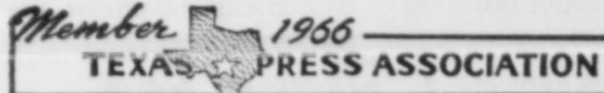

COOKING PORK

Fresh pork is "done" when all traces of pink have disappeared. Thoroughly cooked pork is creamy white in color.

After cooking pieces containing bone, such as pork chops, always cut along the edge of the bone where it joins the flesh, to be sure that the meat is not pink or even pinkish. Pork is one meat which must be cooked to the "done" stage.

Large pieces require much more cooking than small ones, because heat penetrates more slowly into the center of the meat. Large pieces that are well cooked on the outside may be partially cooked or almost raw in the center. To eliminate any doubt when cooking a large piece, make a slight cut into the center of it to see whether all trace of pink has disappeared.

A dependable guide to thorough cooking of fresh pork is to allow 30 minutes' cooking time per pound, at the usual roasting or baking temperature of 350 degrees Fahrenheit. This means to a 185 degree F. or higher internal temperature.

These temperatures are recommended primarily to protect your family from trichinosis. These recommendations allow a considerable safety margin above the temperature necessary to destroy the parasite causing trichinosis.

Fresh pork sausage is "done" when it is gray and no trace of pink remains.

Processed sausage made of pork should always be cooked unless you know definitely that the product was specially processed under Federal supervision.

State or local supervision. Sausage purchased from farmers or peddlers should be cooked every time. Not much heat is required if it actually reaches all parts of the pork. A temperature as low as 137 degrees F. will make the pork safe.

Mixtures of ground beef and pork are used in some places selling hamburgers. If you are

not sure that the hamburger contains only beef, be sure that it is thoroughly cooked before you eat it.

Seven out of ten Americans want to reduce federal government spending to control inflation.

Eight out of ten express concern about inflation.

Two out of three say they have been hurt by it.

One-third feel they are worse off financially than a year ago.

These are some of the results released today from a major national opinion survey taken in early October by the Opinion Research Corporation of Princeton, New Jersey. The study was commissioned by the National Association of Manufacturers.

Given a choice between the two, 71% of the respondents favored a cut in federal spending rather than increased taxes (7%).

Compared with earlier surveys, the latest ORC poll also shows that there is growing concern about inflation with its consequent rising prices and reduced purchasing power of the dollar.

Almost half (48%) of the respondents report they are "greatly concerned" and this concern is evident in all segments of the population, regardless of age, occupation, educational level, or where they live.

Six in ten say they are fighting their own private war against inflation by changing shopping habits . . . cutting down, buying cheaper foods, substituting, designating heretofore "necessities" as "luxuries."

"I walk around the store a long time before I buy anything today." (Woman, over 40, Midwest).

"I look for some things to take the place of other things—some things are just too high." (Woman, over 40, West).

The survey also demonstrates that the effects of inflation are being felt more seriously by the elderly and those with lesser education. More than four in ten, 60 years and older, report that they are "worse off today" than a year ago.

Respondents sometimes talk of holding two jobs—even three—in their efforts to stay above the rising tide of prices:

"I have a hard time making it on my salary sometimes. I think I'll need a second job." (Woman, under 40, West).

"I hold two jobs and one is very poorly paid. If things go much higher can I work three jobs?" (Man, under 40, South).

More than twice as many people blame inflation on the Government than on any other group. Twenty-eight per cent feel Government is "most responsible" for inflation, compared with 6% blaming Business, 10% blaming Labor, and 13% the people themselves. A rising 41% admit that they "don't know" where to lay the blame, although there is much less uncertainty expressed about what to do about it.

Since last spring and reflected in previous ORC opinion surveys, there has been an increase among those favoring federal spending cuts.

"Closing date for the entries will be December 10, 1966, and judging for the Goldthwaite Lions Club's winner will begin soon thereafter," he said.

A total of \$50,000 in awards will be made, including a first prize of \$25,000 in educational and/or career assistance grant, eight semi-finalist awards of \$1,000, and travel expenses to Chicago, Illinois for these semi-finalists in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

A panel of three judges will select a winner from the entries to advance to the Lions District 2A-1 level of judging.

Judging will be held on a Club, District and Multiple District level before approaching World Divisions appraisal.

The Contest, the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world today, is open to young people who are 14 years of age and under 22 as of January 15, 1967.
