Memorial Day is one of the six regularly approved holidays that are observed by Goldthwaite merchants during the year with stores being closed.


This is the first holiday since New Year's Day, January 1, and most merchants and employees are looking forward to the long weekend and a break from the regular routine with business as usual.

Since June of last year the Soil Conservation Service has been helping local sponsoring organizations develop a flood control work plan for Bennett Creek.

The SCS was authorized to assist local organizations in the Bennett Creek Watershed under authority of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act covering 106,240 acres, most of which is in the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District.

Under Public Law 566 the Secretary of Agriculture.through the Soil Conservation Service, will provide the Mills County WCID, the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, and the Mills County Commissioners' Court as local sponsors, supervisory assistance. This includes help in securing engineering and design information, preparation of contracts and specifications, awarding of contracts, and supervision of construction.

will vote in the Commissioners' courtroom.


Voting Boxes 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 15 and 16, will vote in the front office of County Judge Cecil Egger.






