

Mills County Producers Favor Promotion

According to Ralph Duren, chairman of the Mills ASC committee, Mills County wool lamb producers voted in favor of the new program, with the following results.

101 producers with 40,000 head of sheep.

67 producers with 100,000 head of sheep.

Producers under the new agreement would be up 1 1/2¢ a pound on shorn wool and 7 1/2¢ a hundredweight on unshorn lambs, compared with 1¢ and 5 cents in the past.

Market-promotion activities carried out under an agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Mills County Sheep Producers Association, as authorized by law, proposed new agreement approved if it is favored by at least two-thirds of the number of producers voting by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by total vote.

The Goldthwaite Eagles won their first victory of the season as they stomped the Marble Falls Mustangs 41-22 on Eagle field last Friday night.

Good luck came to the Eagles when captains Joe Dellis, David Wiedebusch, Harold Moore, and LeRoy Wernette won the toss and chose to receive the kickoff.

Halfback Charles Blackburn received the kickoff behind the goal and brought the ball back out to the 24 yard line.

A handoff to Bobby Rountree on the second down play put the Eagles on the Mustangs' 5 yard line as Rountree ran around the end zone for a gain of 50 yards.

On the second down and one yard to goal Quarterback Mike Conradt carried the ball into the end zone for the first touchdown of the ball game and his first touchdown of the season.

The kick for extra point failed but the Eagles were on their way to victory with only a minute and thirty seconds of the game behind them.

The Eagles, who did a beautiful job of holding the Mustangs, forced them to kick on their fourth down.

Blackburn's 40 yard run and with the help of the yardage made by Rountree put the Eagles in good shape on the 17 yard line of the Mustangs.

First down and 2 minutes and 46 seconds left in the first frame was the setup for the Eagles when a pitchback by Conradt to Rountree put the Eagles two touchdowns ahead of the Mustangs.

Rountree kicked for the extra point to lead the Mustangs 13-0.

Blackburn received the punt as he picked up 40 yards on the runback.

Conradt handed off to Blackburn on the second down and he out ran all of the Mustangs for 53 yards and a touchdown.

Bobby Rountree added another point to the score for the Eagles as he kicked for the extra point with the scoreboard reading 20-0 for the first quarter.

After receiving the ball from the Mustangs on a fourth down punt, the Eagles were really making yardage as Sammy Hudson caught 6 straight passes for the total gain of 72 yards in the second frame.

A pass by Conradt to Blackburn on the second down play really brought excitement to the fans as Blackburn charged over the line dragging two of the Mustangs.

Rountree's fourth kick for the extra point was good to leave the score at the half with a wide lead of 27-0 for the Eagles.

Gary Warlick opened the scoring for the second half with a 26 yard touchdown to make

Eagle editor last Saturday and reported some rapid cotton picking on his farm north of town last Friday. Three young men picked 1,617 pounds on that day and one of them became ill and had to quit before night, hence he did not pick as much as the other two, but he gathered a whole lot of it. Sam Tullos picked 574, Jesse Bennett picked 536, Jesse Tullos, who was sick, picked 500. This beats the record in this county, the Eagle believes.

In 1928 the West Texas Telephone Company sold its holdings to Southwestern States Telephone Company. In 1937, Southwestern States converted the exchange to common battery and thus ended the use of the crank-type telephone. There were 375 telephones in service at the time of the conversion. Then in 1957 the Goldthwaite exchange was converted to dial having 600 telephone users at that time.

