Mills County Voters Give Waggoner Carr Slight Lead

Mills County voters went to the polls Tuesday in light numbers and gave Democrat Waggoner Carr only a slight lead over incumbent Republican John Tower in the contest for the U. S. Senate seat from Texas. Carr polled 424 votes in the county while Tower received 410. Governor John Connally along with all other Democratic candidates on the ballot, except for U. S. Senator, received a large majority over their opponents. Connally was favored with 617 votes while his Republican opponent, T. E. Kinnerly received 153. Other Democratic candidates received substantially the

same margin of victory from Mills County voters, while only 836 turned out to cast their ballot in this off-year election. This was considerably less than 50 per cent of the voting strength of Mills County. On the constitutional amendments voters here favored 10 while they turned their thumbs down on six of the record 16 on the ballot. Returns came in on record time, considering the extra large ballot, with un-official tabulation being completed by 11:00 p. m. Eagles Dehorn Longhorns 47 - 0

Travel To Santa Anna To Play For 9A District Championship

The Goldthwaite Eagles accounted for their third straight District 9A win as they dehorned the Early Longhorns 47-0 on Eagle Field last Friday night.

The Eagles received the kickoff but lost the ball on the first play from scrimmage to the Longhorns on a Goldthwaite fumble to put Early in the Eagles' territory where the Long-

horns picked up their only first down of the ball game.

With Goldthwaite taking the Longhorn punt on their own 2 yard line, they carried the ball deep into Early territory on runs of 19 and 22 yards by Gary Warlick and a 40 yard run by Charles Blackburn.

On a fourth and eight, quarterback Mike Conradt passed to Blackburn for the first touchdown of the ball game with 4:07 left in the first quarter.

Bobby Rountree kicked the extra point to lead the Longhorns by a slight 7-0 margin.

A first down pick up by Gary Warlick and Harold Moore and a completed pass by Conradt to Rountree for 27 yards late in the first quarter set up the early second quarter touchdown for the Eagles.

Mike Conradt tossed a five yard pass to Rountree on a second down play to complete the touchdown and add six points to the scoreboard to lead the Longhorns 13-0 with 11:27 left in the first half.

Bobby Rountree completed the third touchdown on a two yard run and kicked the extra point to bring the score to 20-0 with 8:31 still remaining in the half.

Conradt engineered ball carriers Moore, Blackburn, Warlick and Rountree in eleven plays for a total gain of 65 yards before Blackburn completed the touchdown on a 26 yard run on a first down play to end the scoring for the first half 26-0.

Blackburn picked up the first touchdown in the second half on a 36 yard run right down the middle of the Longhorn's line with 7:37 left to play in the third quarter.

Rountree's kick was good to bring the score to 33-0 for the Eagles.

Guard Joe Dellis set up the last third quarter touchdown for the Eagles when he covered a Early fumble on the Longhorns' 8 yard line with quarterback Ted Roberts completing a toss to Rountree for the touchdown.

Rountree's kick attempt was good to accomplish a 40-0 lead over Early.

The final touchdown for the Eagles came early in the fourth quarter on a quarterback sneak by Ted Roberts on a second and one situation.

Again Rountree's kick was good to end the score 47-0.

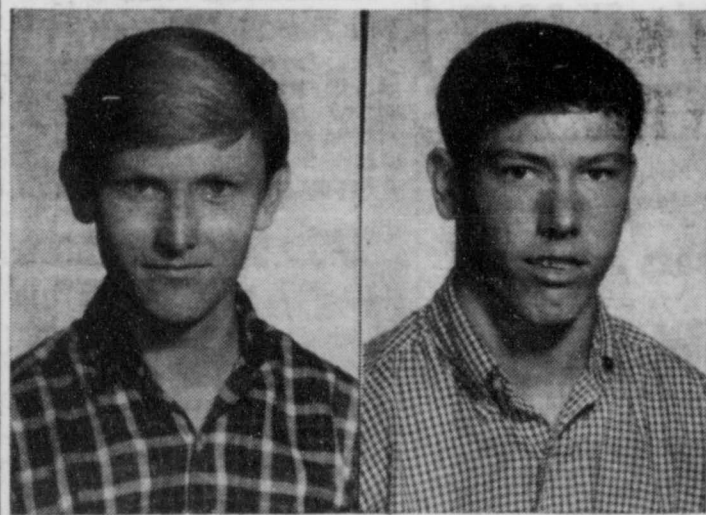

Screwworm Case In Mills County Confirmed Sunday

Mills County has its first confirmed case of screwworms since the screwworm eradication program got underway several years ago, it was reported Monday by Livestock Inspector, Joe Davis and County Agent George Reese.

