Lions Club Awarded International Banner At Meeting Last Tuesday

Goldthwaite Lions Club was presented a Lions International Banner Award during special award night ceremonies held last Tuesday night.

The event which attracted many district, state and international officials was held in the high school gym. More than one hundred out-of-town guests attended the affair which had an attendance of nearly 300 persons. Guests represented 14 Lions Clubs from a wide area of Texas.

Dave A. Evans, Texas City, Lions International 2nd vice president, was the guest speaker and presented the award to Lions Club President Glynn Collier.

The club won the award last year, during the 1965-66 club year, in international competition for membership gain. Goldthwaite club won fifth place among 20,389 clubs in 135 nations in the world in percentage of membership gain. Membership gain for the club last year was 44. The club now has 123

members.

This was the first time in seven years since a United States club won one of the top five places in the contest.

Dr. Chris S. Cruzcosa was master of ceremonies for the program. Mark Daniel and Mac Casbeer presented the Colors. Truett Auldridge led the group in the first verse of America while Dr. T. C. Graves led the Pledge of Allegiance. The invocation was given by Rev. Tommy Jones.

Lions Club President Glynn Collier gave the welcome address; Lion Harold Yarborough introduced out-of-town dignitaries and Lion Ray Duren presented visiting club representatives.

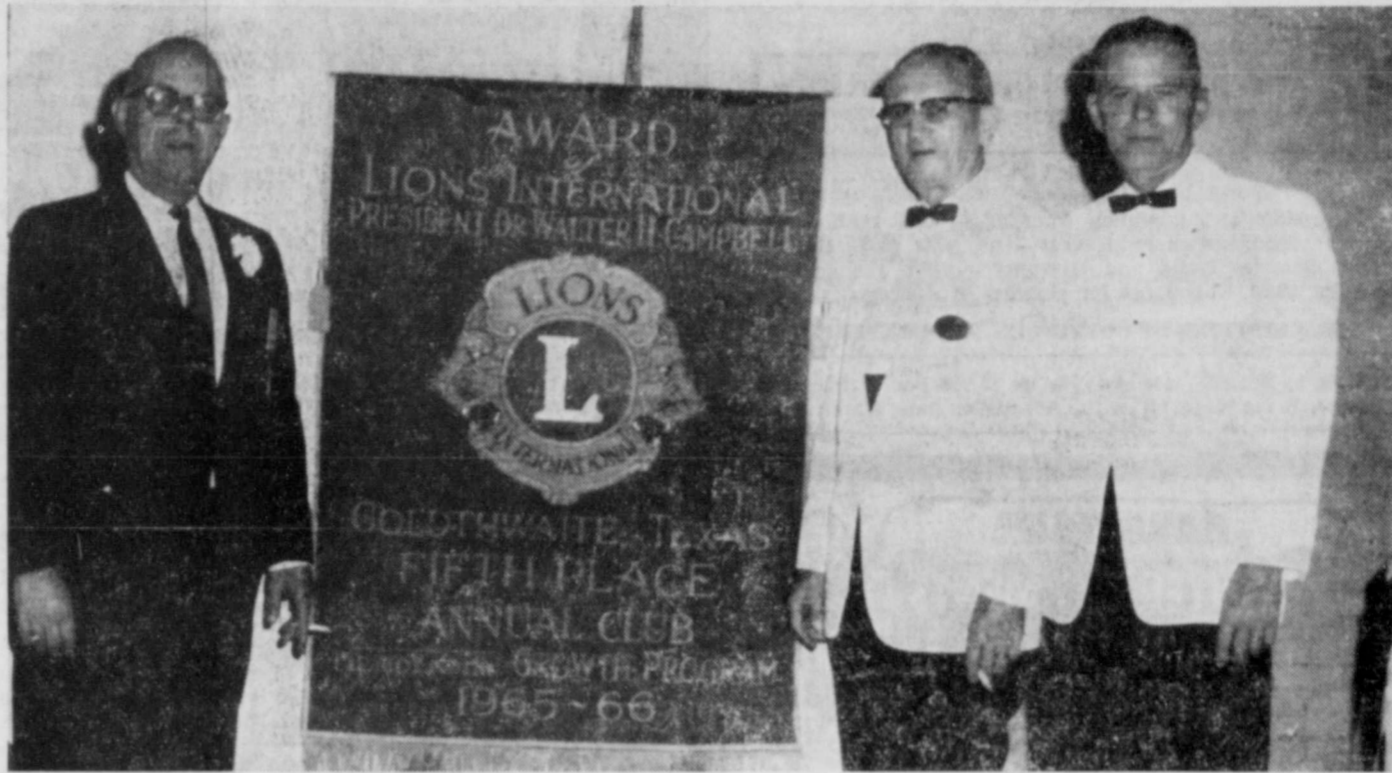
Zone chairman Raymond Casbeer introduced District Governor Harvey Palmer, San Angelo, who spoke to the group. He brought special greetings from Lions of India.

