City Council Meets Monday Night; Routine Business Taken Care Of

The City Council met Monday night in regular session at the city hall when routine business was taken care of.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, presented monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments and also the quarterly treasurer's report.

Announcement was made that the city had purchased a tractor with mower and shredder. The equipment has been put into use during the past two weeks with many improvements noted around town where tall weeds and grass has been cleared out.

Annual report of operations for the Mills County Swimming Pool was made. It showed the pool made an operating profit of \$660.12 for the 1966 season. This was the best season for the pool in several years, it was noted.

Official audit of the city's books was approved, as presented by auditing firm during the past month.

The Council discussed and voted to act as sponsoring agent for providing Blue Cross-Blue Shield group insurance for city employees.

The need to replace the old open top water storage reservoir on the old Priddy highway was discussed. The council was presented estimates for building a new steel storage tank in the same location to serve as a gathering place for the city's wells.

The council went on record as seeing the need for this improvement and instructed the city manager to give the matter further study with the advice of an engineer.

By eliminating the worn out open top storage tank and replacing it with a closed storage facility the city's water system would meet requirements for the official stamp of approval from the State Health Department.

The council voted to share the expense with J. D. Kight in covering the city drainage ditch on the north side of the Kight Mobil station on a 50-50 basis, with the city's share \$92.25.

