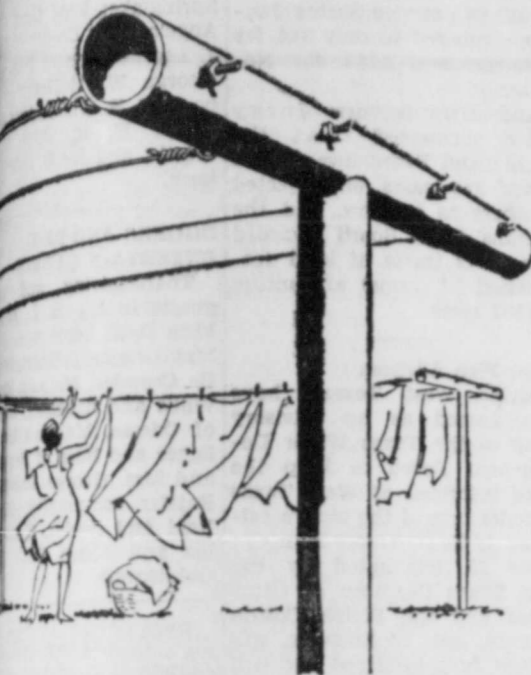

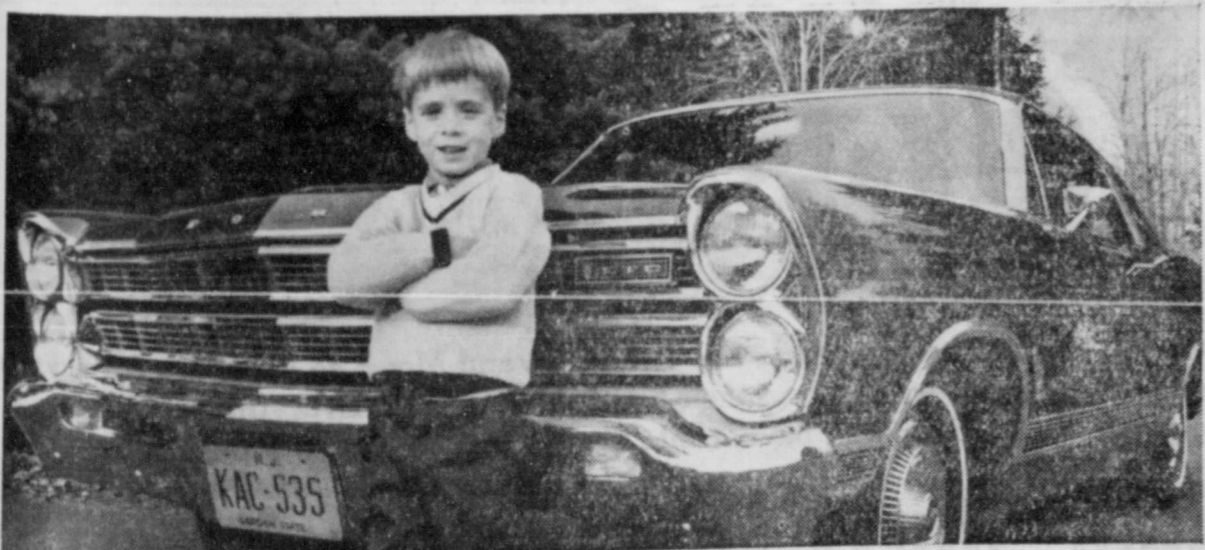

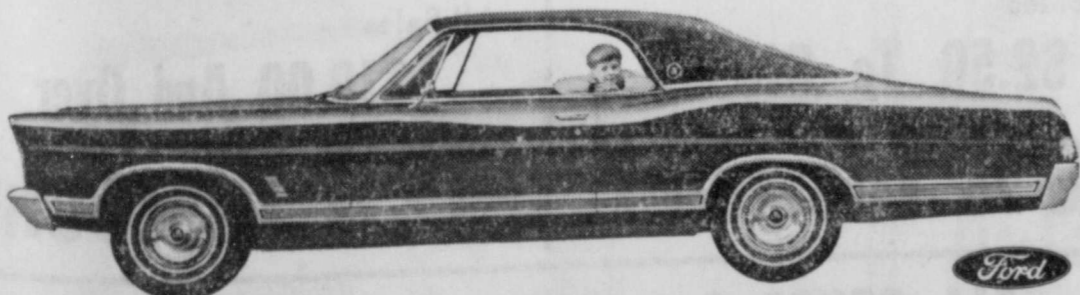

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. John Connally has made his big decisions on state spending and taxes for the coming fiscal period.