General Election Will Be Held Tuesday November 8

The 1966 General Election will be held in Mills County next Tuesday, November 8.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m.

Mills County voters will cast their ballots in all of the 13 voting boxes as they have during the past two years, since changes went into effect annexing some of the smaller boxes.

This is an off year with no presidential candidates and will likely generate less interest than that shown during a presidential election year.

While there has been little interest expressed locally in the U. S. Senate race which has stirred up considerable activity throughout the state, a good turnout is expected here in the Tuesday election.

The ballot for Mills County this year contains five columns in the following order: Democratic Party, Republican Party, Constitution Party, Conservative Party, and Write-In.

In addition to the five columns for political parties, and write-ins, the ballot also contains 16 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on. The ballot is the largest in many years, if not ever, it measures 11 inches by 34 inches.

The Democratic Party has a full list of candidates for all offices from U. S. Senator on down to the state and local level.

Republican Party column has candidates for the offices of Governor, U. S. Senator, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Agriculture Commissioner, Commissioner of General Land Office, Comptroller of Public Accounts and State Representative.

The Constitution Party column has candidates listed for the following offices: Governor, U. S. Senator, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Agriculture Commissioner, Commissioner of General Land Office, Comptroller of Public Accounts, State Treasurer and Railroad Commissioner.

Conservative Party column has a candidate for Governor only.

AMENDMENTS

Texans will vote on 16 proposed amendments to the State Constitution on November 8.

Major interest has been attracted to two amendments:

- No. 11 would double the Texas Water Development Fund from \$200,000,000 to \$400,000,000 and broaden its uses to include

Work is progressing very satisfactorily on the dam at the big lake being prepared for the railroad company to afford water for the locomotives, but it is not likely the work will be completed before spring.

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
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Maurine Mooney Receives "Distinguished Service" Award

Tuesday's general election looms as one of the most important voting days ever to occur in a so-called "off year" when the presidential race is not on the ballot.

Political observers, viewing the light turn-out in the Spring primaries, are justifiably alarmed about the prospects of a small vote.

Their concern is mirrored by statistics. Since 1936, the average turn-out in a non-presidential election has been a dismal 33.4 per cent of the eligible voters.

This should not be the case this year. Next Tuesday, the fate of 16 Congressional Amendments will be determined by you.

Next Tuesday, a spirited U. S. Senate race will end — a race in which your vote must last six years.

Next Tuesday, all of our State Senators will be selected — due to re-districting.

And next Tuesday, voters will determine their county's strength at the 1968 State political conventions. This fact too often is overlooked. As the election law now stands, our county will have one vote at the state political convention for every 300 votes cast in the governor's race. A heavy turn-out of voters Tuesday will give us a stronger voice two years from now.

Your vote is yours alone; no one else can cast it for you. If you don't use it, it is lost. Your voice in the future conduct of our state and nation is muffled.

Take time Tuesday to vote. And, if you are going to be out of the county Tuesday, remember that Friday, November 4, is the last day you can cast your absentee vote.

water filtration, treatment and transportation facilities.

• No. 7 would repeal the poll tax (already nullified by federal court decision) and substitute annual voter registration.

Other amendments would:

• Increase elected judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals from three to five (No. 9).

• Exempt agricultural lands in urban areas from full-value taxation (No. 1).

• Provide that taxes or bonds voted by school district will not be invalidated by changes in boundaries (No. 10).

• Remove limitations on voting by armed services personnel (already invalidated by federal court) (No. 14).

• Set legislator's term beginning on opening day of regular lawmaking sessions (No. 16).

• Remove Arlington State College from the permanent university fund (No. 3).

Authorize Legislature to pass laws to accomplish the following:

• Create airport authorities (No. 2).

• Set terms of conservation district directors up to six years (No. 4).

• Provide a statewide retirement system for employees of counties and subdivisions (No. 5).

• Permit benefit payments to survivors of law officers, prison guards and firemen killed on duty (No. 6).

• Ease voting restrictions for those who have recently moved (No. 8).

• Provide for dissolving hospital districts (No. 12).

• Permit major counties to consolidate some governmental functions and make contract with each other for services (No. 13).

• Authorize acceptance of private or federal funds for aid to physically and mentally handicapped (No. 15).

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