The livestock inspector was informed Sunday that a case of screwworms was found on the Allen Hardgrave ranch in the northern part of the county.

This ranch will be the focal point for sterile flies to be dropped this week.

County Agent George Reese has mailing tubes for suspected cases of screwworms and he cautions livestock producers to be especially alert for suspected cases and send the worms to Mission, Texas for confirmation.

He stated further that all animals should be treated regardless of whether they are confirmed screwworm cases or not to prevent spreading.

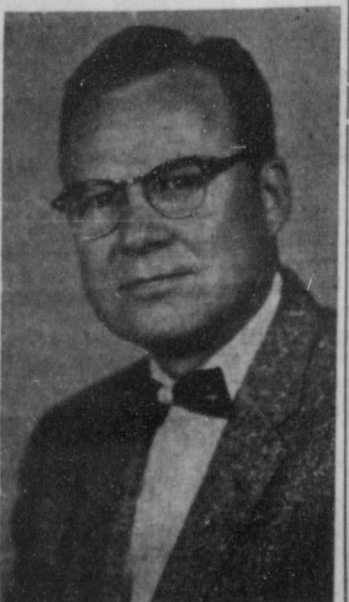
Harper Is Elected Member Howard Payne College Trustees

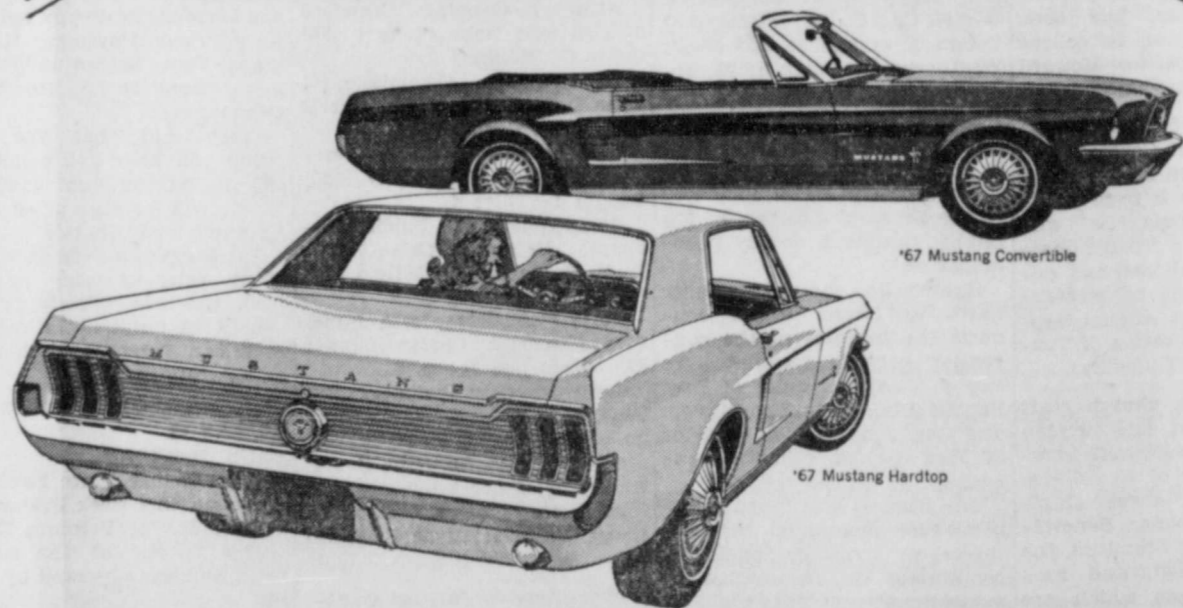
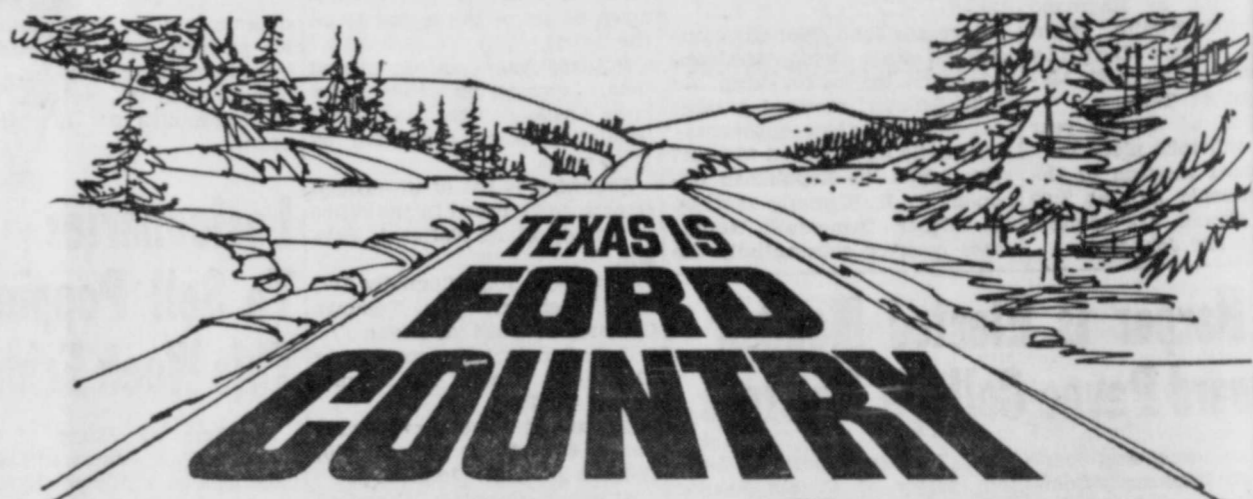