He scheduled releases of his budget by sections starting November 20. Reportedly, it calls for just under \$200,000,000 in new taxes.

First section on state employment problems calls for payroll hikes of \$75,000,000 from all funds and \$26,000,000 from the general revenue.

Connally told Texas mayors and council members that he will not recommend the optional local sales taxes they advocate. He indicated that he won't

ask for an increase in state general sales levies. Speculation is that the governor will include a gasoline tax increase, college tuition boost and sales tax on alcoholic beverages in his revenue program. He definitely will recommend some financial relief for hard-pressed cities. He hinted this will be in the form of state assistance for building, maintaining and policing streets.

While Connally completed his financial recommendations which will be sent to legislators on December 15, legislative budget writers made no progress.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith has not called a meeting of the Legislative Budget Board since dismissal of Director Vernon McGee on August 29. Smith promised a legislative budget would be submitted by the January 15 deadline, however.

Requests Almost Double
Texas' state agencies have requested 93 per cent more money for the 1968-69 biennium than they are receiving during this biennium. Governor Connally said that the evidence of the increasing complexity and magnitude of state government.

Connally said general revenue appropriations for the current biennium total \$635,000,000, and requests for the next two-year period amount to almost double that sum—\$1,216,000,000.

"Biggest item in the budget is public and higher education," Connally said, "and it is in this critical area where the largest increase is requested." The current appropriation in this area is \$347,000,000, but \$683,000,000 is requested, he said.

Oil Allowable At Peak
Santa Claus came early for Texas oil producers. Railroad Commission set the highest pro-

duction factor in seven and a half years for December. Statewide allowable will be 36.5 per cent of potential. Factor will permit production of 3,322,712 barrels a day, compared with November's 34.5 per cent which produced allowable of 3,205,042 barrels daily.

Commented Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey in announcing the happy tidings: "The crude oil market is extremely tight. Demand is extremely strong, and will remain strong for the next several months."

New Voter Signup System Proposed
A bi-partisan election law sub-committee, headed by Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, has agreed unanimously on a proposed new free registration system for Texas voters.

System would work like this: all voters must sign up personally with county tax officials, initially. Afterward, they can register annually by signing an official application form sent out by the tax office.

Voters must carry a registration card or certificate and identify themselves by signature at the polls.

Creighton said he hopes to submit the plan, together with an omnibus election law "clean up" bill, to the public hearing early next month.

Voters at the November 8 general election expressed preference for annual registration as opposed to permanent sign-up.

Teachers' Benefits
Texas college teachers may not get salary increases from the 60th Legislature, but they may get a new battery of fringe benefits as compensation, if the recommendations of the Interim Legislative Committee on Faculty Compensation in State-Supported Colleges and Universities are followed.

In reporting to approximately 200 college presidents and professors, the committee said it would recommend to the Legislature an optional retirement or annuity program, paid research or study leave, state aid for group insurance plans, the waiving of tuition for faculty members and their families

and lifting the legal ban against construction of parking lots that don't charge user fees.

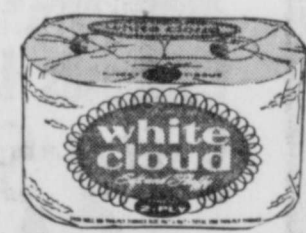

PLAY AND PLAY MATERIALS

With Thanksgiving Day 1966 past, most thoughts are now turning to the Christmas Season and shopping for gifts for family and friends. This column will include pointers for selecting toys for children in the next few weeks.

"They are just playing!"—It's with such a statement that grownups often underestimate children's play. But to children, playing is the most serious thing in the world. It is their way of learning, experimenting,

and finding out about the world. Play does far more good than keeping children amused, out of mischief or out of the way.

