Mills County Motorists Will Pay Less Under New Auto Insurance Law

The average motorist in Mills County will pay \$1.00 less for automobile insurance under the new rates made by the State Board of Insurance, according to the Southwestern Insurance Information Service of Dallas. Present cost of insurance on a new Ford or Chevrolet private passenger car driven by and insured by a person under 25 years of age is \$102. The new cost would be \$101. This includes basic liability coverage of \$10,000 for injury or loss of life of one person, \$20,000 for two, and \$5,000 property damage; \$100 deductible collision; and full comprehensive insurance.

Welfare Office Open All Day

Announcement was made this week that the State Department of Public Welfare office in Mills County is now open all day with full time secretary on duty. Mrs. Dorothy Nell Carter, manager, stated that Mrs. Bill Packer, who has been working part time, will now work on full time basis. Mullin Baptists Set Revival Dates

The Mullin Baptist Church summer revival will be held on July 22 through 31, it was announced this week by Rev. Chester Sylvester, pastor. Rev. Johnny Hallford of Balinger will be the evangelist and the pastor will lead the music. Rev. Hallford is a native of Mills County having been reared in the Democrat and Duren communities.

Motorists in the county would pay \$2 more for bodily injury and property damage liability but \$2 less for \$100 deductible collision and \$1 less for comprehensive. Cost for the same coverage but with \$50 deductible collision would be reduced \$1, from \$135 to \$134. Other types and older cars would have different rates. Texas has 26 rating territories and eight automobile classifications. The cost estimates given are for cars in classification 1B, which includes about half of the private automobiles in Texas. For cars in this classification and insured under \$100 deductible collision policies, insurance would cost less in nine territories and remain unchanged in two. Costs for \$50 deductible policies would be lowered in seven territories and unchanged in one. With the rate increases, Texas ranks about 30th among the states in the cost of automobile insurance to policyholders, the Information Service announced.

Graham Firm Gets Highway Contract In Mills County

A contract for 1,533 miles on U. S. Highways 84 and 133 in Mills and Lampasas Counties has been awarded to a Graham firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission. Zack Burkett Co. submitted the low bid of \$119,482.20 on the project. Widening bridges and railroad overpass is expected to take 150 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood. Paul Henderson, Resident Engineer at Goldthwaite, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction. Dr. Raymond Williams Honored As Graduate of UT School of Medicine

Dr. Raymond "Del" Williams of Odessa was presented the Gold-Headed Cane at the Honors and Awards Convocation and Presentation ceremony of the University of Texas School of Medicine in Galveston June 14, 1966. The Gold-Headed Cane is considered the highest honor a graduating senior can receive. He received the cane from Dr. John W. Goodman, the 1965 recipient of the traditional award, sponsored by the 1966 graduating class, Student American Medical Association and Mu Delta. The Gold-Headed Cane award at the University of Texas Medical Branch was established in 1960. It has, as its background, the original Gold-Headed Cane which was carried successively by five distinguished British physicians from 1689 to 1825. Each was an outstanding clinician and exemplified "the ultimate in patient care." The original cane remains on permanent display in the Royal College of Physicians Museum in London. It is inscribed with the words:

Childress & Cruzcosa Hospital in Goldthwaite was certified by the Bureau Of Health Insurance of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore as one of the hospitals to participate in the Medicare program which became effective July 1, 1966. Congressman Omar Burleson announced on July 2, the list of hospitals in the 17th congressional district which were approved for the Medicare program which included the Goldthwaite institution. Congressman Burleson said in the announcement that approximately 95% of all hospital beds

His subject was "Microcirculatory Studies During Treatment of Hemorrhagic Shock." He presented a paper and spoke at the Society of Thoracic Surgeons in Denver, Colorado, in January, 1966. Other meetings at which he has given papers are: Student Research Forum, Galveston 1964-1965-1966; Texas Academy of Science in Waco in 1964 and Dallas in 1965; Galveston Research Club in 1965. Dr. Williams has made "Motion Picture Film Teaching Aids," "Replacement of Aortic Valve Using the Magevorn Prothesis" and "Suturing Techniques." Dr. Williams plans to specialize in thoracic and cardiovascular surgery. He started a one year internship at Philadelphia General Hospital in Philadelphia, Pa., Monday of last week, June 27, 1966. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Texas Western College at El Paso, where he was a star half-back in football and a sprinter on the track team. His pre-college schooling was obtained in the school systems of Odessa, Mullin, Goldthwaite, and San Marcos Baptist Academy. He is married to the former Dana Tubb, daughter of Mrs. Ila Verne Tubb and Francis Tubb. Mrs. Williams has been teaching in the Galveston schools for the past four years. Dr. Williams is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Williams of Odessa, and the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Reynolds of Goldthwaite and Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Williams of Star.

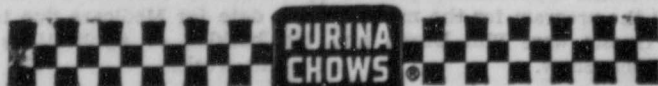

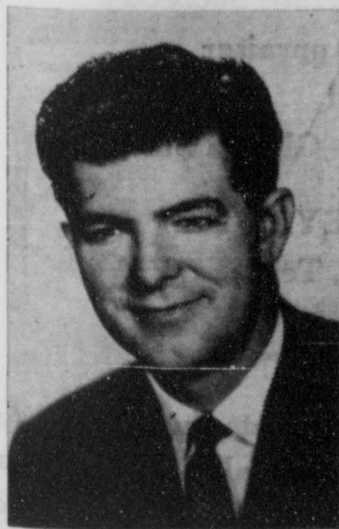

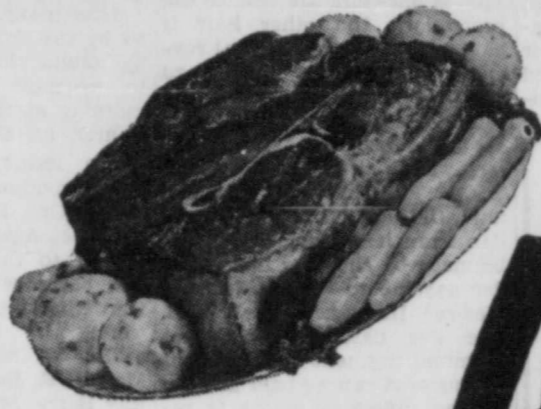

First Medicare Premium Notices Mailed Out To More Than 2 Million

First medicare premium notices have been mailed to more than 2 million of the elderly people who signed up for the voluntary doctor bill insurance to supplement their basic hospital insurance under medicare, Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, announced.

Another 15 million older people enrolled for the doctor bill insurance will not receive premium notices, Ball added. Their \$3 premiums will be deducted from their monthly social security, railroad retirement, or civil service benefit checks, beginning with the checks due in July.

The premium notices now being delivered, Ball said, call for quarterly payments of \$9, payment for the doctor bill insurance protection for the months of July, August, and September.

This is one-half the cost of the protection; the other half is paid out of general Federal revenue. With the punch-card premium notice is a return envelope pre-addressed to one of six social security payment centers which are located in New York, Philadelphia, Birmingham, Chicago, Kansas City, and San Francisco. Payment should be made by check or money order payable to "Social Security Medical Insurance," Ball said. The due date for this first premium payment is July 3, but of course it can be paid as soon as the premium notice is received.