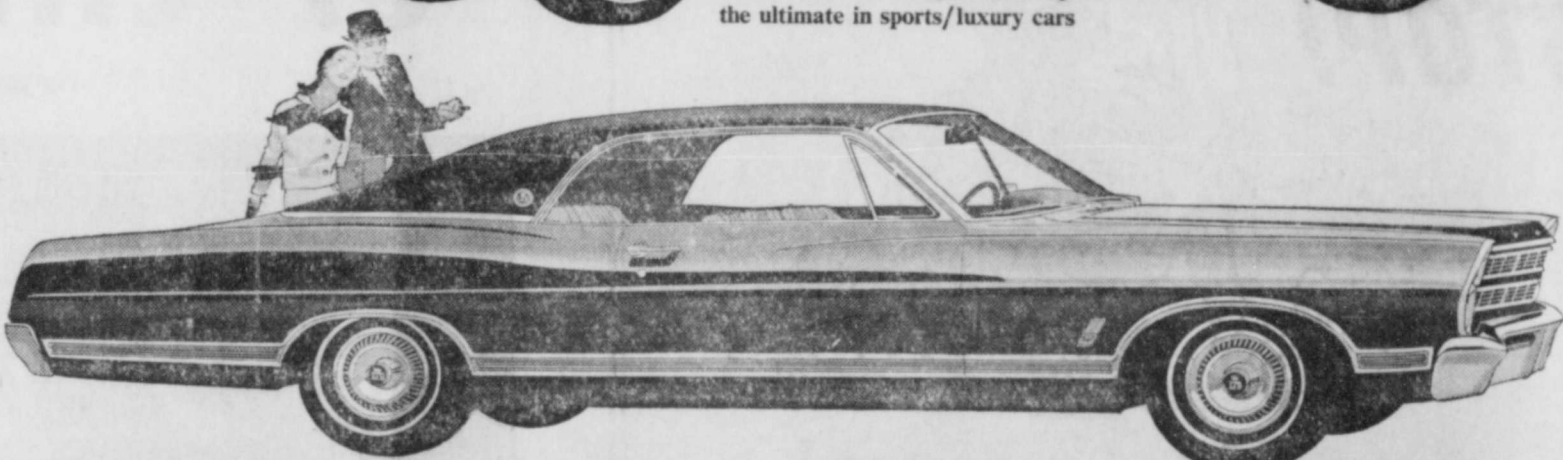

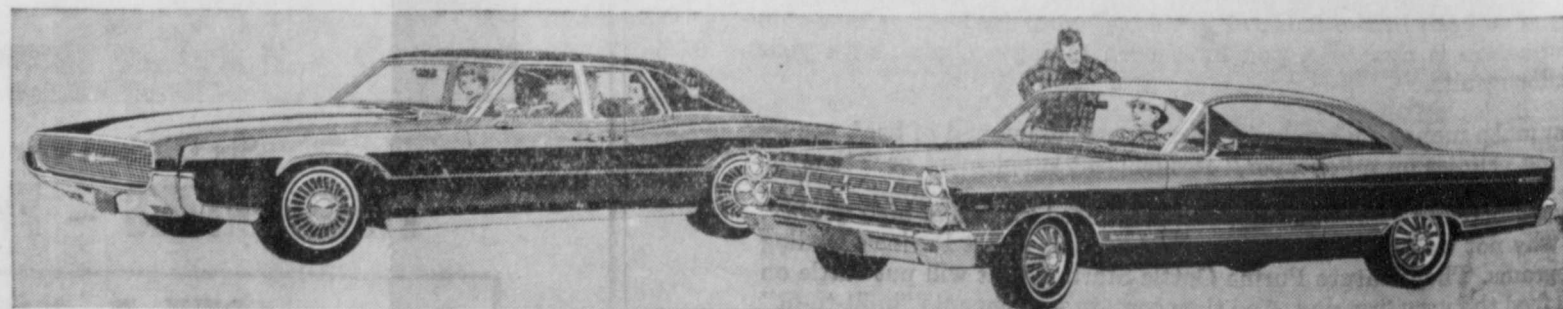

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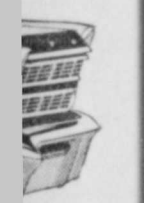

Survey And Study Will Be Made Of Surface Mines Areas In County

A survey and study of strip and surface mined areas in Mills County is being made by the Soil Conservation Service, according to Elgin Smith, Work Unit Conservationist. The first phase of this study is an on-site appraisal of areas that have been mined for limestone in this county. Information gained from this study will be used by the SCS to assist the Brown Mills Soil and Water Conservation District in planning ways to return these mined areas to production after the mining operations are completed, Smith said.

President Johnson has allocated \$36.5 million for this nationwide study in which several governmental agencies are cooperating. In Texas, the SCS has the primary responsibility of making the Field Survey of mined areas. J. David Kelley, Soil Scientist, Brownwood, Texas, is the party leader for the West Texas survey team. Carl Casbeer, local technician of the SCS, is assisting with the survey in this county.

Limestone, sand and gravel, clay, gypsum and iron ore are usually mined by scraping off

soil. The material is piled high and left to erode and choke nearby streams and ponds with mud. When the mining operation is completed these pits and piles are usually left as unsightly, unproductive, dangerous areas. Many children are injured or killed while playing around these old mines each year. In Texas, several hundred thousand acres have been mined and left in a deteriorating condition. This is a major challenge to conservationists, Smith said.

Mining companies have recognized the problem of abandoned mines and are cooperating in the survey. Some companies take pride in restoring old mined areas to a better condition than they were before being disturbed. Sometimes an old mine pit can be made into a recreation lake for the use and enjoyment of local residents. Usually mined areas can be filled with the spoil or waste material, graded into a rolling landscape, seeded with grass and returned to production, Smith said.

Through this survey and study in Texas, the SCS will be able to provide technical assistance on the most successful and economical ways to restore these old mined areas to usefulness.

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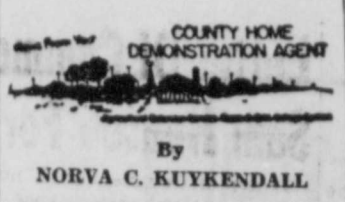

LABELS EXPLAINED
You see the words "restored," "enriched," or "fortified" on grain products every time you go into a grocery store, but do you know what they mean?
The outer layers of grains contain most of the vitamins and minerals. When these layers are removed in the process of milling, much of the food value of the grain is lost. Some grain products have nutrients added to them to make up for these losses. The wording on the label tells how many of the nutrients in a grain product have been added during the manufacturing process.

RESTORED — Many breakfast cereals have nutrients added to replace part of the milling losses. These products may be restored in most of the nutrients or in only one or two. The selection of the nutrients and the amounts added are determined by the manufacturer, as there is no standard for restored cereals.

