Stores To Close Next Monday For Memorial Holiday

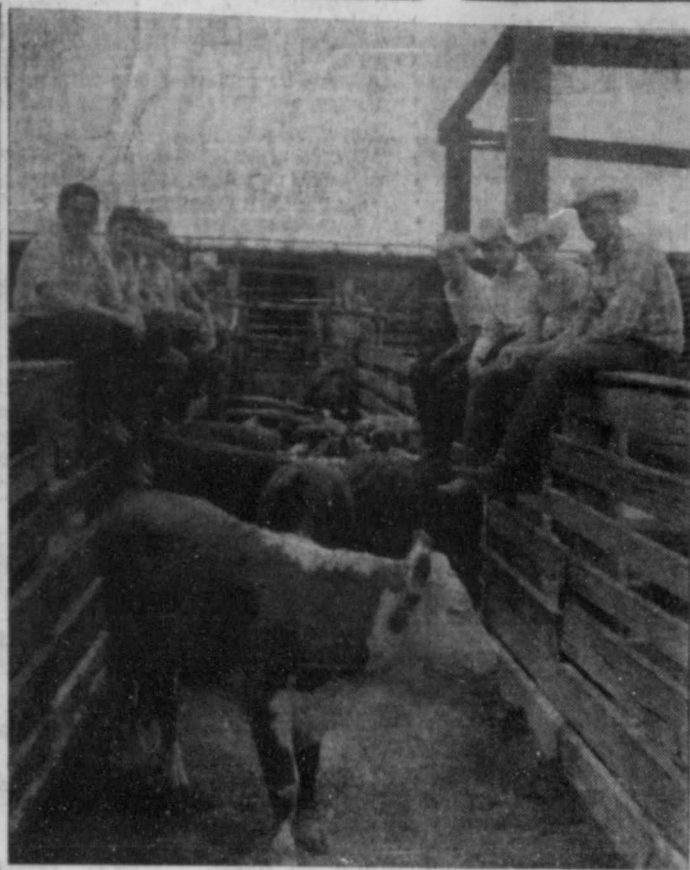

Men Club Wins Fifth Sears Award On County Park Project

Fifth Sears Foundation award for their Mills County project was won by the Goldthwaite Garden Club for the club year, it has been awarded by Mrs. Loyd King, and Mrs. Walter A. Alkin, chairman of the club's committee. Award was a check in amount of \$200.00 which brings their total awards from the Foundation to \$1,200.00 in six years. The Goldthwaite club is the fifth in that number of entering the award. One year the club entered their project because of a dry season with a shortage. Last year the program announced the Garden Club a \$550.00 award and this year the club won a \$200.00 award. This year's award of \$200.00 brings the club's total from Sears to \$1,200.00. The sixth consecutive award was given to the Goldthwaite Garden Club, Inc., for their project in a program of community improvement and beautification. Sears has program of \$6,000 each of awards to Texas Garden Clubs. This \$36,000 has been awarded by a committee of club members to various clubs and councils throughout the state on the basis of projects submitted by them with their application. 26 Steers Are Shipped To Kansas By FFA Members In Feeding Project

Twenty-six steers have been shipped to Kansas for summer grazing by nine members of the Goldthwaite Future Farmers Of America. The animals were shipped to Matfield Green, Kansas, which is located in the Flint Hills grass lands in the Southeast part of the state. They will be there on grass until about October 1, when they will be shipped to the market in Kansas City. Those taking part in the management practice project include: Dennis Moreland, Gaylon Jernigan Lynn Berry, Kent Geeslin, Tommy Head, Mike Conradt, Sam Campbell, Dale Straley and Tommy Watson. They are being assisted in their project by Vocational Agriculture teacher Thurman Head, and have the support and backing of their fathers also. While all the nine boys are members of the Goldthwaite FFA, this is not a club project. It is a project of the nine club members.