Donna, who was born with an open spine (spina bifida), symbolizes the 250,000 American babies born with birth defects each year. The March of Dimes has helped her as part of its continuing fight against birth defects.

There was a time when the independent little miss wanted to sleep in her braces so she could get up by herself in the morning. She helps around the house by picking up her toys, helping mother with the dishes and cookie-baking.

Donna frequently visits her grandparents' ranch near Corsicana, 40 miles from her home in Hillsboro, Tex., to ride her pet pony Popsy.

When she's on Popsy, Donna's blue eyes sparkle and her blonde pony tail bounces up and down. Riding gives her a feeling of freedom—Donna needs no crutches when she rides.

But she can't walk without crutches, and her partially paralyzed legs are supported by braces every waking hour.

Donna's open spine was treated when she was 18 months old, and she has had four operations since. Her general health is good, and her doctor thinks she may be able to discard her right leg brace someday.

Popsy is not Donna's only pet. In fact she is surrounded by animals. Her 3-year-old poodle, Fluffy, is a favorite, and she keeps goldfish in a bowl in her room. Donna also finds time to play with a neighbor's kitten.

During the January March of Dimes campaign tour, this 5-year-old charmer will make public appearances in about 20 cities from coast to coast. There will be guest spots with the stars of television, motion pictures, and radio.

Along with Donna on this nationwide tour will be her parents, Mr. and Mrs. David J. Dill, both native Texans.

Donna's father is quite at home on the range. As a student in high school and college he roped calves in rodeos. He is employed today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as the Assistant County Supervisor for the Farmers' Home Administration.

The National Poster Child's mother, Jo Ford Dill, is secretary of the Hill County (Tex.) Chapter of the National Foundation-March of Dimes.

A former majorette in college, she is teaching Donna to use a baton, but Donna's ambition is elsewhere. A true Texan, she wants to be a cowgirl when she grows up. She privately confesses, however, that she would settle for being a mother or a nurse.

