Mr. Tubbs said that the fund at the present time has approximately \$1,000.00 which is invested in a savings account. This provides some income but it is not enough to do the job.

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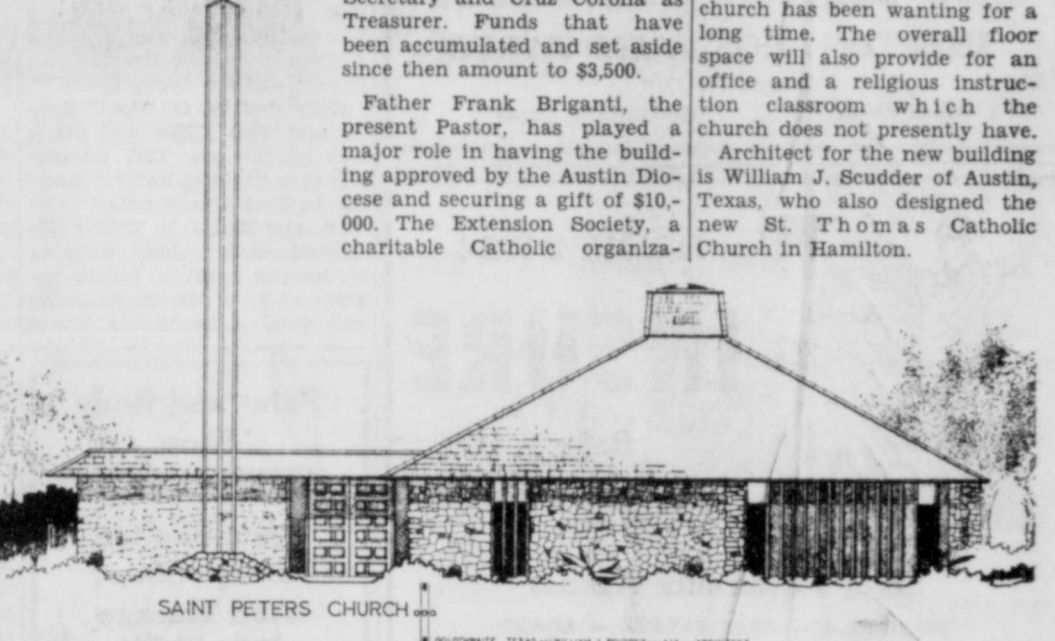

"The Peace Essay Contest is divided into eight world divisions for the \$1,000 prizes," President Collier said.

The local club's winner will advance to Lions District 2A-1 competition in his (her) effort to qualify for the multiple district contest.

The contest, sponsored by more than 20,000 Lions Clubs in more than 130 countries in the free world, will be the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world today.

Contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words.

Judging will fall into four categories: 75 per cent of the essay's points will be devoted to content, ten per cent to organization, ten per cent to style and five per cent to mechanics.

Mr. Collier said he hoped Mills County young people would accept the challenge and enter the contest. Closing date for the contest is December 10, 1966.

Eagles Defeated By Clifton 21-14; Play Mustangs Here Friday Night

The greatly improved Eagles found the Clifton Cubs too tough to handle as the Cubs walked on the Eagles for a 21-14 victory last Friday night at Clifton.

Clifton won the toss and chose to receive the kickoff over Goldthwaite Captains Gary Holcomb, Sammy Hudson, and Eddie Thornton.

The Eagle, trailing the Cubs at the close of the first quarter 7-0, blocked for all state half-back Charles Blackburn as he ran around his right end for a 67 yard touchdown. Goldthwaite Quarterback Mike Conrad tossed the ball to Bobby Rountree for the extra points to lead the Cubs 8-7 in the early part of the second quarter.

The Cubs, receiving the kickoff, marched the ball down to the Eagles' 16 yard line where a pass interference was made on the Cubs' first down play to put the Cubs in fine shape with 1 yard from goal.

Quarterback Larry Grimland carried the ball into the end zone for the second touchdown for Clifton. The extra points try by Clifton failed when Ted Roberts intercepted the pass to end the half 13-8.

The mighty Eagles came back in the second half determined to take the lead as Blackburn dodged and out ran the Cubs for 40 yards and the Eagles' second touchdown of the ball game.

Extra point try for the Eagles failed, but Goldthwaite led the Cubs by a slight 14-13 margin.

Goldthwaite received the ball when Sam Campbell tackled Forson behind the line on the fourth down.

Fourth down and 1 yard to go for a first down was the setup in the fourth quarter for the Eagles on the Cubs' 45 yard line when the Eagles tried to push Charles Blackburn over the Cubs' tough line but failed.

The Eagles, leading the Cubs with three minutes left in the ball game, were really holding Clifton on the 55 yard line when Grimland broke loose with a pass to Prescher to drive them on down the field. Grimland, Clifton QB, plunged over the line for his second touchdown.

Grimland tossed the ball to Forson for the two extra points leaving the score at the close of the game 21-14.

He kept it for about two or three months and after he couldn't find anyone who owned it he brought it to the Mills County Commission Company and ordered it sold and proceeds

donated to the park fund.

Mrs. Johnnie Jernigan mailed a check for \$4.95 to the park committee chairman with this note: "Warren—Hubert Geeslin said this goat had been in his pasture two or three months and he couldn't find anybody to claim it, so he brought it in."

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The committee has an annual goal of 100 contributors to give a minimum of \$12.00 to provide \$1,200.00 which is the minimum required to insure park maintenance throughout the year.