It all started when the group purchased some steers last fall for the business venture. Since grazing was good in Mills County the past winter their original group of steers were good and fat and too far along when spring came to ship to Kansas for summer grazing. So, the boys sold their first group of steers and purchased a new lot to ship to Kansas. The steers were shipped earlier this month on Santa Fe Railroad. The trip to Kansas took 24 hours. They left here on Thursday afternoon at 4:30 and arrived at their destination Friday afternoon. Before they were shipped they were vaccinated and branded at the local loading pens.

Plans call for some of the boys and parents to make an inspection trip during the summer to see how their project is getting along. This trip will be made to Kansas possibly in July or August. When the steers are ready to ship to market at Kansas City the latter part of September or early October all, or most of the boys, will accompany the animals to the market and watch their movement through the livestock exchange there.

Steel Pole Barn Construction By W. D. Henry Welding Shop

Construction of steel pole barns in Goldthwaite by W. D. Henry Welding Shop, is a new and thriving business in Mills County. One of the first to be constructed was 46 feet wide and 42 feet long for use as a lamb feeding barn for T. H. Johnson Turkey and Lamb Farm. Just recently a new building was completed for Mr. Johnson. It measures 46 feet wide by 770 feet long. Mr. Henry started to push his steel pole building construction business in late 1965 and plans call for advertising and covering the entire Southwest. He has arrangements with steel firm to supply the sheet iron for the jobs. Poles and trusses are cut and fabricated in the shop and then transported to the location where installation is completed. It requires about eight days to construct a building 50 feet by 100 feet, Henry stated.

Commissioners Call Election For 15 Cent Road Tax Levy

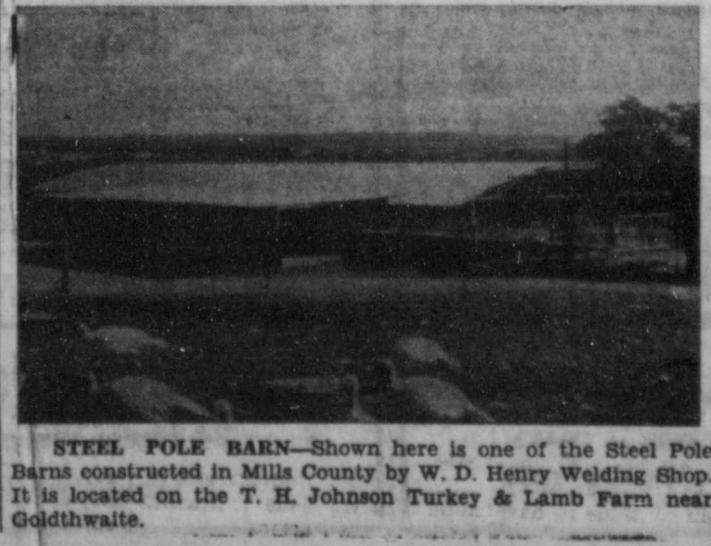
By order of the County Commissioners' Court, County Judge Cecil Egger has ordered that a special election will be held in Mills County on Saturday, June 18. Purpose of the election is to vote on a proposed 15 cent road tax on the \$100.00 valuation to retire warrants that have been issued to purchase rights-of-way for highways 16, 84 and 183. Official notice of the election appears on another page of this paper. The commissioners took this action after a petition was presented to the Court requesting the election. The petition had 208 qualified signatures requesting that the proposition be placed before the voters. This election will be held in all of the regular voting precincts of the county and will be conducted by the General Election Judges. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m., according to Judge Egger. Only regularly qualified voters who have property rendered for taxes on the county and state tax roll in Mills County will be eligible to vote in this special election. Absentee voting for this special election will start in the office of County Clerk Walter A. Bryant, 20 days before the election, on Tuesday morning, May 31.

Baptists Will Study Proposed Improvements

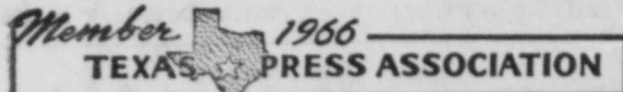