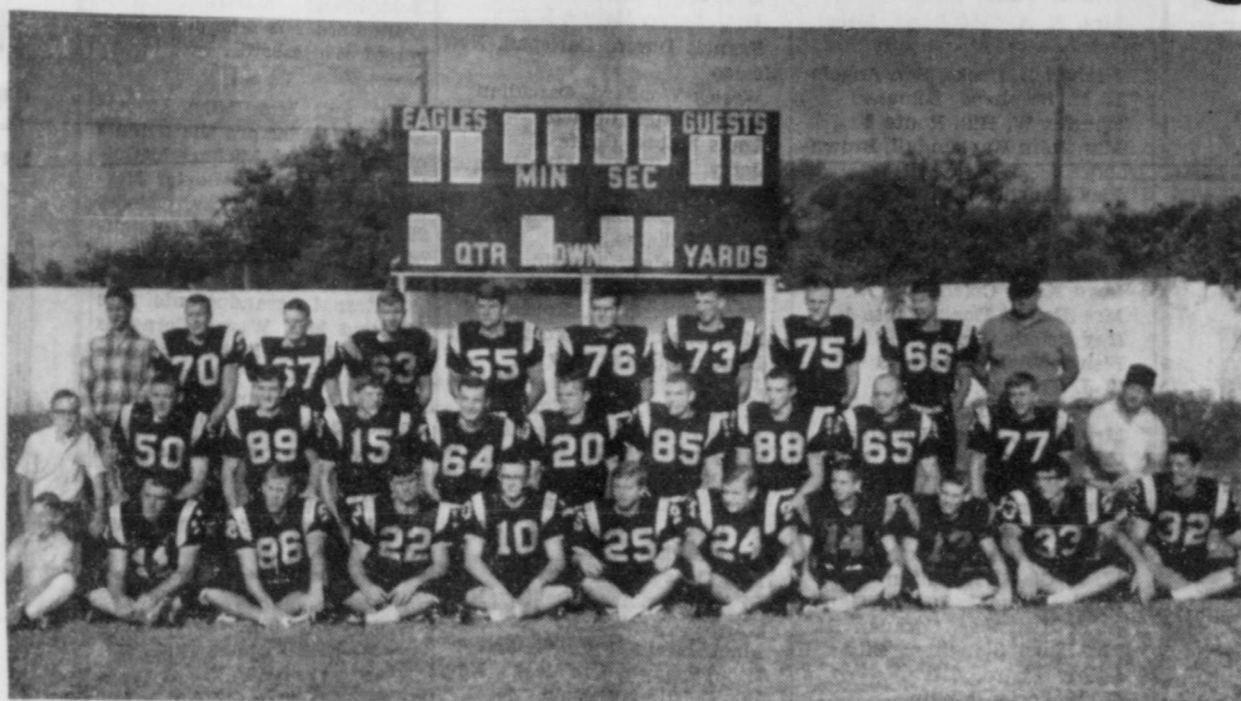

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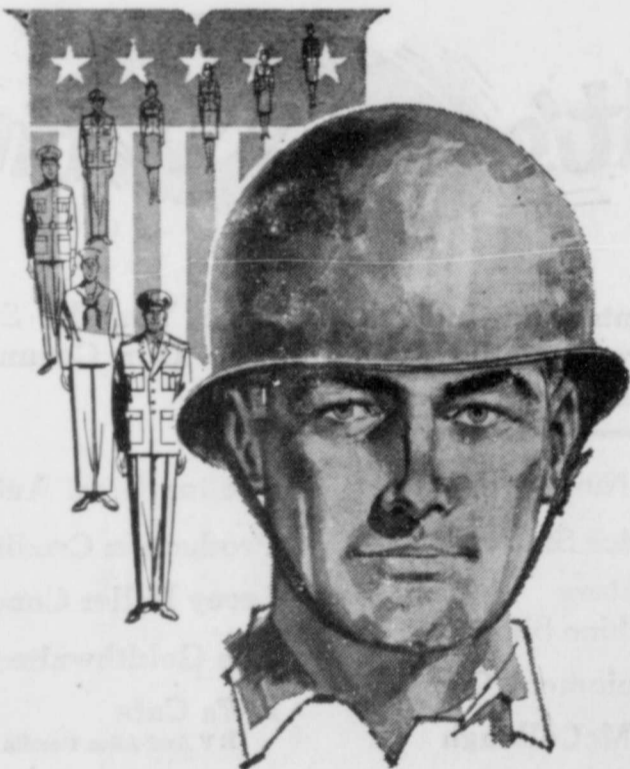

