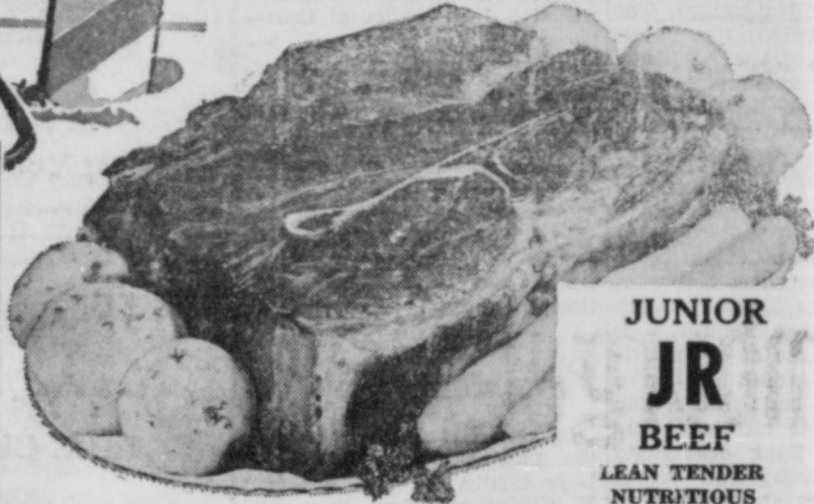