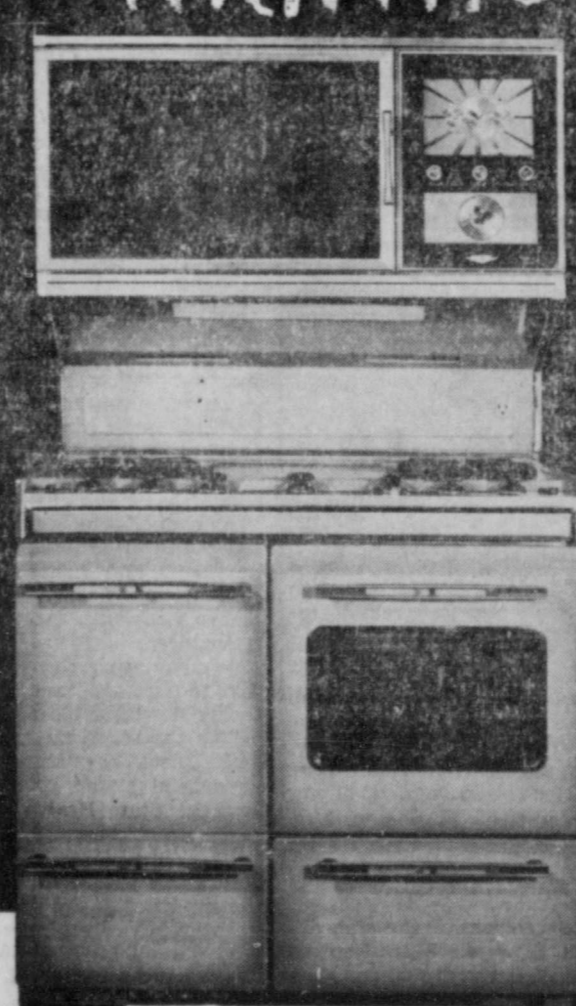

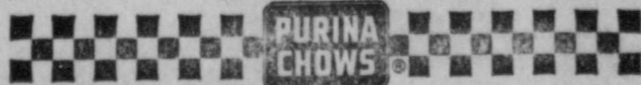

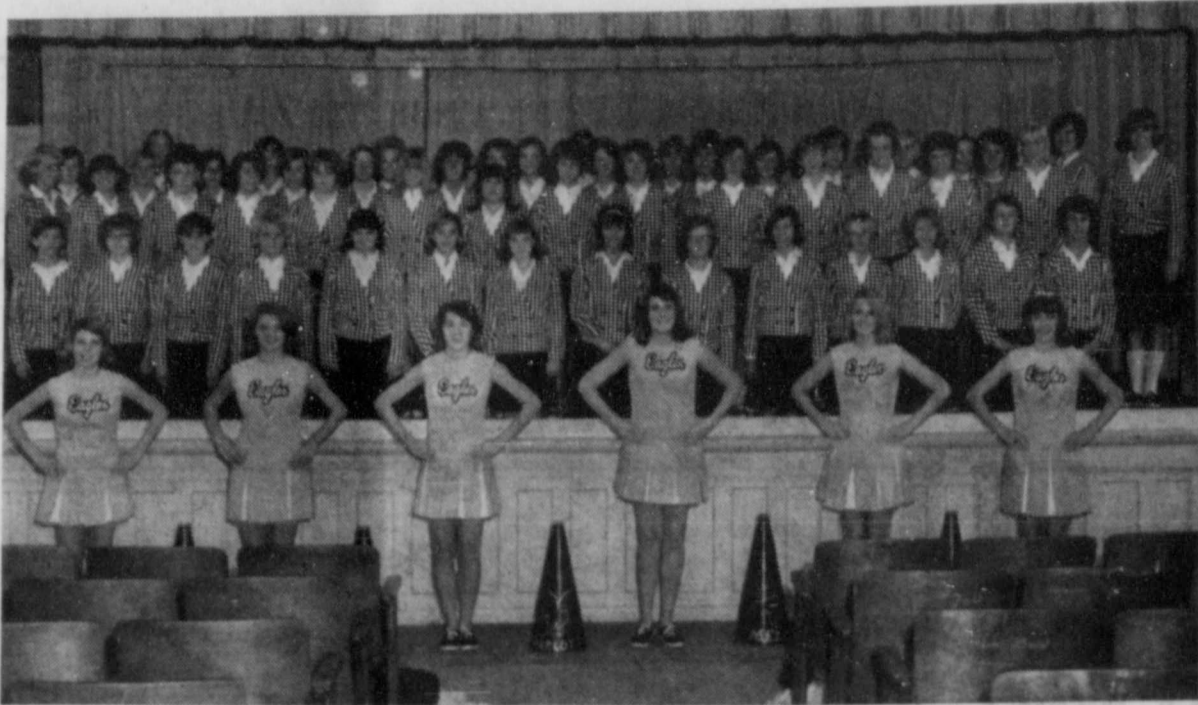

The first of four College Orientation nights was held in the Goldthwaite High School Auditorium Tuesday night.

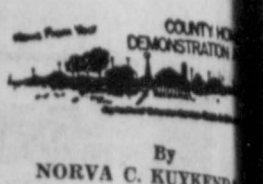
Senior students from the four Mills County High Schools attended the program that was presented by O'Donnell Newton, county counselor and supervisor of the four schools.