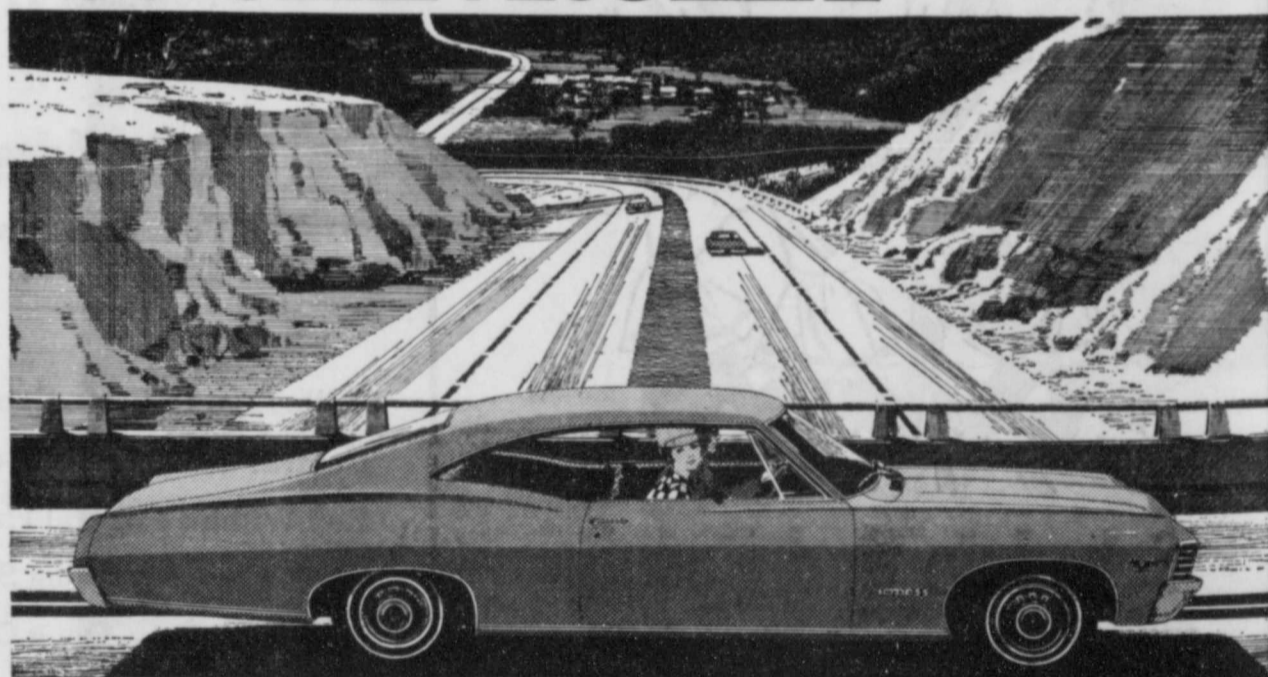

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Best Texas Deer Shoot Forecast As Season Opens This Saturday

A massive man-versus-beast conflict that could pit half a million hunters against Texas' estimated 2,500,000 deer herd will be initiated Saturday, November 12.

That is the opening date for the annual big game season in most Texas counties including Mills County under direct harvest supervision of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The kickoff for most counties where wildlife resources are managed by the Texas Legislature will be Wednesday, November 16, the traditional opener.

There are many deviations from these dates, according to the Department, including the popular Trans-Pecos 16-day season beginning Saturday, November 26.

Every indication points to a tremendous harvest of deer. And that is the fervent wish of game management authorities.

Their successful efforts over the years have raised the once sparse whitetailed deer herds to such enormous proportions that only a record harvest will avert a possible over-population crisis. Likewise, the wild turkey prospects were reported substantial.

The response by sportsmen seems adequate. Department headquarters personnel report unprecedented requests for hunting licenses that apparently will far exceed last year's 745,000 overall total.

Ammunition dealers report sales so brisk that their supplies of certain kinds of rifle bullets have become limited.

From the ranges comes word to the Department that deer have never been so numerous and generally are in good condition, all because of the food supplies. The surplus is so great in many counties that a third, or bonus, antlerless deer is authorized under the permit system.

And the weather provided a pre-season bonus in some places, with rain to moisten the tinder-dry range, lush with heavy vegetation, plus cool temperatures to hasten defoliation of brush areas to improve hunters' visibility.

