

The chart shows 33.14 inches of rainfall recorded here in 1965. This was slightly more than 31.62 inches recorded in 1964 and considerably more than the 18.80 inches in 1963. It is interesting to note that rainfall recorded in 1957 was the

second highest in the 63 year record. In 1957 Goldthwaite recorded 40.08 inches. Highest rainfall recorded here was in 1919 when 🕱 measured more than 45 inches. The chart shows that prior to 1957 there were 11 years of below normal rainfall. From 1946 through 1956 the amount of rainfall

recorded here was below the long term normal average of 30.14

inches. The year 1954 was the record low of below 16.80 inches.