VALUES OF CHILDREN'S PLAY

- Helps children understand activities around them — they learn by doing, by experimenting with reality.
- Helps develop personality traits: cooperation, sharing, fair play, neatness and orderliness, dependability, resourcefulness, initiative.
- Develops physical abilities.
- Gives opportunity to find out about physical environment — size, shape, color, weight, textures.
- Is a channel for expressing thoughts, and feelings — by listening to children at play you may learn to understand their feelings about themselves, others, and their world.
- Develops a sense of ownership and property rights.
- Develops joy in creative ability — to make, to do, to create, to take apart and remake, gives satisfaction and happiness.
- Gives practice in problem solving — by trying various solutions, the child learns to concentrate, to think with a purpose, and to make decisions.

TYPES OF PLAY EQUIPMENT

Be sure to select play equipment that meets the child's needs, that fits his development at any given stage. Day by day a child grows. Different abilities develop, skills increase, and interests broaden. Play which at first was largely individual becomes more and more social.

Children need a variety of toys but some children have too many playthings. Variety in type is more important than

quantity. Materials from each of the following four groups will satisfy a child's growing interests.

1. Active, physical play—balls, tricycles, gym equipment and wagons aid in physical growth.

2. Manipulative, constructive, creative play—blocks, construction toys, clay, drawing and painting equipment are typical aids to this type of play. They give children opportunity for expressing ideas, trying out new ones, and for developing initiative and resourcefulness.

3. Imitative, initiative, dramatic play—dolls, housekeeping equipment, farms and farm equipment, animals, trains, filling stations, and dress-up costumes are typical of toys that stimulate imaginative and dramatic play. The child learns to understand the world around him through imitating and dramatizing adult activities.

4. Social play—play in which several children can take part is helpful to social development. Such playthings as doll equipment, blocks, a teeter, or a wagon are more usable and more fun when two children play together. By sharing play activities, children learn the traits of fair play and good sportsmanship, how to get along with

each other, and how to think quickly and accurately.

Toys and play equipment need not be the most expensive or even store bought—children like

homemade toys, too. In fact, a young child often prefers his mother's pots and pans, canned goods, or some scraps of cloth, to toys purchased for him.

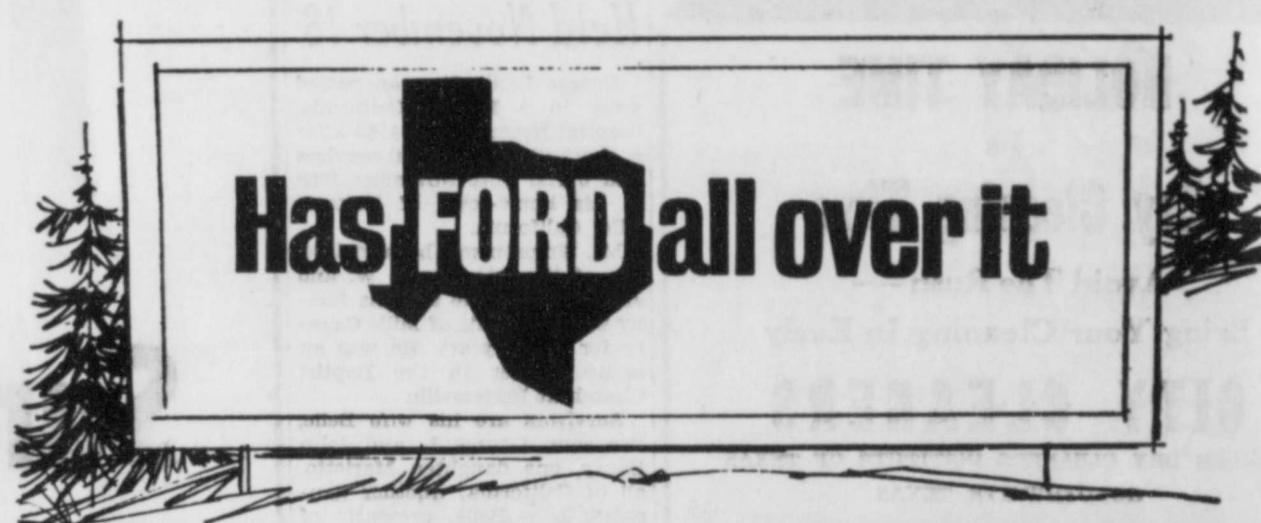

Work Plan Agreement Signed For Bennett Creek Watershed Program

The Watershed Work Plan Agreement between the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District, Mills County Commissioners Court, the Bennett Creek Water Control Improvement District, and the U. S. D. A. Soil Conservation Service was signed Tuesday, November 22.