The setting was so ideal that the Department could add only the suggestion that sportsmen inform themselves on various regulations involving bag limits and dates in different areas. A specially prepared Hunting Guide long ago was sent to license agents and field forces to be distributed on request.

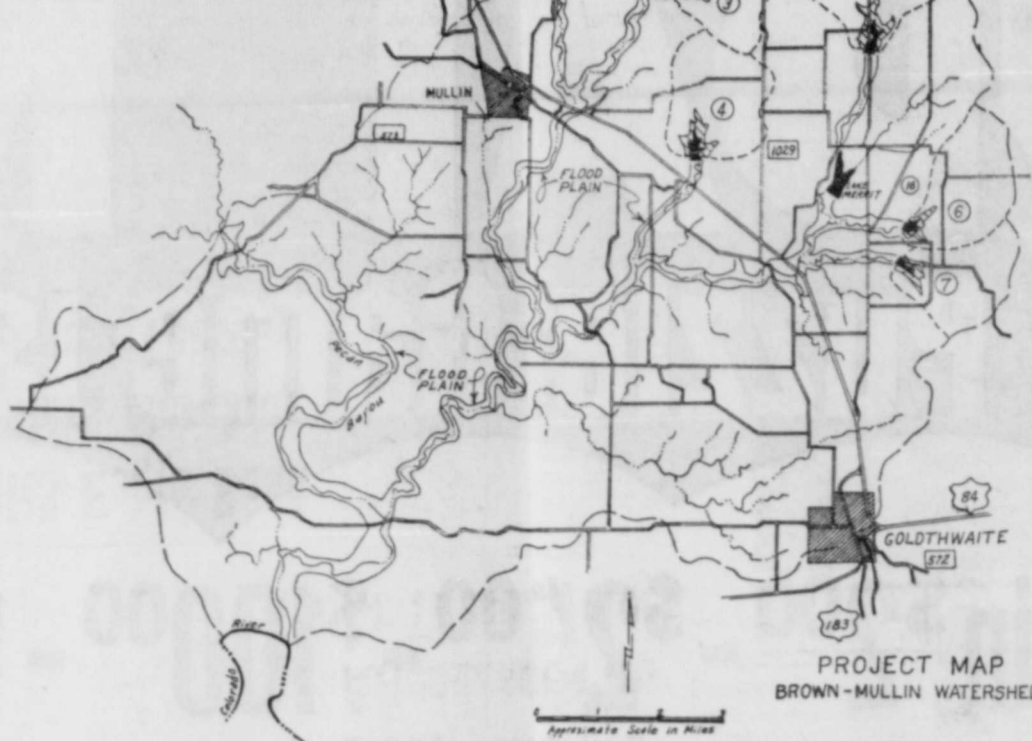
Billy Sewell was given a 10 year probated sentence after he entered a plea of guilty on a burglary charge.

Land Rights Needed By Sponsors For Brown, Mullin Creek Programs

Local sponsors of the flood prevention program for Brown and Mullin Creeks are seeking land rights for seven floodwater retarding dams.

The sponsors, Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District and Mills County Commissioners Court, were assisted in planning the retarding dam locations by the Soil Conservation Service.

Brown-Mullin Creek is one of 15 sub-watersheds in the 5,000,000 acre Middle Colorado authorized watershed, according to Elgin Smith, Work Unit Conservationist with the local Soil Conservation Service office.

Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors W. G. Bishop and Lee Roy Schwartz are working with the land owners directly involved in the watershed getting land rights. "Future construction of the seven dams by SCS is dependent on the participation of the local people in granting easements to our local organization," Bishop stated. "We urge the cooperation of all concerned in completing the arrangements for the necessary land rights. The time used to get the easements required, to a large degree, will

govern how long it will be until installation of the dams can begin," says Bishop.

These structures plus conservation applied to the land on the upper reaches of the watershed will reduce annual flood plain damage by 64 per cent, Bishop further stated.

Elgin Smith points out that with the needed land treatment applied and the seven planned dams in place this 64 per cent annual reduction in flood damages represents a savings of \$11,312 per year to the local people. The reduction in floodwater, sediment, flood plain erosion, and indirect damages will benefit approximately 50 landowners in the 2,919 acres of flood plain. In addition, there will be benefits from the project to owners of non-agricultural facilities, processors of agricultural commodities and other businesses, according to Mr. Smith.
