Minister From India Will Speak At Methodist Church Sunday Night

The Rev. Charles Luke, a Methodist minister who is principal of the Methodist Boys' High School at Hyderabad, India, will be the guest speaker at First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite in the 7:00 p. m. church service Sunday night, November 20th.

Mr. Luke is in the United States as a delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church held this past week in Chicago.

He has been associated with the Hyderabad school since 1932, having seen it grow from 130 students to more than 3,500. Before he became principal in 1944, he was a teacher.

Born in India, he received the bachelor of arts degree from Andhra University in India, the L. T. degree from Madras University, also in India, and the master of arts degree from the University of Denver in Colorado.

Goldthwaite will be the last church visited in this area by Mr. Luke who is on a itinerary which also includes visits to churches in Austin, Elgin, San Antonio, Uvalde, Yoakum, Gonzales, and Bastrop.

The public is cordially invited to hear Mr. Luke when he speaks here Sunday night, according to Rev. Philip M. Riley, pastor of the church.

Eagles Defeated By Santa Anna 7-6 For 9A District Championship Title

The Goldthwaite Eagles were upset Friday night by Santa Anna 7-6 in Mountaineer Stadium for the District 9A Championship.

The Eagles battled the Mountaineers in the first quarter with hard running ball carriers Bobby Rountree, Charles Blackburn, and Harold Moore pushing the ball back to the Mountaineers' one yard line.

Quarterback Mike Conrad scored on a quarterback sneak but the touchdown was nullified by a holding penalty which set the Eagles back 15 yards where two pass attempts fell short and Santa Anna took over.

Late in the second quarter, on a first and ten situation with the ball resting on the Eagles' own 38 yard line, Charles Blackburn broke around his own right end for a 62 yard touchdown.

Bobby Rountree kicked wide for the extra point with no time left on the clock to end the first half 6-0 for the Eagles.

The Mountaineers were really held tightly in the third and fourth quarters by outstanding defensive linemen David Wiedebusch, Joe Dellis, Randy Holland, Ted Roberts, Mac Rowlett, Sam Hudson, Gary Holcomb, Sam Campbell and Harold Moore.

Mills County Farms Now Total 743 According To U. S. Census Bureau

A total of 743 farms was counted in Mills County during the 1964 Census of Agriculture, the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census reports.

Jess Y. Tullos Resigns From J. P. Office

Jess Y. Tullos, long time Mills County commissioner and in recent years, Justice of the Peace, Justice Precinct One, has resigned from that office to retire.

His resignation, which was due to health reasons, was accepted by the Commissioners' Court meeting in regular session Monday. Mr. Tullos did not seek reelection for another term.

The Court accepted his resignation and appointed E. H. Thorne to serve as J. P. for the un-expired term which runs to December 31, this year.

Mr. Thorne was elected Justice of the Peace for precinct one, and will take office for his regular term January 1, 1967.

The Court canvassed and certified returns from the regular general election that was held last week Tuesday.

BERT LOWE, LAYMAN GUEST SPEAKER FOR MEN'S BIBLE CLASS

Bert Lowe, prominent Christian Layman of Brownwood, will be the guest speaker at the Men's Downtown Bible Class this Sunday (November 20).

The class meets at 9:30 o'clock each Sunday morning in the community room of Mills County State Bank. Visitors are cordially invited.

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1959), the total counted in the county was 767 farms. This reflects a decrease of 24 farms during the five year period.

The 1964 total is published in a preliminary report on the county just issued. The report also shows that average farm size in the county was 578.6 acres and that the average value of the county's farms (land and buildings) in 1964 was \$55,337.

Other important county statistics in the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold by farms in the county in 1964, \$5,965,659; in 1959, \$4,699,459.

2. Value of all crops sold by county farms in 1964, \$774,601; in 1959, \$460,465.

3. Value of all livestock and livestock products sold by county farms in 1964, \$5,183,053; in 1959, \$4,238,994.

Information obtained for the first time in an agricultural census included the amount of income received by the county's farmers (\$8,005) from recreational services as well as data on the use of pest control chemicals in the county in 1964.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every 5 years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. The data are needed to make decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. The 1964 farm census was the 18th in a series that began in 1840.