This constitutes a partial consummation of an idea that officially began with the organization, by vote, of the Bennett

Creek WCID, on February 11, 1958. The idea—a watershed protection program completed on Bennett Creek.

Since 1958 the three sponsoring organizations have cooperated in obtaining land treatment on Bennett Creek watershed; in getting a planning priority; in working together with Soil Conservation Service assistance in planning a flood control program; and finally, the 22nd of November saw their efforts to date rewarded when a field review was held for the work plan.

Four dams are planned that will give an estimated \$22,000 reduction in annual flood damages.

There remains for the sponsors to obtain land rights, build the four dams, and then operate and maintain them, for the Bennett Creek program to be completed.

Murray Cox, Agriculture Reporter of Fort Worth, will show his latest travel film here Monday night, December 5, at 6:30 o'clock in the Goldthwaite High School Auditorium.

On his tour around the world last year he visited Hawaii, Japan, Formosa, Hong Kong, Thailand, India, Iran, Rome, Italy and other points of interest.

The one hour film is open to the public with no admission charge and is sponsored by the four Mills County Vocational Agriculture Teachers and the four Mills County Home Economic Teachers, according to announcement by Thurman Head, Goldthwaite Vocational Agriculture Teacher.

After the film is shown, a county wide organization will be formed for young farmers and young homemakers. Office holders are required to be between the ages of 21 and 35 but, members' ages are unlimited.

Benefits Planned For Brown-Mullin Creek Watershed

Thirty-one thousand dollars is a lot of money to "go down the creek" every year. That is just what farmers, ranchers, and other residents of the 134-square mile area of the Brown-Mullin Creek watershed are losing in flood damages every year, according to official estimates.

With assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District and the Mills County Commissioners' Court have developed a Flood Control Central Work plan on Brown-Mullin Creek estimated to reduce annual flood damages by \$20,000.

Conservation District official, W. G. Bishop, reports, "We, the sponsors, have agreed to operate and maintain the seven planned flood control dams. The S. C. S. has agreed to provide the funds to build the dams. The remaining job to start construction is for us to secure all land-rights — at no cost to the Federal Government. This is our share along with land treatment."

Some Mills Co. Residents Receive Special Benefits

Some residents of Brown, Comanche, and Mills Counties (counties served by the Brown-wood Social Security Office) are among more than half a million people 72 or older who received their first checks this month for new special benefits.

Nationwide, payments for this month amount to \$20,000,000.

Financed out of general funds of the U. S. Treasury, not social security taxes, the payments are \$35 a month for single persons and \$52.50 for married couples.

No work under social security is required, but an application is necessary.

Anyone receiving old-age assistance from the State Welfare Department is not eligible. Also, the special age 72 payment is reduced by any governmental pension for which the husband or wife is eligible, such as civil service retirement, railroad retirement, teacher retirement, or social security.

However, workmen's compensation insurance, or any payment by the Veterans Administration as compensation for service-connected death or service-connected disability, does not reduce the special age 72 payment.

New Procedure For Payment Of Medicare Benefits

A new procedure now in effect will speed up reimbursement under medicare for doctor bills paid by or on behalf of a medicare beneficiary who dies. Glen McNatt, Social Security Branch Office Manager in Brownwood, announced today.

The simplified procedure will make it unnecessary for widows, widowers, or other relatives to arrange for appointment of a legal representative of a medicare beneficiary's estate simply to collect a medicare payment.

In some cases, Mr. McNatt said, the legal costs would have equalled or even exceeded the amount of the reimbursement under medicare.

He said that where there is no legal representative of the estate, and where none is expected to be appointed, medicare will make payment to a surviving widow, widower, or other relative.