ENRICHED — Bread and cereals that have the word "enriched" on the label have specific amounts of nutrients added. These amounts are set by the Federal Food and Drug Administration. The nutrients included in the enrichment program are iron and three of the B-vitamins: thiamine, riboflavin, and niacin.

FORTIFIED — Fortified foods have one or more nutrients added which were not in the product originally. Examples are vitamin D added to milk and vitamin A added to margarine.

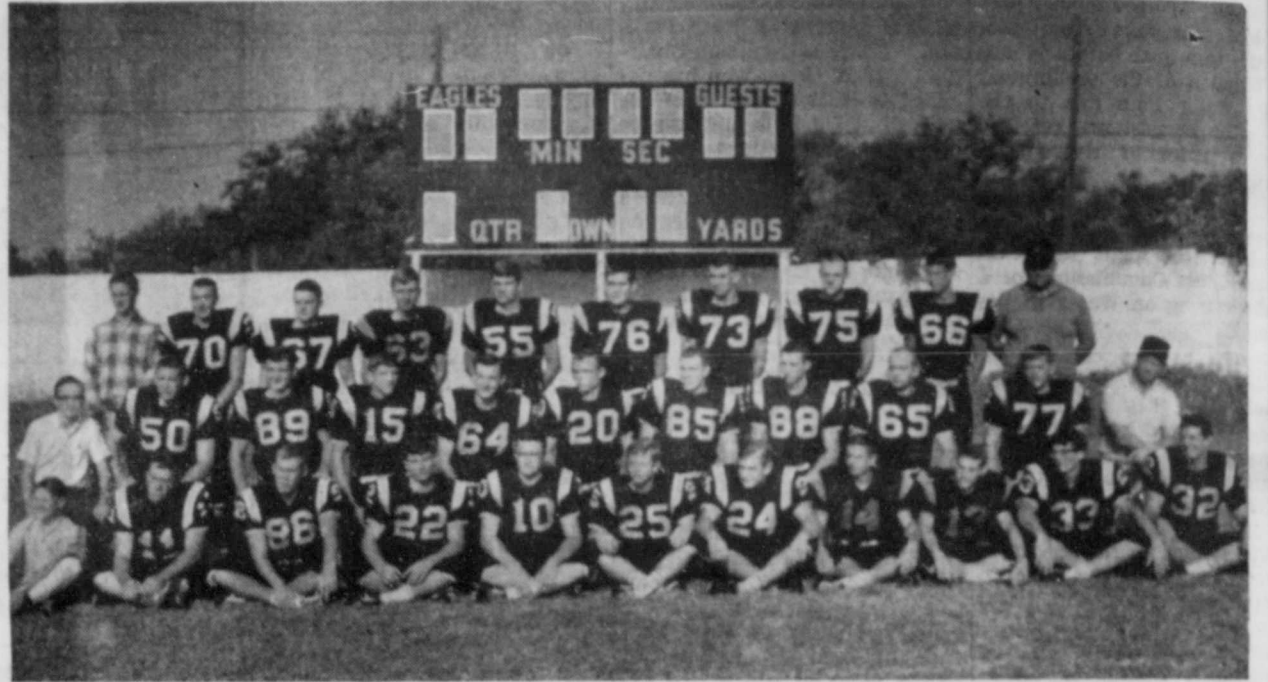

V. C. Bradford Elected Chairman; ASC County Committee Takes Office

The new Mills County ASC Committeemen are V. C. Bradford, Chairman; L. C. Schwartz, Vice-Chairman; and Ralph Duren, Member. In taking office, Mr. Bradford, the Chairman, made this statement:

"The Committee aims are (1) good service, fairness to farmers; (2) desire to make programs succeed in improving farm income and strengthening

the business of the county; and (3) stop waste of soil and water resources, needed for future survival."

Farmers are chosen to serve as the County Committee by ASC community committees throughout the county, who are elected by their neighbors in annual nonpolitical elections, under legal provisions administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Terms of office for county committeemen were established last year on a 3-year term basis with one new member being elected each year for 3 years. This, however, varies according to the number of actual vacancies on the committee.

In addition, first and second alternates are elected for 1 year each. Of the Mills County Committee, Mr. Schwartz is serving his second year of a 2-year term, Mr. Duren is serving his second year of a 3-year term; and Mr. Bradford was re-elected this year for a 3-year term. The newly elected alternates are Hubert Berry, First Alternate, and Bobby Baird, Second Alternate.

The farmer-committee system is unique. No other group of citizens has so direct a voice in running Government programs. The elected committees have responsibility for the local administration of Federal programs, including expenditures of Federal funds, but they are not Federal office holders. Congress holds the Department of Agriculture responsible, and the Department in turn relies on the judgment and leadership of the locally elected farmers and the county office employees. The county office serves as the headquarters for farmer business connected with program participation.

Major ASC activities in Mills County include the ACP, price-support loans on wheat, oats and cotton, the feed grain program, the wheat program, the upland cotton program, the wool and lamb program and others.