The preliminary report for the county contains more than 500 facts about agriculture in the county. Among additional facts it contains are the number of farms by size, type, and economic class; the number of farm operators by method of tenure, age, color, off-farm work, and number of school years completed; land in farms by use and by land-use practices; data on equipment and facilities; farm expenditures; number of hired workers; and number of farms reporting poultry and livestock production and those reporting crop production by acres and quantities as well as sales.

NOTE: Single copies are available for 10 cents from the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C. 20233 or from any field office of the Department of Commerce. These are located in major cities.

Wheat Producers To Qualify For 1967 Wheat Allotments And Certificates Announced

The 1967 wheat program, which provides acreage diversion payments, will allow a farmer to qualify for wheat allotments and certificates. Mills County office lines it up for a participating farmer.

The program is set up with the ASCS office during the signup period to be announced later.

A farmer who has an acreage of wheat larger than the farm allotment available for production under the program if he wishes to use and signs up for the program or the excess acreage option.

The program maintains the farm's conservation base. (Conserving bases are reduced for 1967 so that the farmer's increased wheat acreage may be utilized.)

The program also maintains all other provisions established for the participating farm.

The program allows the wheat allotment or "permitted" acreage for other farm in which the producer has an interest. This is substitution between wheat and feed grains on the farm and within the feed grain and grain sorghum acreage as permitted acreage as well as the wheat allotments on other farm in which the participating producer has an interest.

The program allows wheat allotments under the 1967 program have been increased to reflect the increase in the national wheat allotment, from 68.2 to 69.2 acres. This is 32 per cent more than the 1966-crop effective allotment. The increased allotment will enable farmers to believe increased production will be profitable to plant wheat and still be eligible for full program benefits.

The farmer's entire wheat production (except any stored excess wheat); and domestic marketing certificates on 35 per cent of the farm allotment's projected production, valued at the difference between \$1.25 and parity on July 1, 1967. (The certificates for the 1966 program are valued at \$1.32 per bushel).

Barley Is Not Included In 1967 Feed Grain Program

Since barley will not be included in the 1967 feed grain acreage diversion program, growers of malting as well as of other types of barley will be able to produce as much or as little of the crop as they wish and still qualify for barley price support. Mills County ASCS office said today.

The announcement that there would be no barley diversion provisions or payments under the 1967 feed grain program was made early in August so that growers could make production plans; barley, like wheat, is a fall-seeded crop in many parts of the country.

Farmers who participate in both wheat and feed grain programs next year may again plant wheat on regular barley base acreage and no feed grain base acreage if they wish. The farm's "feed grain base" for 1967, includes only corn and grain sorghums.

Farmers who wish to plant wheat on regular barley base acreage, however, should ask the ASC County committee for a special barley base for this purpose when they sign up in the programs. The barley base, then, would be similar to the oats-rye base on which farmers also will be able to substitute wheat in 1967, as they did in 1966. These two bases for a farm would be in addition to the farm's feed grain base. (There likewise will be no oats-rye diversion provisions or payments under the 1967 feed grain program.)

Rural Carriers To Distribute Livestock Cards

Rural mail carriers from the Goldthwaite Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning November 21.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Acting Postmaster Duren explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

This means that not every box will get a card, and for this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings.

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Mr. S. E. Thornton, Route 1; Mr. J. D. Evans, Route 2; and Mr. Delmar W. Sears, Route 3.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.







"I would have liked to have seen more of Ireland but we didn't have time.

"All in all it was a wonderful trip but it's good to be home."

New Regulations On Mail To Armed Forces Announced By Post Office

The post office department announced today that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725 — The Dulski Military Mail Act — which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military,

will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Acting Postmaster Ray Duren explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Mailers are also reminded that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail should be sent no later than December 10.


