Community Action Program Survey To Be Undertaken For Mills County

Counties of Mills, San Llano and Mason have made efforts to apply for a Community Action Program. This organization is called Hill Country Community Action Association, Inc.

Approval has been granted and plans are being made to conduct a county-wide survey to determine what programs are needed in Mills County. During the next few months this survey will be made.

Robert Long, Jr., is the County Coordinator, who will make the survey.

The information received from these questionnaires, officials of the Hill Country Community Action Association will determine what projects are needed most in this county and make application to the Federal government to get these projects.

Mills County has many needs that can be met through these programs. These will be local projects, selected by local citizens to meet local needs, according to Community Action Association officials.

Some of the projects that can be met are:

- Youth and adult vocational training designed to improve job skills and earning power during working years, so that they may be supported by their own earnings.
- Pre-school day care and health center for children of low-income mothers.
- Health examinations and health services for adults and

The Head Start program for Goldthwaite Schools got underway Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock with the following faculty assignments announced by Supt. LeRoy Beard.

A staff meeting was held last Friday morning to get organized for opening of the program Monday morning. The program will run for eight weeks and will be for five and six year old children in the district.

Mr. Beard announced that 33 children had signed up for the classes. Those in the age group that may have been missed are requested to contact school officials.

The project is financed through a grant from the Office Of Economic Opportunity, Title One of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

Officials in charge of the Head Start Program stated that they would appreciate donations of any used toys that are in good condition.

Those who have toys to donate to the program are requested to call the Elementary school and someone will arrange to come by and pick up the toys.

\$278.50 Needed For Park Fund To Carry Program For This Year

Another \$278.50 is urgently needed for the Mills County Park Fund, it was announced Tuesday by W. P. Duren, chairman of the park committee.

This would provide the funds necessary to insure a caretaker through this year.

Minimum requirement for this maintenance job is \$1,200.

Park Fund contributions to date this year total \$921.50, the chairman announced.

Support during the last two or three weeks has slowed down to a low rate and the committee is urging those who have not sent in their check to do so now so that the job may be completed.

Members of the park committee have hopes that enough interested parties will come through with enough financial support to put the program over the top again this year.

Checks may be made out to Mills County Park Fund and turned in to Duren at Mills County State Bank or to any member of the park committee.

The Committee has a goal of 100 supporters at a minimum of \$12.00 each to provide funds needed for a year's upkeep.

Every contribution will be welcomed by the committee. Fifty-six have given to date. A number of them gave more than the suggested \$12 which is a big help, the committee pointed out.

It is hoped by the committee that the goal will be oversubscribed within the next week. A few dollars over the minimum need for upkeep can surely be used to good advantage, the chairman stated.