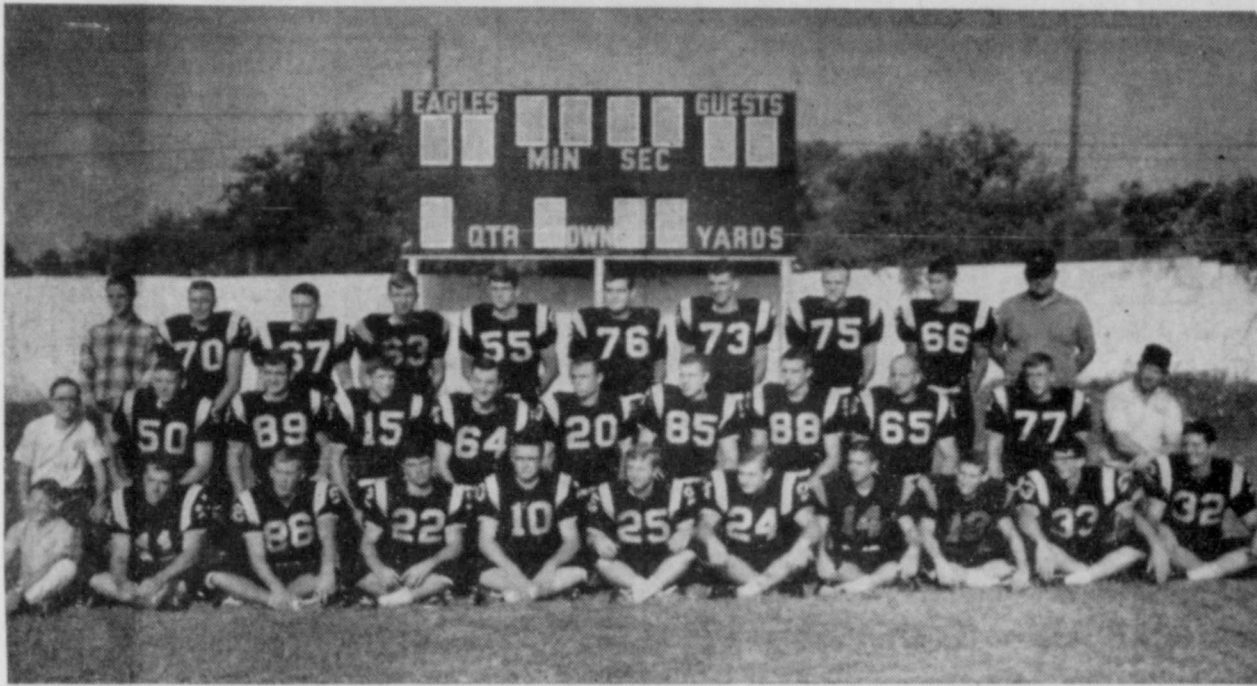

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas school teachers are planning a big push for another pay raise. This time it will be for a \$500-a-year increase with a built-in adjustment to keep their salary level equal to the national average.

They will try to sell the 1967 Legislature on this plan — on the heels of a \$100,000,000 raise voted them in 1965.

Legislative candidates already have been polled by the Texas

State Teachers Association. More than half the 415 candidates responded to the TSTA questionnaire on salary increases, retirement benefits and a statewide sick leave program. Of the 212 who responded, three-fourths reportedly favor the salary plan which would move the teachers to the national average next year and set up the machinery "to keep them there automatically without a biennial bloodletting legislative fight." Support was said to be almost identical for retirement and sick leave propositions.

TSTA's salary proposal calls for adjusting the base pay at the beginning of each biennium to insure that it remains at the national average. This likely will mean increases in teacher pay every two years since the "average" will automatically rise with each Texas hike in pay.

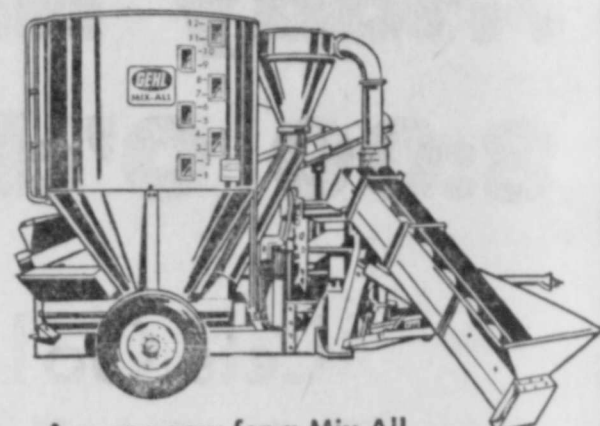

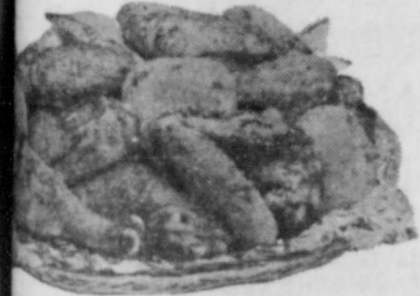

Post Office To Assist Patrons With Zip Codes During October

Residents in the Goldthwaite Area will be offered an opportunity to ZIP Code their mailing lists during October, Acting Postmaster Ray Duren announced today.

Rural and Star Route carriers will deliver "no postage needed" cards to each Goldthwaite Route box beginning October 10, the postmaster said. The cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the

proper ZIP Codes. Cards will likewise be placed in all post office boxes and each general delivery patron will receive one. Just fill in the proper spaces and send the card to the Post Office. No postage is needed. The correct ZIP Codes will be added and the card returned to you.

President Johnson has proclaimed October 10-15 as "ZIP Code Week" to promote greater usage of ZIP Code.

"This is a good time to get the ZIP Codes missing from your lists," Acting Postmaster noted. "This Christmas, ZIP Code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient and on-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks."

"Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards. ZIP Codes represent delivery areas for the postal service, not individuals. We will be glad to help you put ZIP into your mail."

1967 Vehicle Inspection Is Now Underway

Colonel Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced today that the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

Garrison said that the new inspection period began on September 1 and will end on April 15, 1967 as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5,500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas inspection stations can be identified by the official vehicle inspection station sign displayed at each station.

Garrison suggested that if motorists have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance, the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection will be eliminated.

In announcing the new inspection period, the Public Safety Director pointed out that vehicle defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during 1965 were the fewest yet experienced since the inspection program began in 1951.
